Introduction

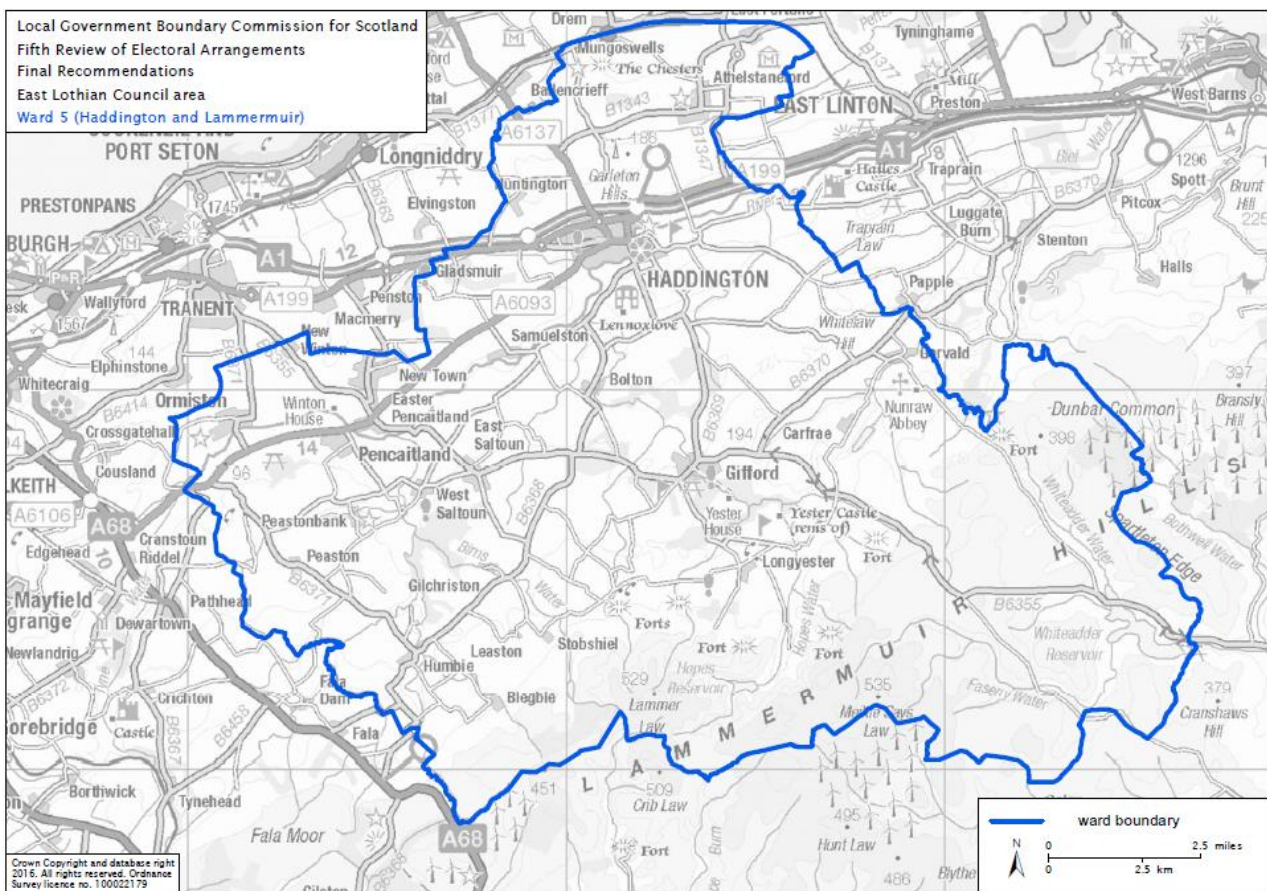
The profile is one of 6 ward area profiles prepared to support the work of the East Lothian Partnership and compliment the East Lothian Profile.

It has been compiled in consideration of the priorities identified in the East Lothian Single Outcome Agreement to assist local partnerships and service providers to better understand the needs of their local areas.

The Haddington & Lammermuir Area

The Haddington & Lammermuir Ward is the largest geographic ward in East Lothian. Centred on the town of Haddington, the ward stretches from Athelstaneford in the North, the Lammermuir Hills in the south east, and Ormiston in the west.

PLEASE NOTE - Throughout this profile a number of different sources have been used to gather statistical information, which each use different boundaries and area definitions. In this report:

- **Haddington & Lammermuir** refers to the East Lothian Local Authority ward area (as in the map above)
- **Intermediate zones** are also used to present variations within the ward. In this case the **Haddington North Zone**, the **Haddington South Zone** and **Haddington Rural** covering the villages across the ward
- **Data zones** are the smallest geographic areas at which data is collected and analysed. There are 21 in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward

Population

Scotland's Census 2022 states that 17,084 people live in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward, accounting for 18.2% of the population of East Lothian.

HEADLINES – Population

- 18.2% of the population of East Lothian live in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward.
- 66.5% of the ward's population live in the town of Haddington.
- English is the main language of 97.1% of the population in this ward, higher than rate for East Lothian or Scotland.
- 78.3% of the population of this ward were born in Scotland, lower than the rate for East Lothian or Scotland as a whole.
- 77.9% of the ward identify as being White Scottish and 2.4% are from minority ethnic groups, lower than the East Lothian rate of 3.1%.

Population Distribution

- 66.5% of the population live in the town of Haddington
- The villages of Pencaitland, Ormiston and Gifford account for 29.5% of the ward population
- In the Haddington & Lammermuir ward 48.6% of the population are male and 51.4% are female
- Like the rest of East Lothian there are also proportionally more people of pensionable age living in the ward than there are across Scotland and more children aged 0-15

Country of Birth and Ethnicity

According to Scotland's Census 2022 figures:-

- 3.0% of the ward were born outside of Europe, similar to the 3.1% for East Lothian and lower than the 5.5% across Scotland.
- In the Haddington and Lammermuir ward 78.3% of the population were born in Scotland compared to 80.1% of residents in East Lothian and 79.4% across the country as a whole.
- 93.2% of the Haddington and Lammermuir ward were born in the UK, higher than the 92.6% for East Lothian and 89.8% across Scotland.

- 77.9% of people in this ward identify themselves as White Scottish – below the rate for East Lothian and similar to the rate across Scotland as a whole.
- 2.4% of people in this ward identify were from minority ethnic groups lower than the rate for East Lothian and across Scotland as a whole.

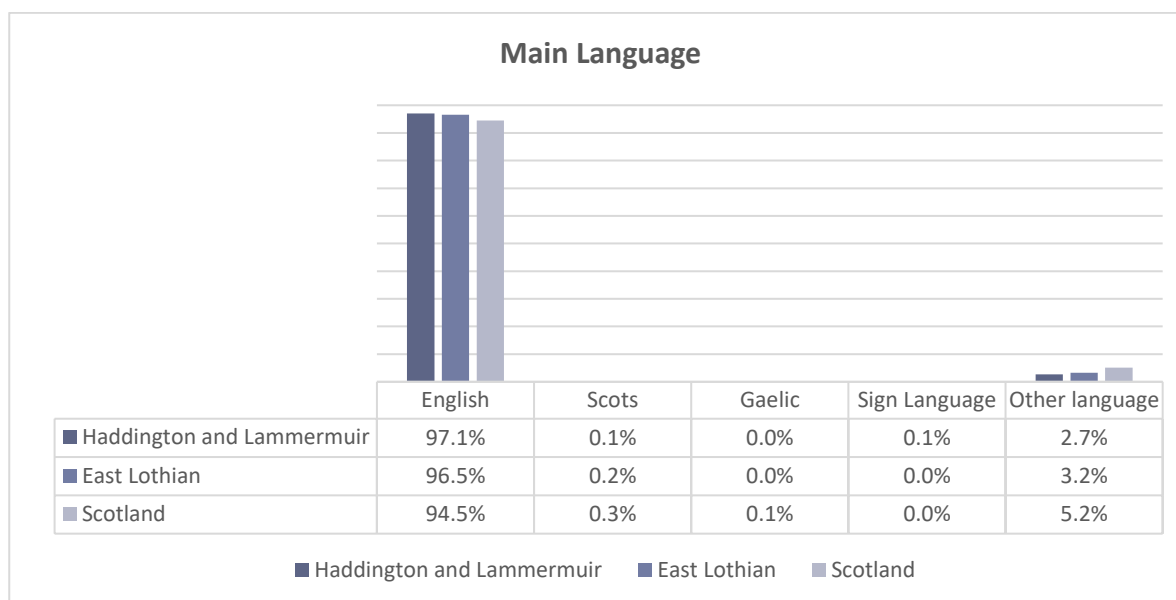

English is the main language for 97.1% of all people (aged 3 and over) living in this ward, higher than the 96.5% for East Lothian and 94.5% across the country as a whole.

Religion

Across Scotland 38.8% of the population stated their religion as Christian and 2.2% identified as Muslim in Scotland's Census 2022. At the same time 51% of people stated that they had no religion.

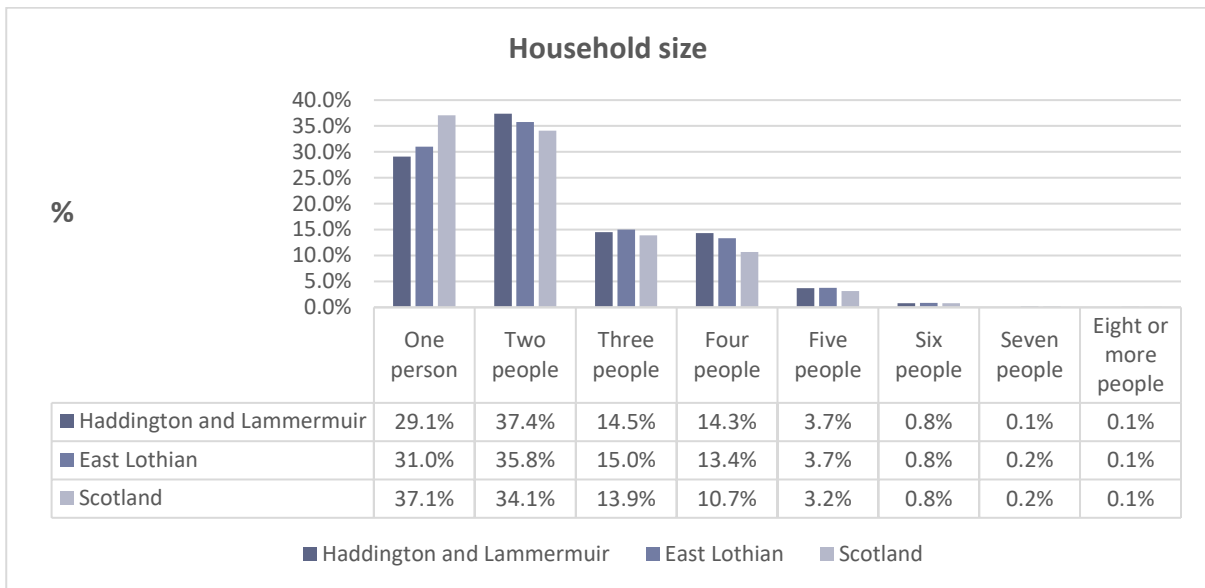
In the Haddington & Lammermuir ward:

- 34.8% of the population declared that they were Christian (East Lothian 35%).
- 0.6% reported their religion as Muslim (East Lothian 0.8%)
- 58% stated they had no religion (East Lothian 57.5%)

Household Size

Figure 3 shows that there are less one person households in this ward when compared to East Lothian and Scotland as whole.

