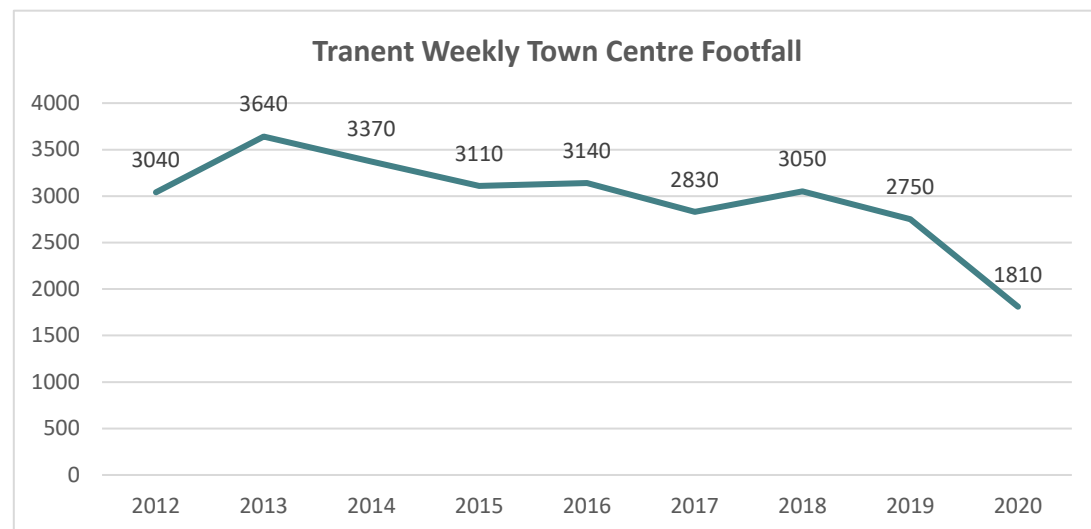


## Neighbourhood and Place

- Pedestrian Market Research Services (PMRS) data showed that weekly town centre footfall in Tranent town centre fell by 34.2% in 2020 from the previous year, higher than the 22.2% across East Lothian.



The 2019 East Lothian Residents Survey reported that:

- 97% of respondents in the TWM ward rated their neighbourhood as a “very/fairly good” place to live.
- 13% of residents in this ward felt that their neighbourhood had become worse in the last 3 years, the highest of all wards, 18% thought it had improved, and 64% felt it had remained the same.
- TWM residents were the most likely of all wards to disagree that the council does the best it can with the money available, and that the council was good at letting people know how well it is performing.
- 66% of TWM ward respondents felt that the council provides a high quality service, less than the 72% for East Lothian as a whole.
- 14% of TWM ward respondents agreed that they could influence decisions affecting their local area, less than the 22% for East Lothian as a whole.

## Travel and Transport

- 2 of the 26 data zones in the TWM ward are within the 20% most access deprived in East Lothian and 6 are in the least deprived.
- In this ward 4,938 residents under the age of 22 will be eligible for free bus travel from 31<sup>st</sup> January 2022.

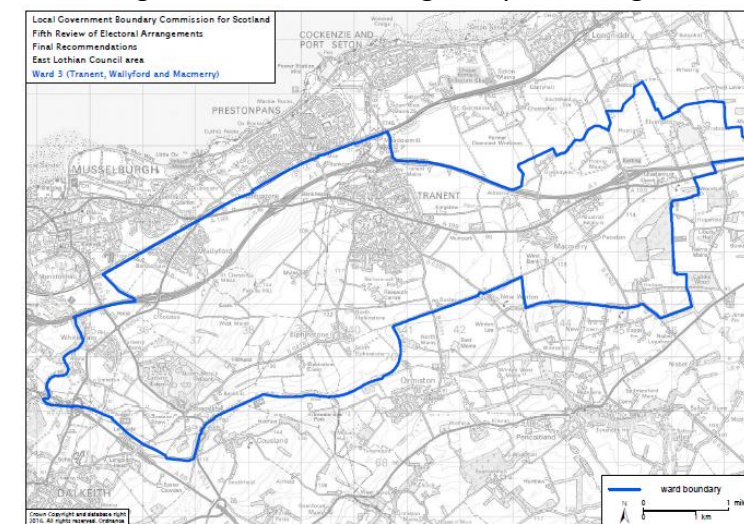
The 2019 East Lothian Residents Survey showed that:

- When asked about the issue that most needed improving in their area, 7% of respondents in this ward opted for public transport, compared to 8% across East Lothian.
- 67% of this ward were satisfied with the local bus service, compared to 60% across East Lothian.
- 11% of respondents felt that traffic congestion was a priority for improvement in their area, compared to 13% across East Lothian as a whole.
- 31% of respondents felt that road and pavement repairs were a priority for improvement in their area, higher than the 26% across East Lothian.