Deprivation in the ward

The Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD)

The SIMD is a tool used by the Scottish Government to identify concentrations of deprivation across Scotland in a consistent manner. It does this by dividing the country into 6,976 data zones (average 767 people per data zone).

These data zones are then ranked against key measures of deprivation – income, education, crime, health, employment, geographic access and housing – as well as by overall deprivation.

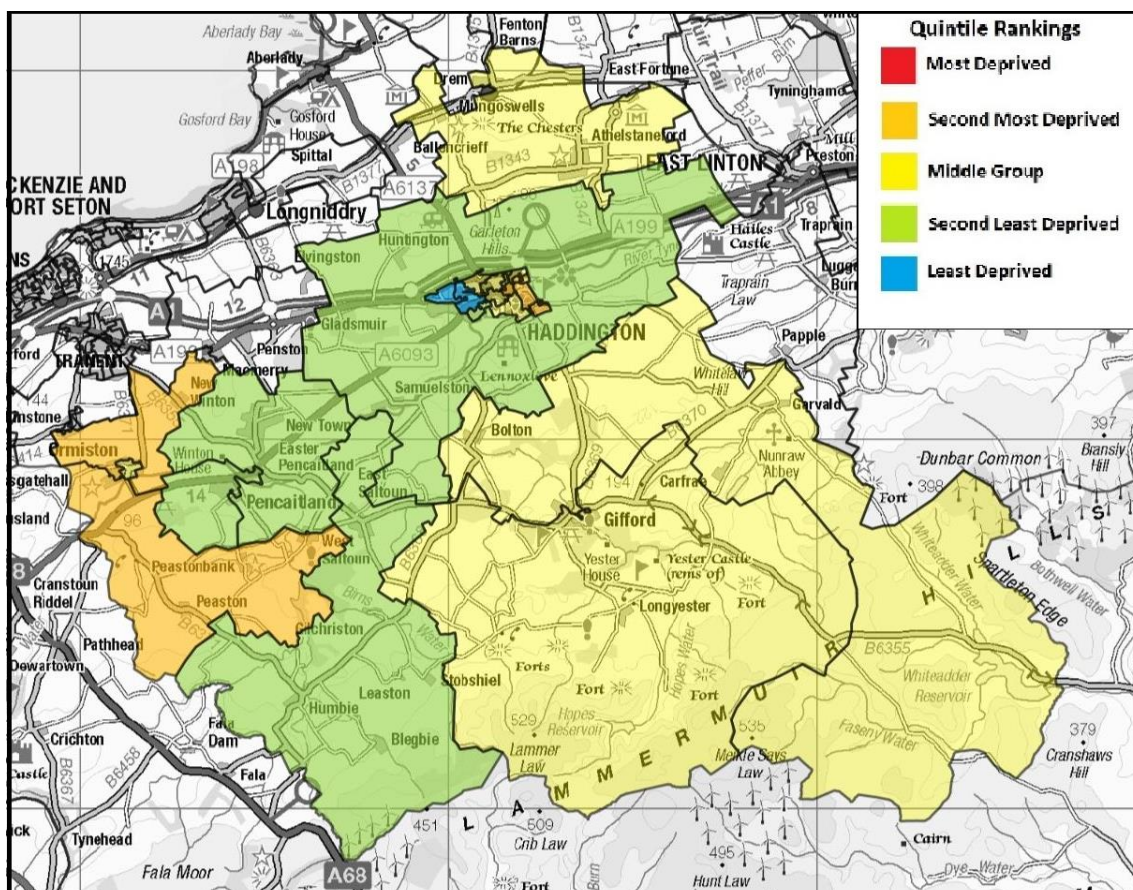
It is important to note that the SIMD only identifies concentrations of deprivation. Therefore not all people who are deprived live in a data zone highlighted by the SIMD, and not all people living within an identified data zone are deprived.

HEADLINES – Deprivation in the ward

- None of the Haddington & Lammermuir data zones are within the 20% most deprived in Scotland.
- 2 data zones in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward are within the 20% most deprived across East Lothian.
- 2 data zones in the ward are ranked within the 20% least deprived in East Lothian, these are also ranked within the 20% least deprived in Scotland.

The map (Figure 4) shows all of the data zones in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward and illustrates their ranking out of the 132 data zones in East Lothian. It can be used to identify geographic clusters of relative deprivation in the ward.

The below table further illustrates the relative spread of deprivation, by showing the 2020 Scottish rank out of 6,976 data zones and the East Lothian rank out of 132 data zones.

- There are 21 data zones in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward.
- None of these data zones fall within the 20% most deprived in Scotland.
- 2 of the 21 data zones in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward are within the 20% most deprived in East Lothian.
- 2 data zones in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward are ranked within the 20% least deprived in East Lothian, these are also within the 20% least deprived in Scotland.
- The lowest ranked data zone in the ward (S01008256 Riverside/Hardgate/Market St.) is ranked 18 out of the 132 data zones in East Lothian.

Income and Employment

Although East Lothian is generally considered to be an area of high employment and general affluence there is considerable variation in economic activity, unemployment and the financial position of households between and within East Lothian's wards.

This section concentrates on income and employment figures across the ward in relation to East Lothian averages as well people's perceptions of their own financial position.

HEADLINES – Income and Employment

- 7.9% of the working age population in the Haddington & Lammermuir Ward is considered to be employment deprived – compared to East Lothian (8.4%) and Scotland (10.7%).
- Across the Haddington & Lammermuir data zones, the proportion of the population considered to be employment deprived ranges from 1% to 15%.
- 9.1% of the population of the Haddington & Lammermuir ward are identified as income deprived – lower than for East Lothian (10.2%) or Scotland (12.1%).
- The proportion of the population considered to be income deprived in the Haddington & Lammermuir data zones ranges from 1% to 20%.
- 13.7% of the working age population in the ward claimed Universal Credit, which is below the East Lothian rate of 14.8% and Scotland 16.4%.

Employment Patterns in the Haddington & Lammermuir Ward

Figure 5 shows that the breakdown of employment across different industry sectors in this ward was generally comparable with the rest of East Lothian.

In this ward a higher percentage of people worked within Agricultural, Hunting, Forestry and Fishing than across East Lothian and Scotland, as a whole, reflecting the largely rural nature of the area.

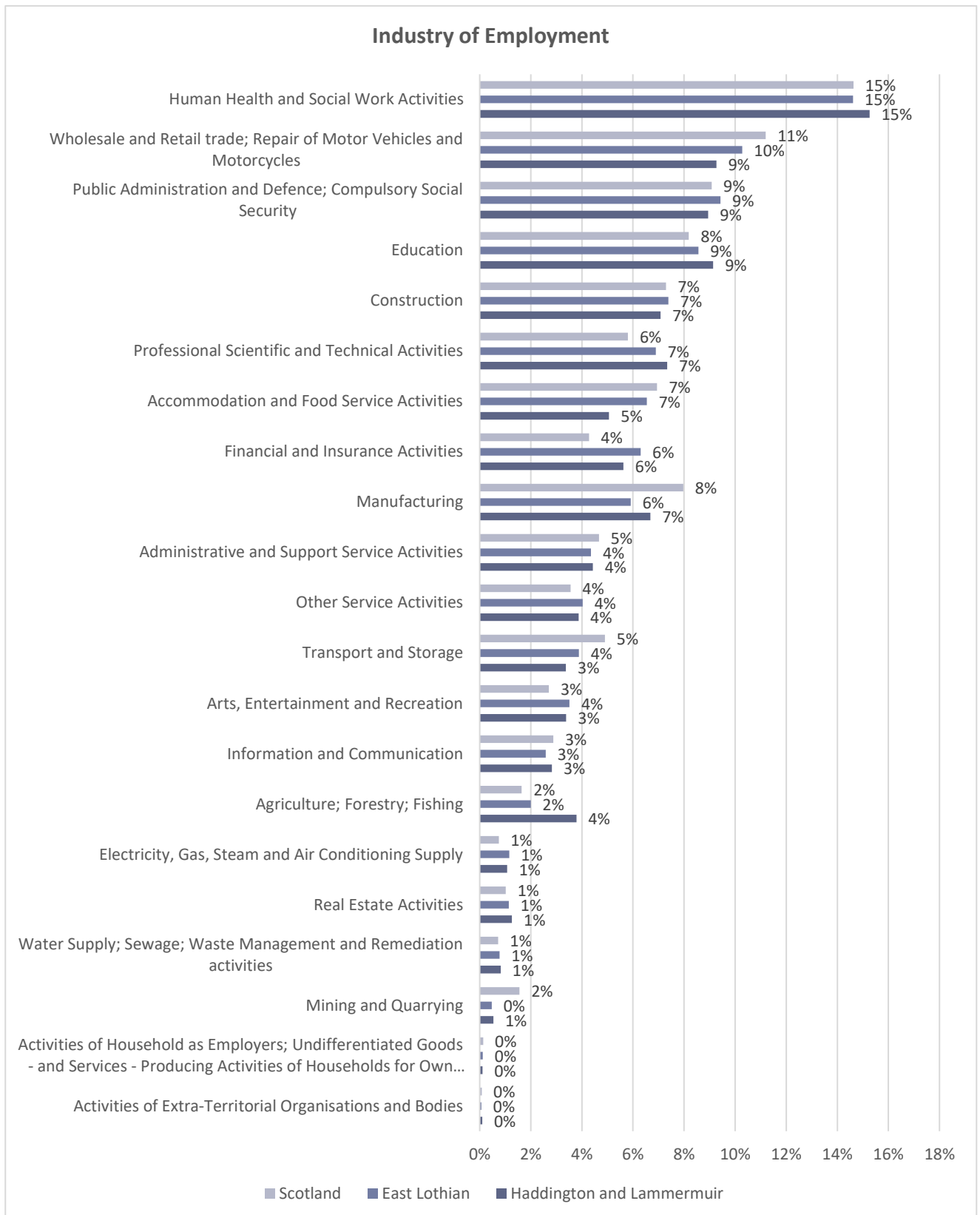
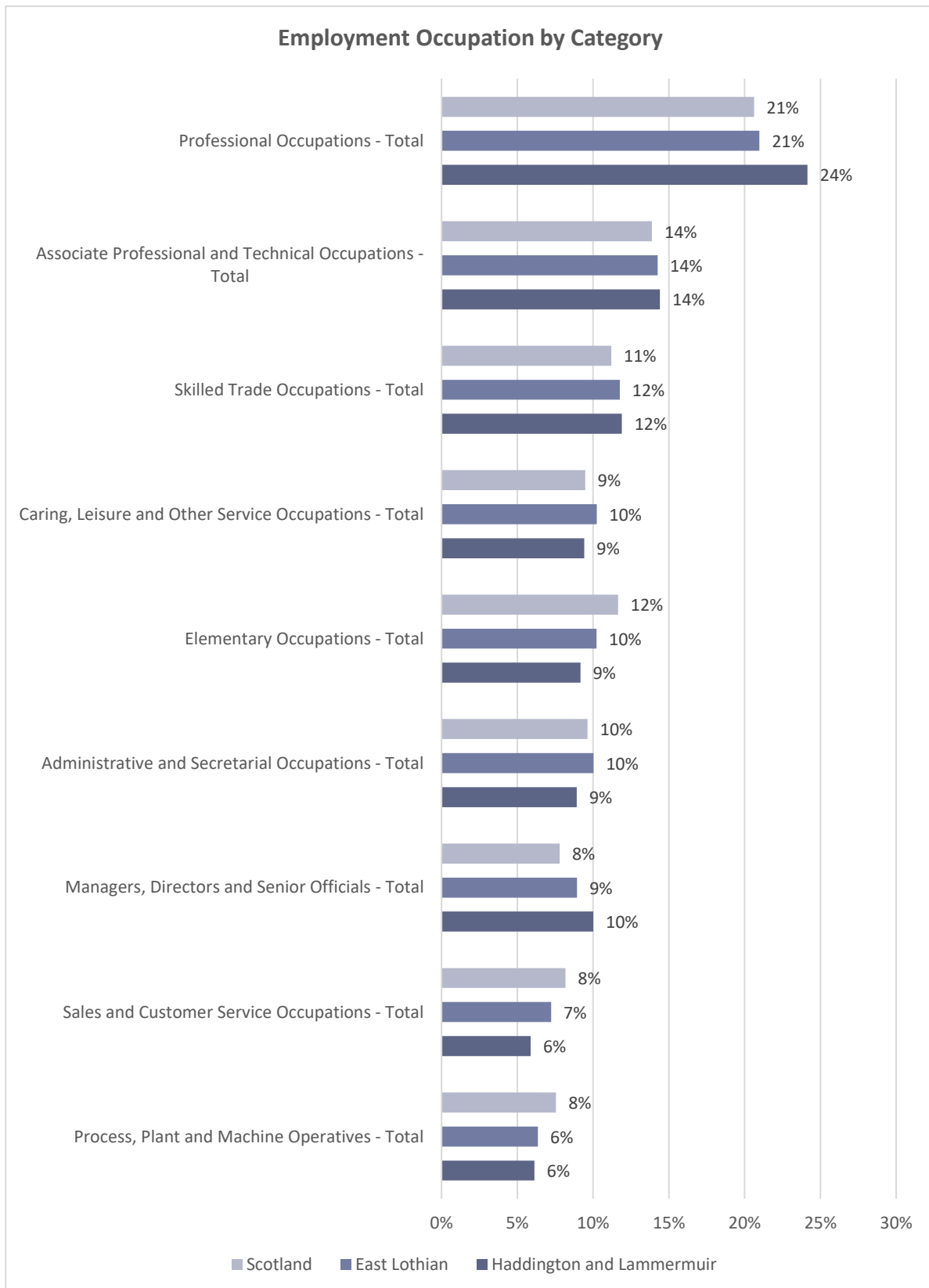


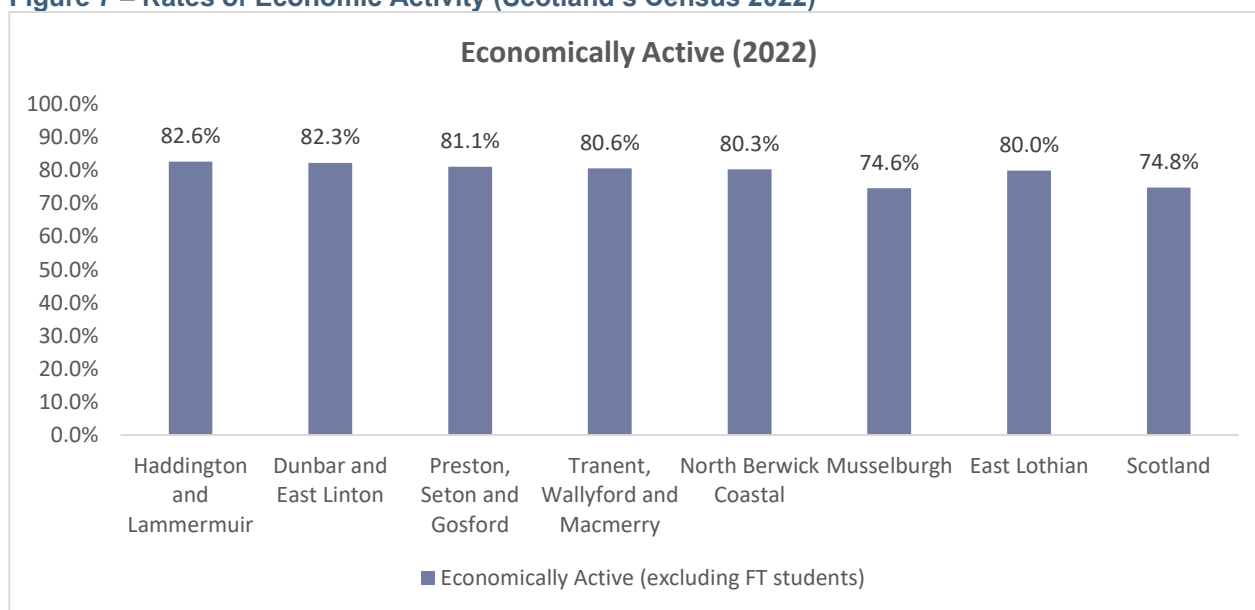
Figure 6 - Employment across Occupational Groups (Scotland's Census 2022)

In relation to employment across Occupational Groups Figure 6 shows that more people in this ward were employed in Professional occupations than across East Lothian as a whole.

Figure 5 – Employment by Industry Category (Scotland's Census 2022)

Economic Activity in the Haddington & Lammermuir Ward

Figure 7 shows that rates of economic activity across East Lothian were higher than across Scotland as a whole. 82.6% of the working age population were economically active in this ward, higher than the East Lothian figure of 80%.

Table 6 shows that, there were less people unemployed across East Lothian than across Scotland. The Haddington & Lammermuir ward had higher rates of people self-employed when compared to East Lothian as a whole.

Table 7 shows that across East Lothian there is a higher level of retirees than across Scotland as a whole. The level of retirees in this ward is higher than the East Lothian average.

Employment Deprivation

The SIMD Employment Domain is based on the following methodology:

- Working age recipients of Job Seekers’s Allowance (JSA)
- Working Age Incapacity Benefit or Employment Support Allowance recipients
- Working Age Severe Disablement Allowance recipients
- Working Age recipients of Universal Credit (UC)

- 7.9% % of the population of the working age population of the Haddington & Lammermuir Ward is considered to be employment deprived, compared to East Lothian (8.4%) and Scotland (10.7%)
- The proportion of the population considered to be employment deprived in the ward does however range from 1% to 15%.

Universal Credit

Universal Credit supports people who are on a low income or out of work. Its aim is to ensure that people are better off in work than on benefits. Universal Credit gives support to people to prepare for work, move into work, or earn more. It is the recipient's responsibility to do everything they can to find work or increase their earnings.

Universal Credit replaces:

- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Income Support
- Working Tax Credit
- Child Tax Credit
- Housing Benefit

Table 9 shows that 13.7% of the working age population of the Haddington & Lammermuir ward claimed Universal Credit in September 2024, which is below the East Lothian average of 14.8% (Scotland 16.4%). The current number of people on Universal Credit in this ward is 94% higher than the pre covid figure of 857 in February 2020. Across the county there has been an increase of 73.8% compared to 121.9% nationally. The level of claimants in East Lothian and Scotland has been increasing steadily since May 2022, and is now at the highest level since lockdown.

Table 10 shows that 1.9% of the working age population in this ward were searching for work in September 2024, lower than the 2.2% for East Lothian and 3% for Scotland. The current number of people searching for work in this ward is 4.9% lower than the pre covid figure of 247 in February 2020. There were 9.3% fewer claimants in East Lothian when compared to the pre covid figure, whereas Scotland increased by 7.0%.