This snapshot is designed to give a quick statistical overview of one of the East Lothian Council ward and support the work of the East Lothian Partnership. It is one of six ward and three area partnership snapshots that have been produced to compliment the East Lothian Profile 2020 summary.

## Tranent, Wallyford & Macmerry (TWM) Ward by Numbers - Snapshot 2022

The Tranent, Wallyford & Macmerry (TWM) ward is situated to the west of East Lothian and centred on Tranent. The ward is largely comprised of the old Fa’side ward, however Ormiston and Pencaitland villages have been ceded to Haddington & Lammermuir, whilst other areas (and data zones) have been acquired from the old Musselburgh East ward, including Wallyford village.



## Population

- The 2020 mid-year population estimate for this ward is 22,435 (20.8% of the population of East Lothian) making it the most populated ward in the county.
- The 2018 based population projections show a 10.3% overall increase to 24,169 in 2028 in this ward, higher than the 7.2% across East Lothian.
- This ward has proportionally more people aged 0-15 and 16-64 than any other East Lothian ward.
- NRS Population projections show that the working age population and those aged 15 and under will reduce as a percentage of the whole in both TWM and East Lothian, and 65 and over will increase.

- Education Service figures which take into account local policy such as housing developments, show a 4.4% increase (2020 to 2028) for P1 to S6 pupils for the TWM school cluster.

## Housing

- In 2020, 59.8% of this ward’s population were classed as living in other urban areas, 20.4% in large urban, and 19.8% in accessible rural, compared to 20.2%, 23.2% and 22% respectively across East Lothian.
- 7 of the 26 data zones in this ward are within the 20% most deprived in terms of the SIMD2020 housing domain East Lothian, and 4 data zones are in the 20% least deprived.
- In 2019 there were 9,254 dwellings in this ward, equal to 18.9% of the total number of dwellings across East Lothian.
- In 2019, 98.4% of this ward’s dwellings were occupied, compared to 97.1% across East Lothian.
- In 2020 the median sale price for houses sold in this ward was £206,000, less than the £238,000 median sale price for East Lothian.

## Deprivation in the ward

The Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation SIMD2020 identifies concentrations of deprivation in East Lothian.

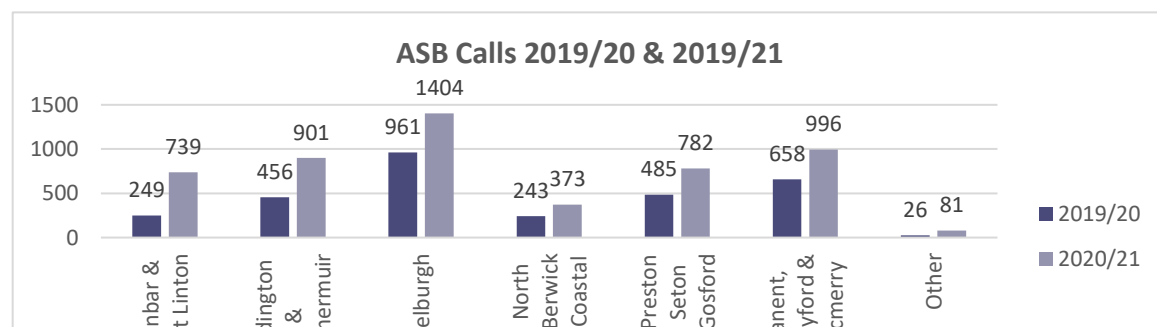
- 9 data zones within the TWM ward are ranked within the 20% most deprived in East Lothian.
- 2 data zones in the ward are within the 20% least deprived in East Lothian.
- 4 data zones in this ward are within the 20% most deprived in Scotland.
- The lowest ranked data zone in East Lothian, High St./Northfield Lindores Drive, Tranent is in the TWM ward. This data zone is also within the 10% most deprived in Scotland.