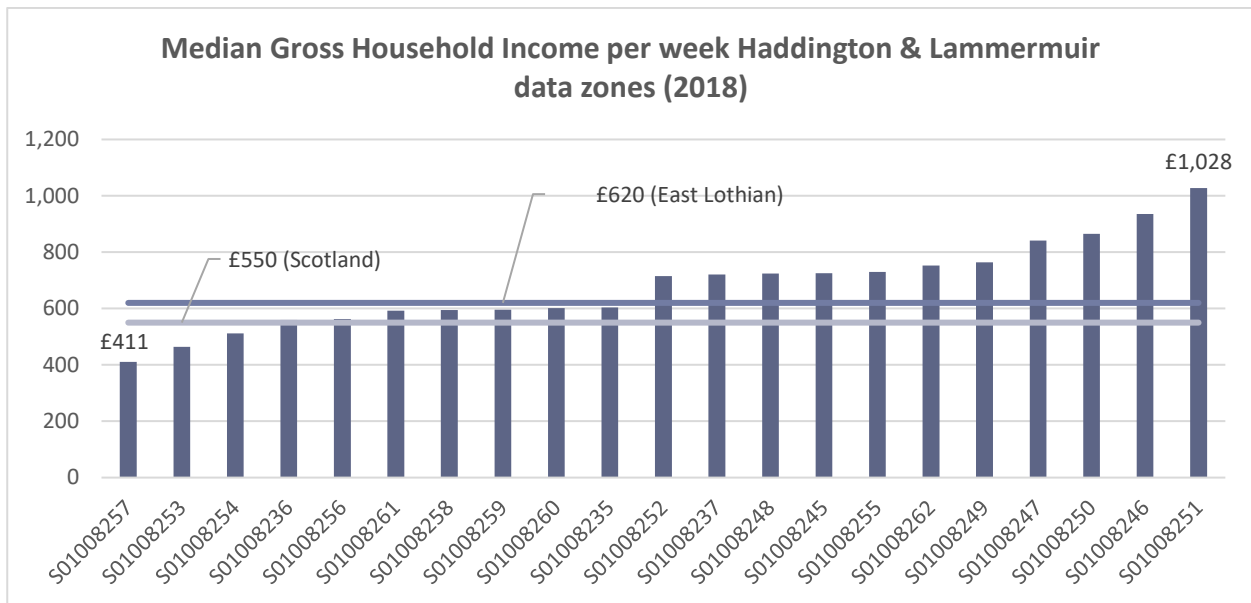

How is the ward coping financially?

Estimated household income varies across the ward, with a gap of £617 per week between the most affluent data zone and the least.

- 11 out of the 21 Haddington & Lammermuir data zones have a median, or middle of the range, household incomes above the East Lothian data zone average.

Figure 9 shows that 44% of respondents in this ward said that they were “Managing very/quite well” similar to the East Lothian figure of 45%.

Figure 9 - How households are managing financially (East Lothian Residents Survey 2024)

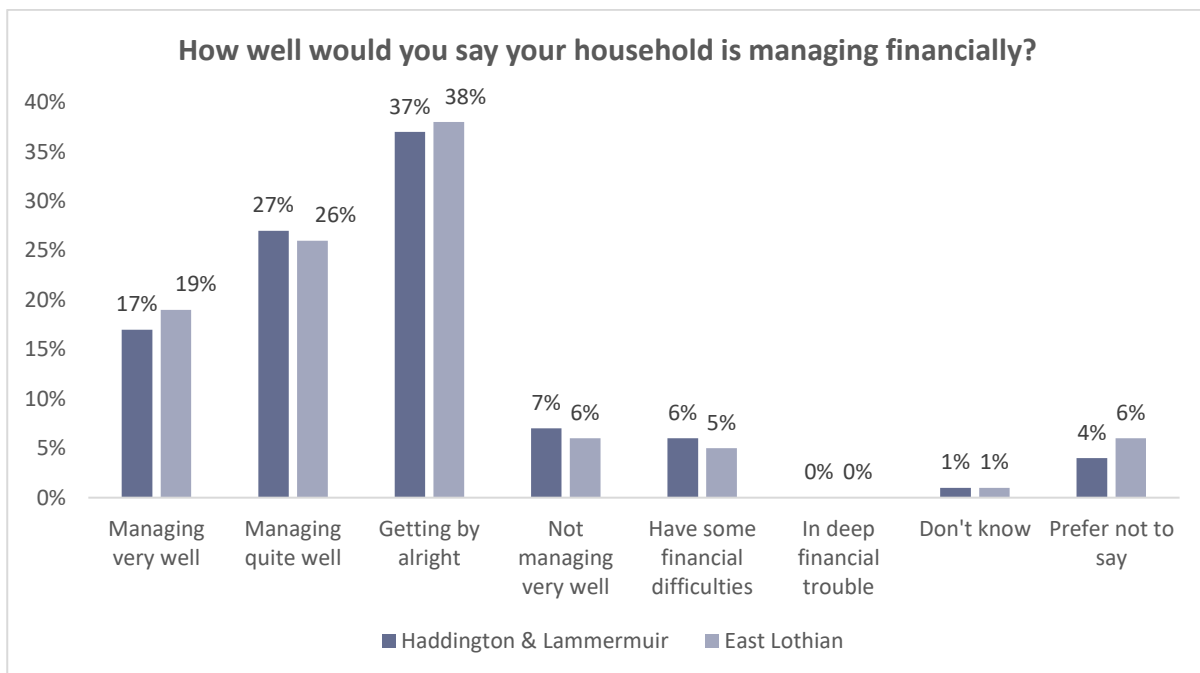
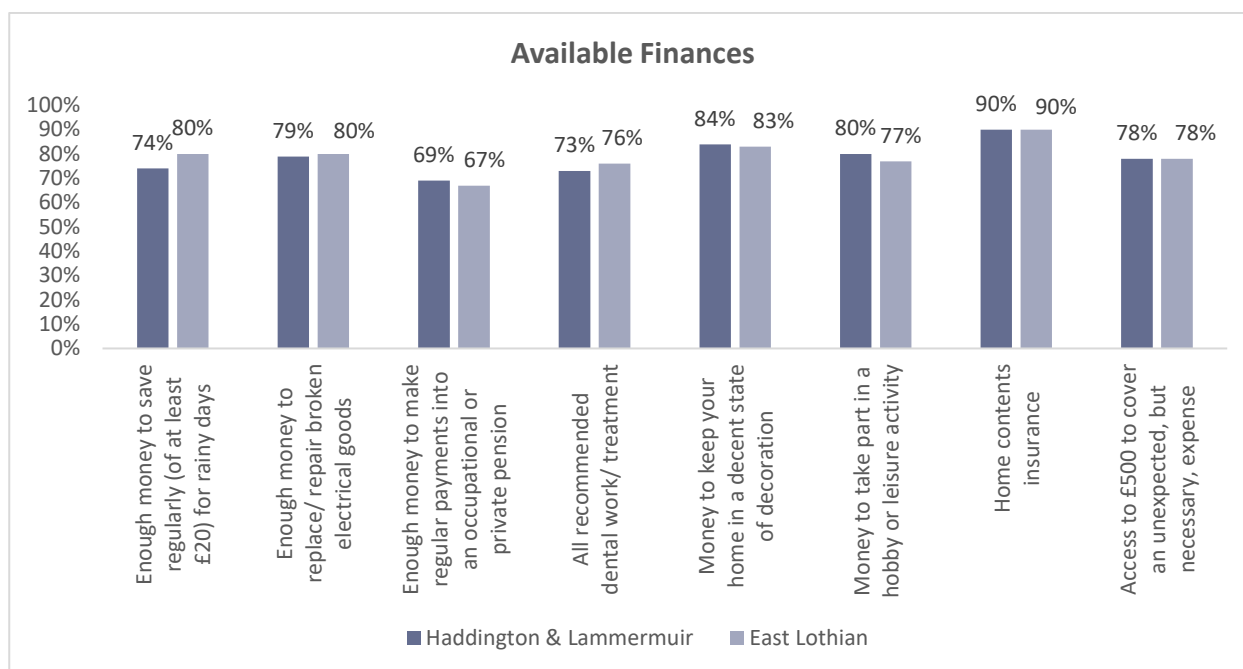


Figure 10 shows that 90% of this ward had enough money for home contents insurance, the highest of all the options.

Having money available for a private pension was the lowest affordable category for both this ward and across East Lothian as a whole.

Income Deprivation

The SIMD employment Domain is based on the following factors: Income Support and Income-based Employment Support Allowance claimants (16-59); Job Seekers Allowance and Guaranteed Pension Credit Claimants (all ages); Universal Credit claimants with no employment marker; number of children in JSA, IS or ESA households; number of adults and children dependent on adults in receipt of Tax Credits

- 9.1% of the population of the working age population of the Haddington & Lammermuir ward is considered to be income deprived.
- The proportion of the population that is income deprived in the ward is lower than for East Lothian as a whole (10.2%) and lower than the figure for Scotland (12.1%).
- The proportion of the population considered to be income deprived in the ward ranges from 1% to 16%.

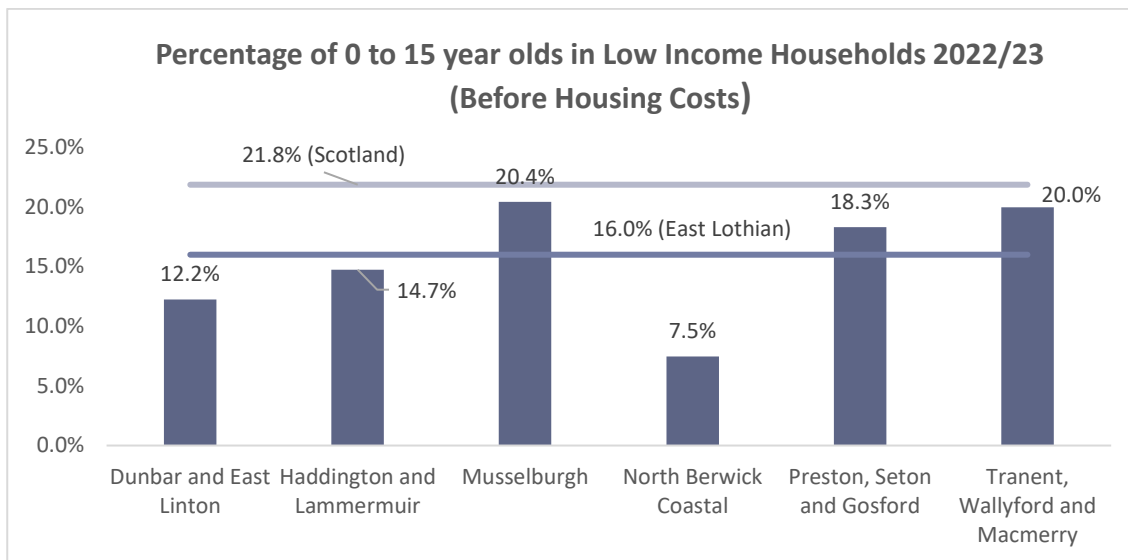

Figure 11 shows that 14.7% of 0 to 15 year olds in this ward were in low income families in 2022/23, compared to 16.0% in East Lothian and 21.8% across Scotland.

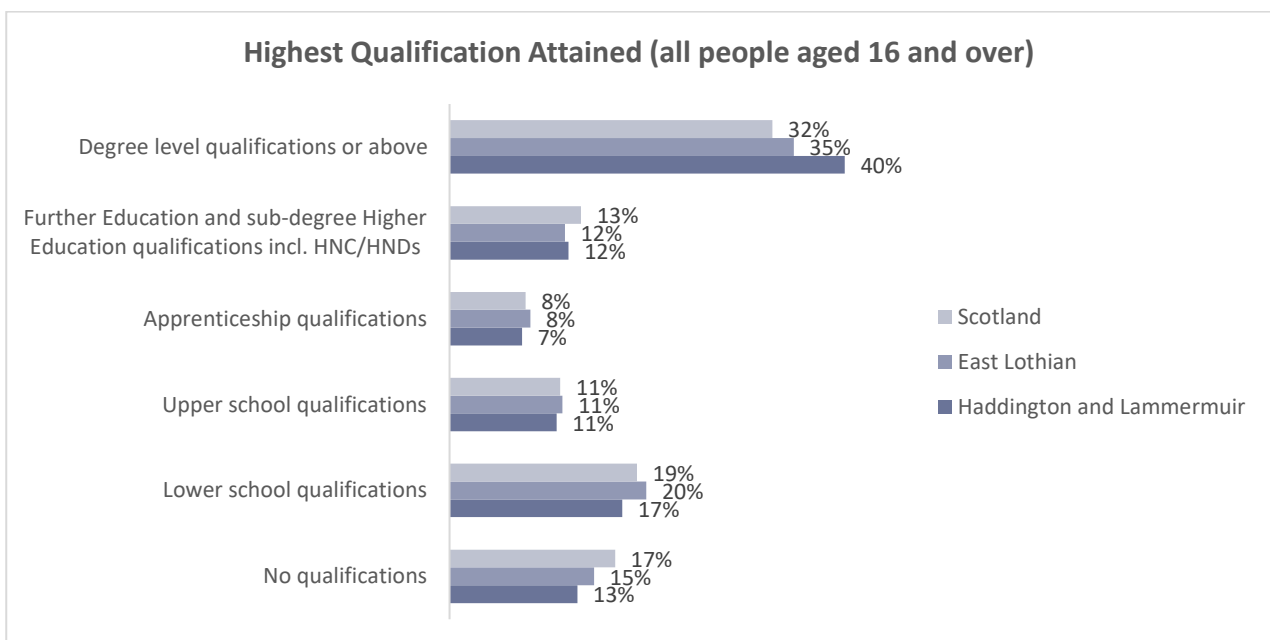

- 40% have undertaken a degree level or above qualification (compared to 35% across East Lothian).
- 13% have no formal qualifications (below the East Lothian figure of 15%).

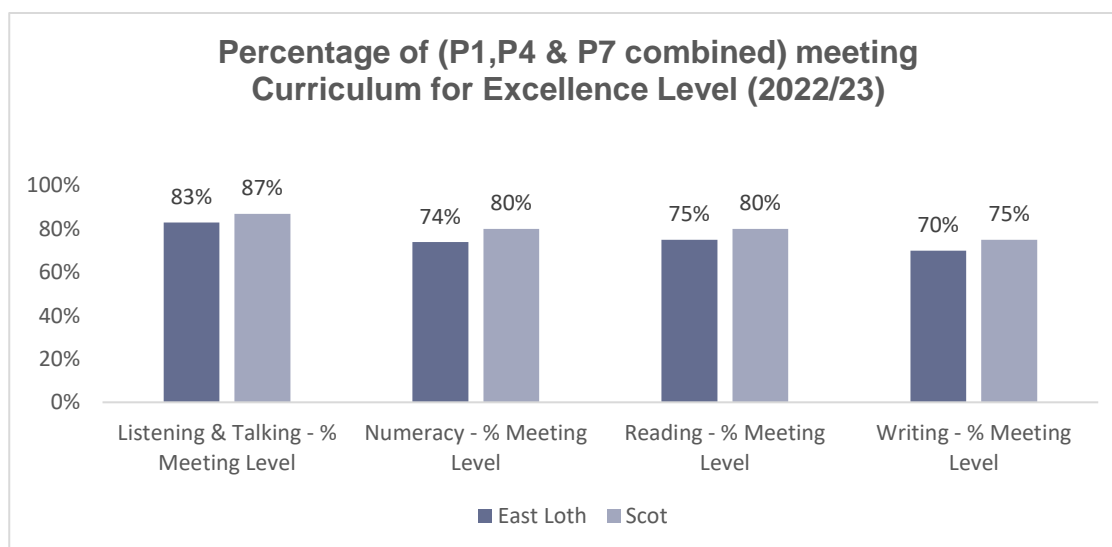

HEADLINES – Health and Social Care

- Haddington North intermediate zone had the highest life expectancy in the ward for females, Haddington rural intermediate zone had the highest life expectancy in the ward for males.
- The variation in life expectancy across the ward’s intermediate zones is 2.9 years for females and 5.9 years for males.
- 73% of respondents in this ward stated that their mental health was very good/good, compared to 71% for East Lothian.
- 59% of respondents in this ward stated that their physical health was very good/good, compared to 63% for East Lothian.
- 4 data zones in the ward are amongst the 20% most deprived in terms of the health domain in East Lothian, no data zones are in the 20% most deprived in terms of the health domain in Scotland.

- East Lothian has a life expectancy above the national average for males and females.
- For females, only Haddington South had a life expectancy below the East Lothian average.
- For males, Haddington South and Ormiston were below the East Lothian average.
- The largest difference between life expectancy between males and females in the ward was in Haddington South, with the female figure 6.9 years higher than males. The lowest was Haddington rural 1.6 years (East Lothian 3.6 years, Scotland 4.2 years).

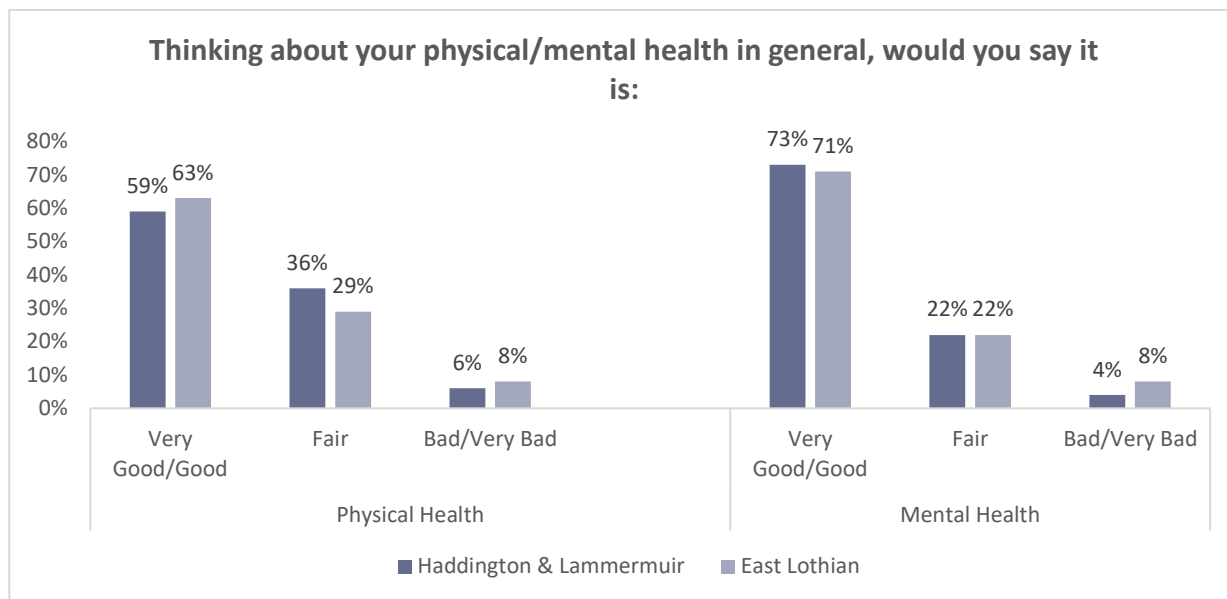

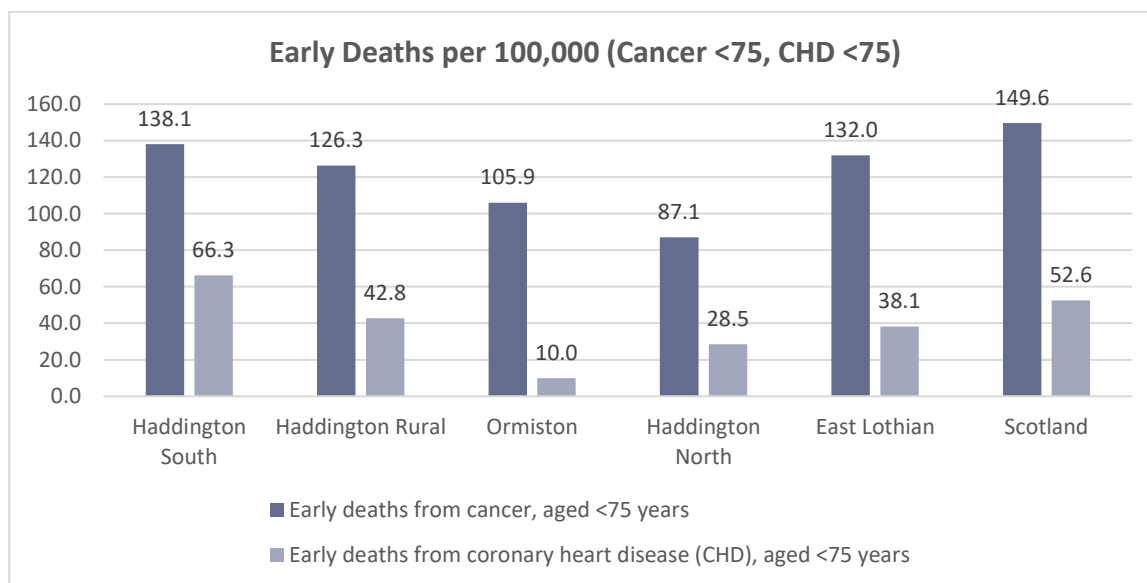

Maternity and Child Health

The 2022 Scotland census showed that 1,124 children aged 0 – 4 years are living in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward, which is 5.5% of the ward population, higher than the East Lothian figure of 4.9%.