## Income and Employment

- The SIMD2020 showed that approximately 12.5% of the population of the TWM ward are classed as income deprived, higher than the figure for East Lothian (10.2%). The proportion of the ward's data zones that are considered to be income deprived ranges from 3% to 31%.
- In Oct 2021, 2227 residents in this ward claimed Universal Credit, 52.3% higher than in February 2020, but lower than the 55.1% increase across East Lothian as a whole.
- In Oct 2021, 510 UC claimants were seeking work, 19.7% higher than in February 2020, but lower than the 35.6% increase across East Lothian as a whole.
- The 2019 East Lothian Residents Survey reported that 67% of respondents in the TWM ward were "Managing very/quite well" financially, higher than the overall East Lothian figure of 54%. Residents in this ward were the most likely to have an annual household income of below £12,000.
- In 2019, 19% of children in this ward were classed as living in relative low income families, and 15% in absolute low income families, compared to 16% and 13% across East Lothian respectively.
- The SIMD2020 showed that 8.9% of the working age population in this ward is considered to be employment deprived – higher than the 8.1% for East Lothian. The proportion of the ward that are considered to be employment deprived ranges from 2% to 20%.

## Crime and Safety

- In 2019, 90% of East Lothian Residents Survey respondents in this ward said they felt safe walking alone in their neighbourhood after dark, compared to 94% across East Lothian.
- 8 data zones in this ward are within the 20% most deprived in relation to SIMD crime categories in East Lothian. 1 data zone is within the 10% most deprived in relation to SIMD crime in Scotland.
- The TWM ward, which houses 20.8% of East Lothian's population, generated 18.9% of the Anti Social Behaviour (ASB) complaints made to East Lothian Council in 2020/21.
- In this ward during 2020/21, ASB calls increased by 51.4% (658 to 996) compared to 71.4% across East Lothian. A contributing factor to the increase was that calls relating to a breach of covid restrictions during lockdown were classed as ASB.



## The Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD)

The SIMD is a tool used by the Scottish Government to identify concentrations of deprivation across Scotland in a consistent manner. It does this by dividing the country into 6,976 data zones (each averaging around 783 people).

These data zones are then ranked (with the lowest number indicating the most deprived area) against key measures of deprivation – income, education, crime, health, employment, geographic access and housing – as well as by overall deprivation.

It is important to note that the SIMD only identifies concentrations of deprivation. Therefore not all people who are deprived live in a datazone highlighted by the SIMD, and not all people living within an identified data zone are deprived.

**There are 132 data zones in East Lothian and 26 data zones in the TWM ward.**

## Health and Social Care

Across East Lothian, male and female life expectancies are better than the Scottish average, although in general there has been a slowdown in life expectancy growth since 2012/14.

- Life expectancy for males and females is highest in Longniddry & Aberlady, and lowest in Tranent North for males and Wallyford/Whitecraig for females.
- 7 data zones in the ward are ranked within the 20% most deprived in East Lothian in terms of the SIMD health domain, 4 are in the 20% least health deprived in East Lothian.
- Compared to the East Lothian average Longniddry/Aberlady was significantly better for bowel screening uptake and child dental health (P1). Wallyford/Whitecraig was significantly worse for bowel screening uptake, child dental health (P7), COPD and emergency hospitalisations. Tranent North was significantly worse for child dental health P7, child healthy weight (P1), and emergency hospitalisations, Tranent South was significantly worse for bowel screening uptake and child healthy weight (P1).
- The 2019 East Lothian Residents Survey reported that 93% of people in this ward took moderate exercise, and 41% took vigorous exercise compared to 89% and 41% respectively across East Lothian.
- The 2020 mid-year population estimate shows that there are 3,465 people aged 65 years and over living in this ward, which is 15.4% of the ward population. 1,535 of them or 6.8% of the total population are aged 75 or over. This is projected to increase to 18.3% and 8.1% respectively in 2028.

## Education and Training

- In terms of the SIMD20 Education Domain, 11 data zone in this ward are within the 20% most deprived in East Lothian, there are no data zones in the 20% least deprived.
- The 2017 East Lothian Residents survey showed that 36% of residents in this ward had no formal qualifications, higher than the 28% across East Lothian. However 24% had a degree, and 30% had a HNC/D or equivalent higher than the 19% and 18% respectively across East Lothian.
- In 2019/20 the pupil teacher ratio for Ross High School was 12.5, lower than the 13 across East Lothian. 3 of the 4 primary schools had pupil teacher ration lower than across East Lothian.
- In 2019/20, 80% of Ross High school pupils left school with one or more awards at SCQF level 5 or better, compared with 83% across East Lothian as a whole.
- In 2019/20, 96% of Ross High school leavers were assessed as having achieved a positive destination, compared to 92% across East Lothian as a whole.
- The 2019 East Lothian Residents Survey showed that 51% of the TWM ward were satisfied with local schools, lower than the 61% across East Lothian.