- Maternal and child health data in East Lothian is better than the Scottish averages in all categories with the exception of healthy birth weight
- The percentage of babies breastfed in this ward’s intermediate zones was higher than the East Lothian average with the exception of Haddington South

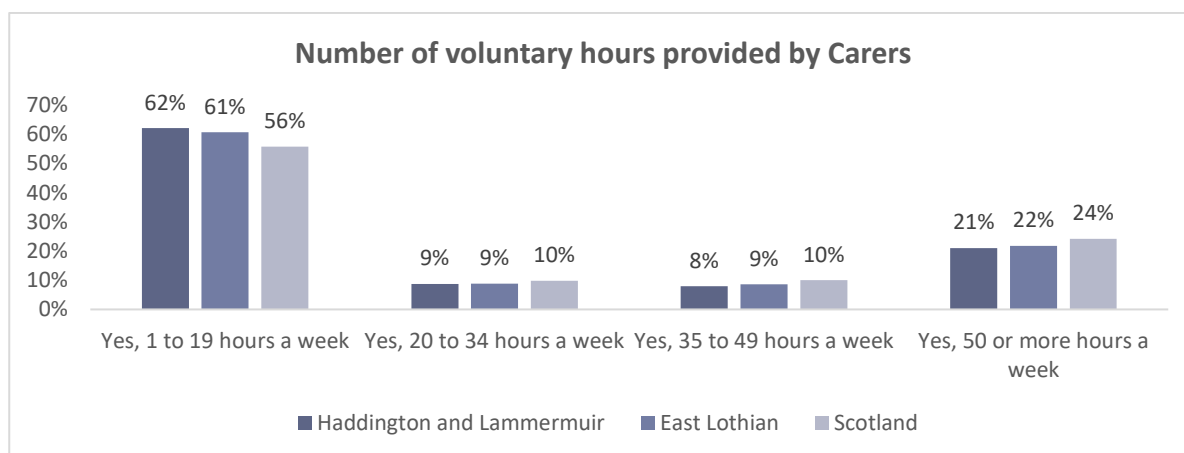

- 21% of these carers were providing more than 50 hours of care per week

Older people

Older people make up a growing segment of the population. The 2018 based population projection shows that the 21.4% of the population in this ward were aged 65 and over, and 9.5% were aged 75 and over in 2018, this is projected to increase to 26.5% and 12.4% respectively in 2030.

In 2022, East Lothian had an estimated 2104 people with dementia. Of those diagnosed in 49% were aged between 75-84, with 58% living in the West of the county, and 42% in the East. Statistics also indicated that, in line with national trends, there is a higher prevalence of dementia in women, than in men.

East Lothian Health and Social Care Partnership has developed a dedicated dementia strategy providing a clear strategic framework to improve the offer and provision of dementia services across East Lothian in line with local need.

The strategy sets out the needs and intended actions to help support people living with dementia and their families covering information provision, diagnosis and post diagnostic support, dedicated support for carers, expanding community connections, maintaining independence, transport, housing, staying safe and understood as well as care services and end-of-life care.

Day Centres are among the services across East Lothian that support older people to remain in their own homes for as long as possible by providing respite for families and carers and stimulating activities for individuals designed to help reduce social isolation and improve mental wellbeing.

Haddington Day Centre offers day centre support to between 60 and 70 older people per week. Between 30 and 40 people a week also visit the Day Centre to attend the Lunch Club

Neighbourhood and Place

HEADLINES – Neighbourhood and Place

- The 2024 East Lothian Residents Survey showed that 94% of people in this ward rated their neighbourhood as a 'fairly good' or 'very good' place to live.
- Road and pavement repair was the top priority for improvement in the Dunbar & East Linton ward and across East Lothian as a whole.
- 11% of respondents in the ward felt that they could influence decisions in their local area compared to 12% for East Lothian as a whole.
- 50% reported that they would like to be more involved in Council decisions affecting their area, less than the 49% across East Lothian as a whole.

The 2024 East Lothian Residents Survey showed that 94% of people in the Dunbar and East Linton ward rated their neighbourhood as a 'fairly good' or 'very good' place to live, higher than the 93% across East Lothian as a whole.

Figure 17 - Perception of their neighbourhood (East Lothian Residents Survey 2024)

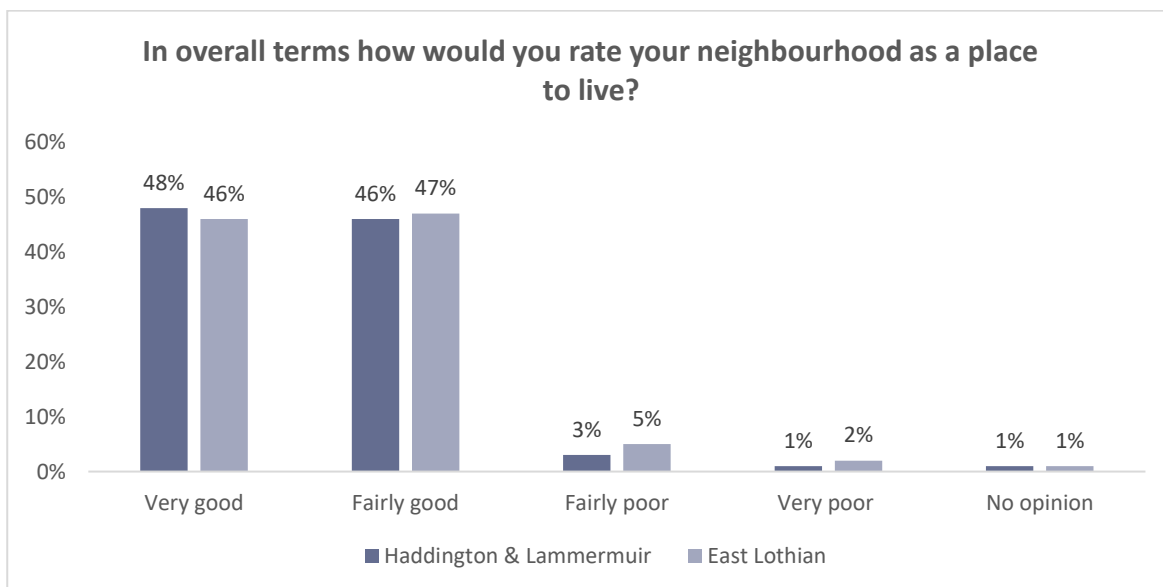
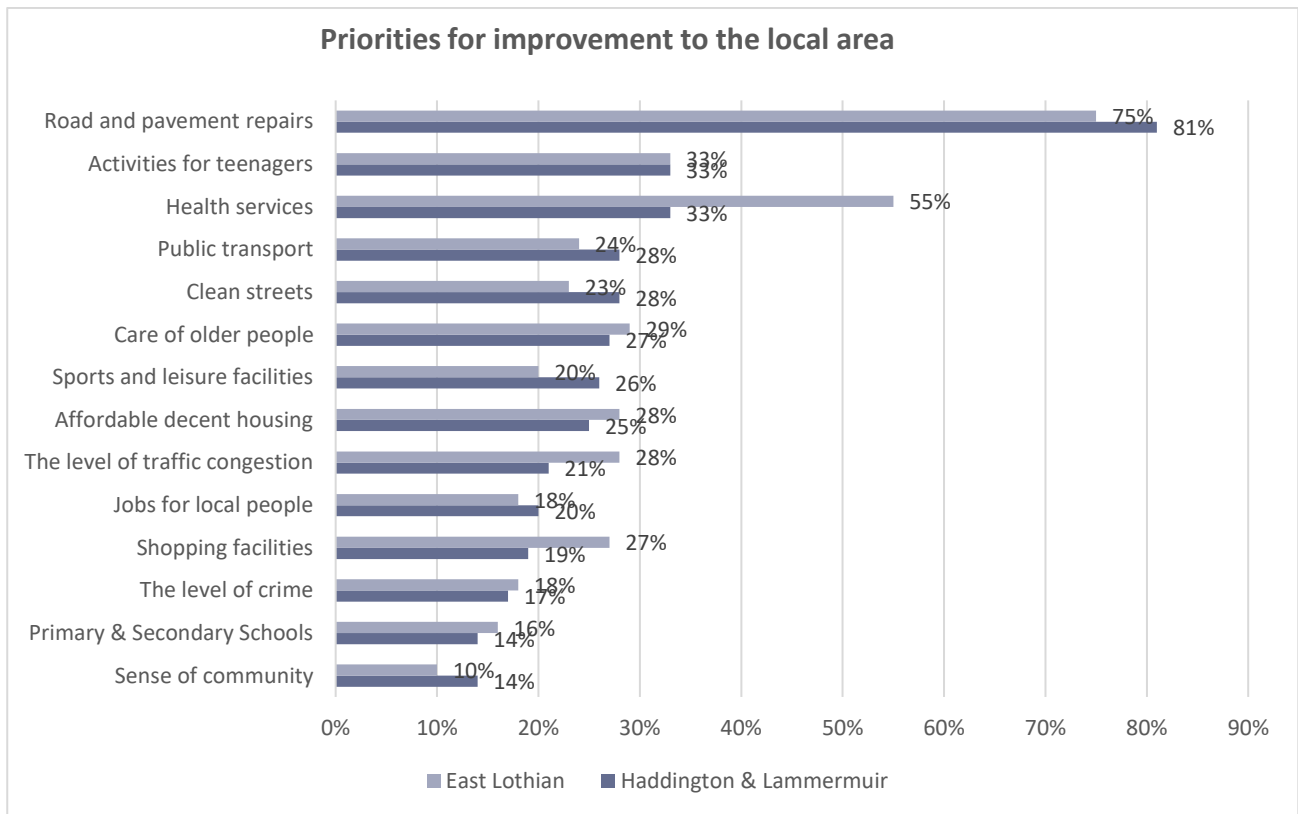


Figure 18 below shows that road and pavement repairs was the top priority for improvement in this ward and across East Lothian as a whole.

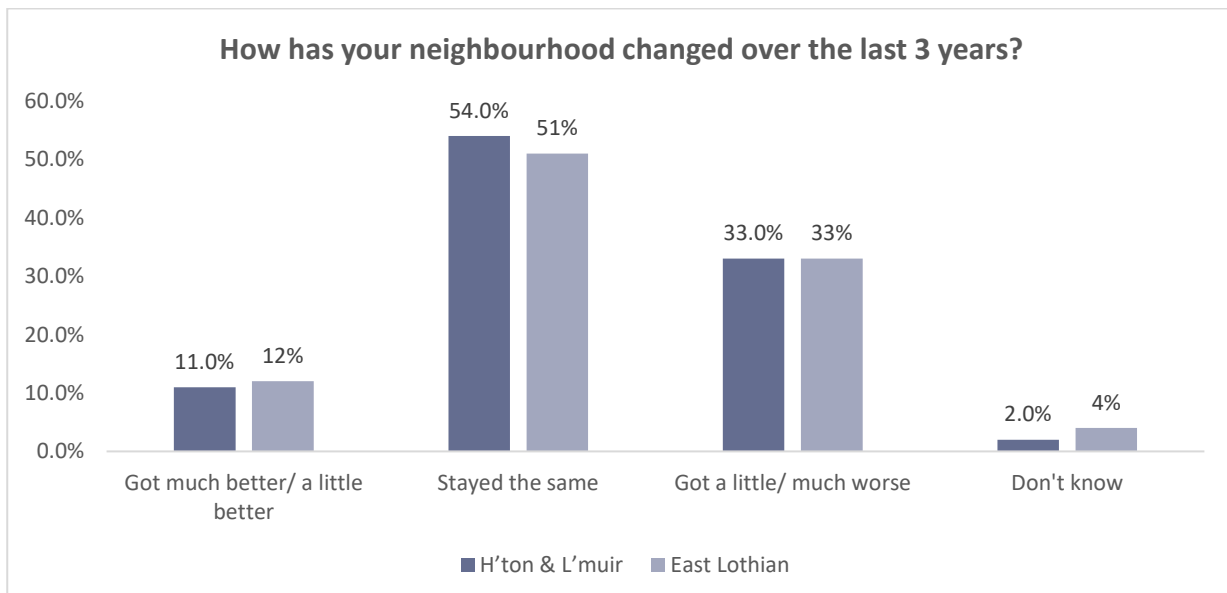
There were large differences in some areas with 55% of East Lothian residents stating health services was a priority compared to 33% in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward.

Figure 19 - Perceived change in local neighbourhoods (East Lothian Residents Survey 2024)

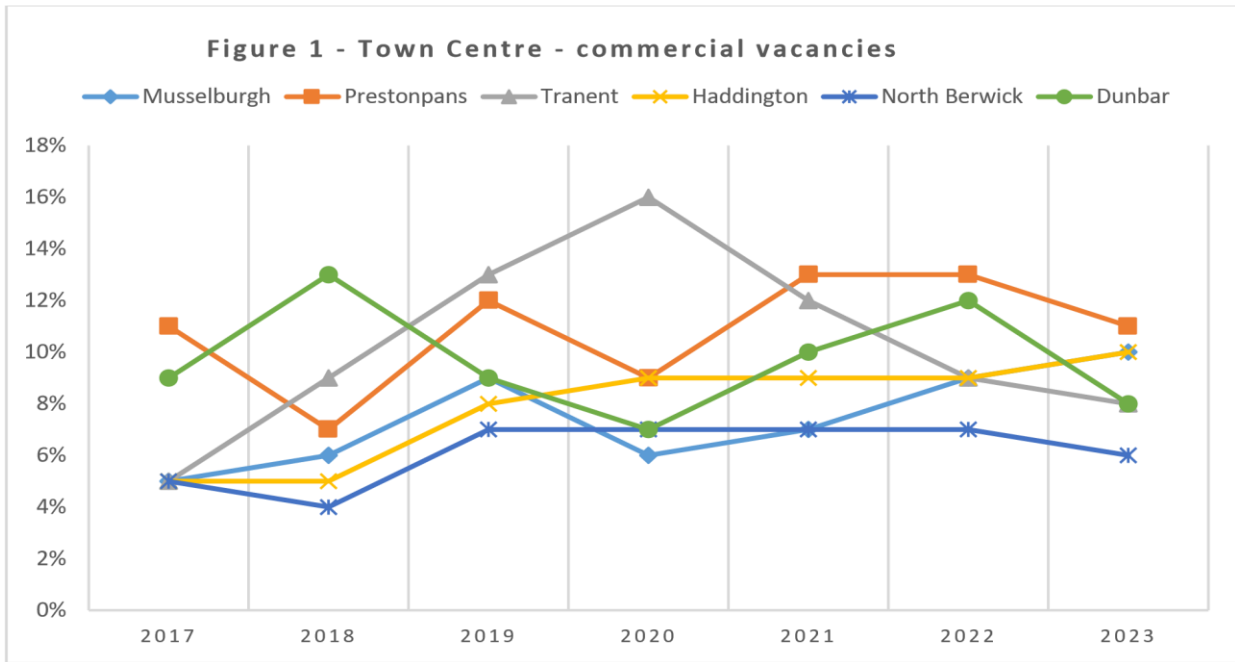


Local High Streets

Each of East Lothian’s wards is centred around a main town which is expected to provide retail and other key services to the community.

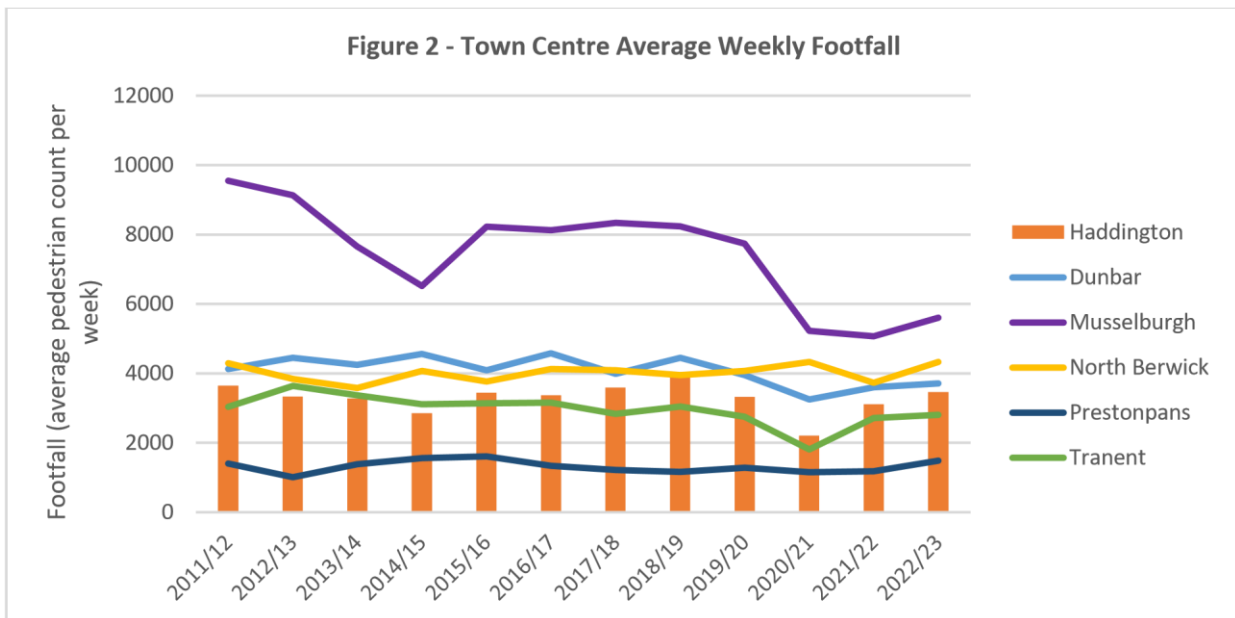
Vacancy rates (measured as a percentage of available retail units in the area) are a key indicator of the 'health' of local High Streets.

Figure 21 - Town Centre Footfall (Local Development Plan 2 – Town Centres and Retailing Issue No.16 East Lothian Council)

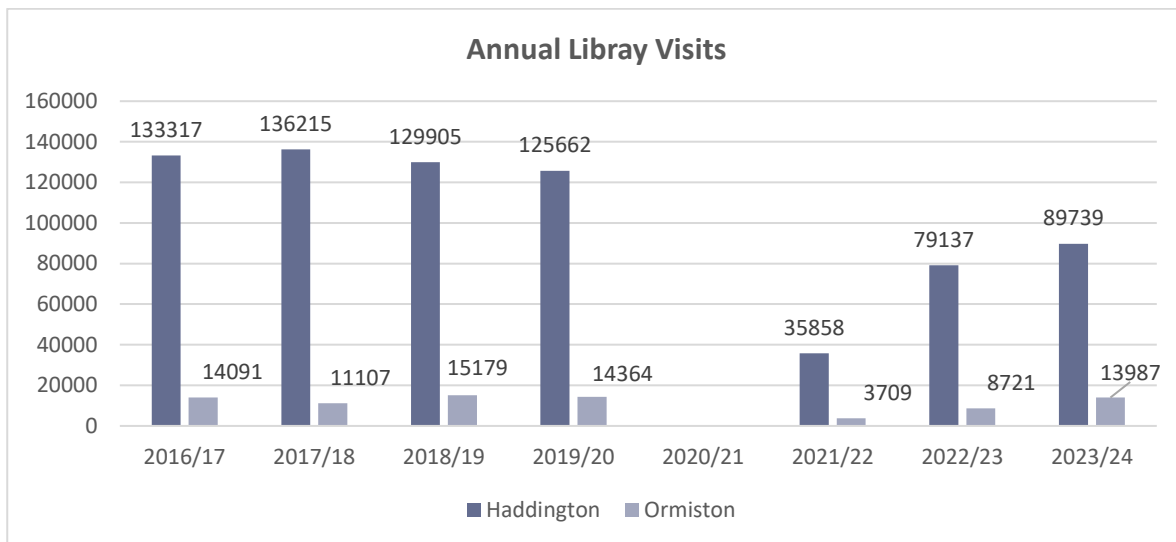


Library Visits

The John There are two East Lothian Council Libraries located in the Haddington & Lammermuir ward. East Lothian Council’s usage figures show that:

- Despite increasing over the last 3 years, visits to Haddington Library are well below the pre covid levels, with the 89,739 visits in 2023/24 being 29% lower than the 125,662 in 2019/20.
- Visits to Ormiston Library also increased over the last 3 years, with the 13,987 visits in 2023/24 only 3% lower than the 14,364 visits in 2019/20.

Figure 22 - Annual Library visits (East Lothian Council)

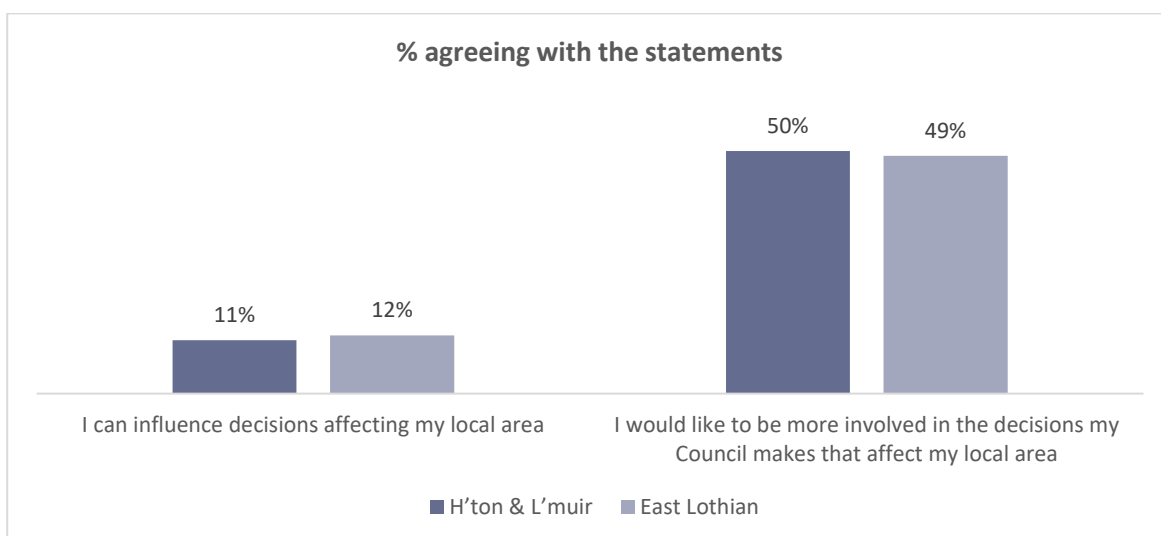


Participating in Decisions

Figure 23 - Involvement in Local Decision Making (East Lothian Residents Survey 2024)



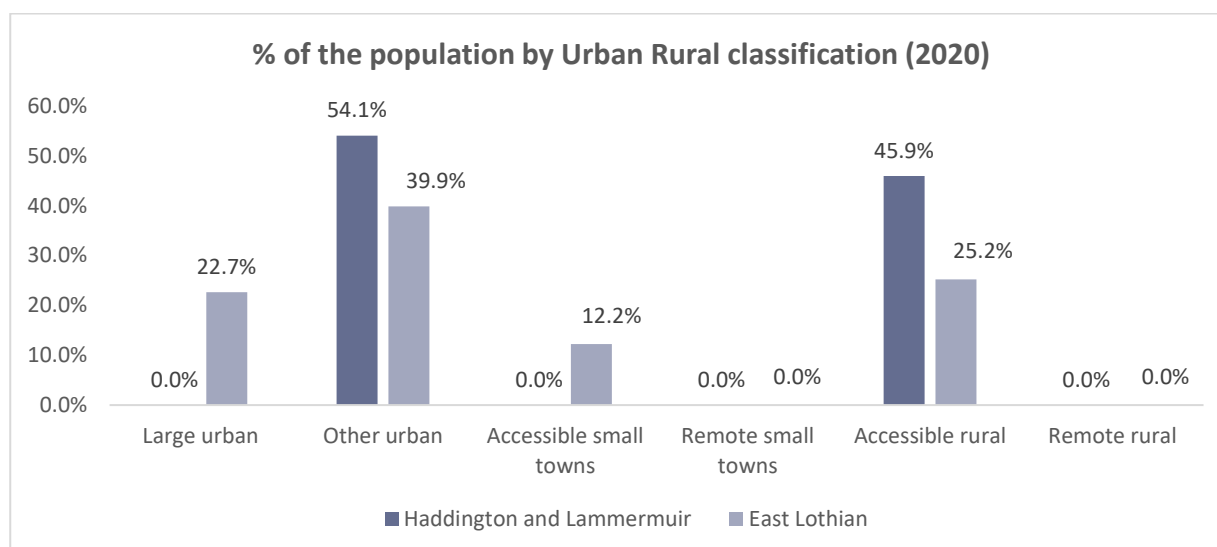
Housing

HEADLINES – Housing

- There were 8,847 dwellings in this ward, equal to 18.1% of the total number of dwellings across East Lothian.
- The Haddington & Lammermuir ward has a higher proportion of detached and semi detached housing when compared to East Lothian and Scotland.
- Median house prices in this ward were below the East Lothian average.
- More houses in this ward had four or more bedrooms when compared to East Lothian as a whole.

Figure 24 – Urban/Rural Classification (Scottish Government Statistics)



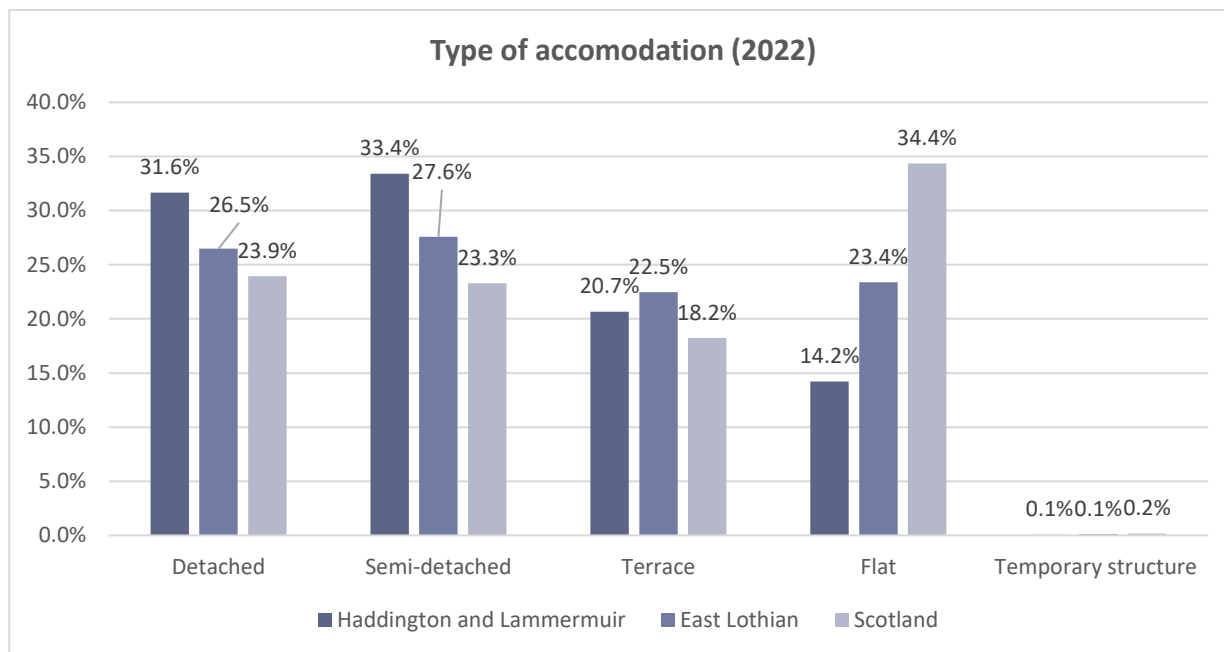

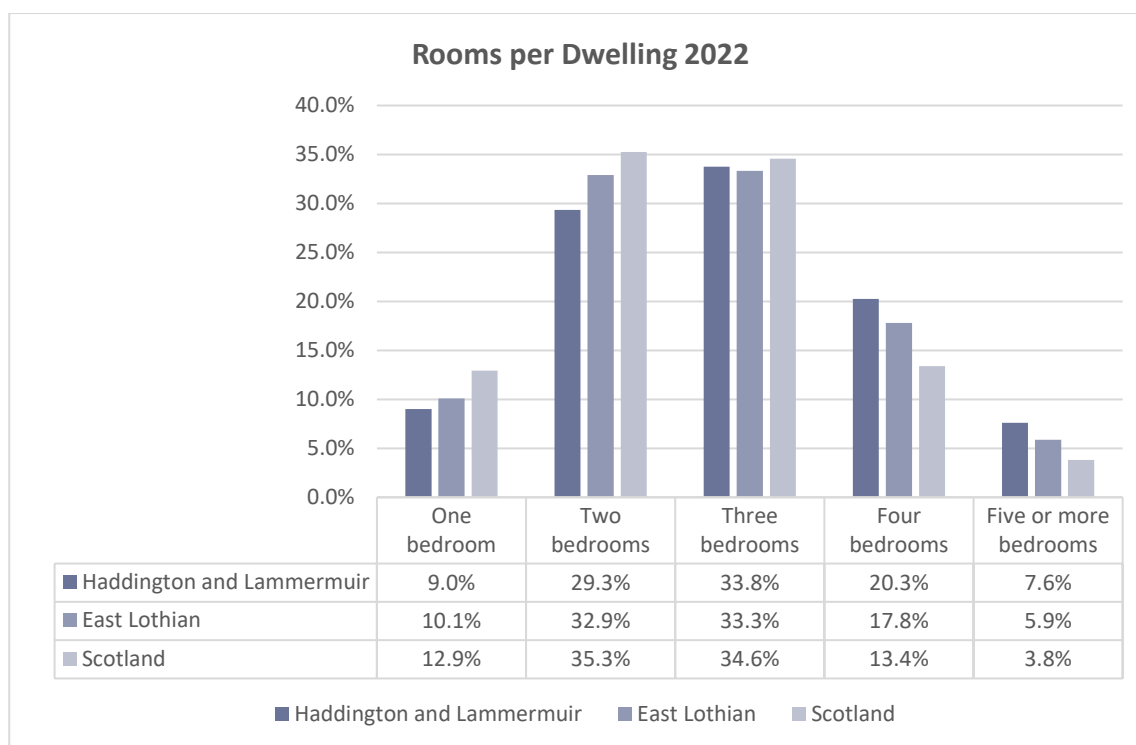

Figure 26 - Number of Rooms per Dwelling (Scotland's census 2022)

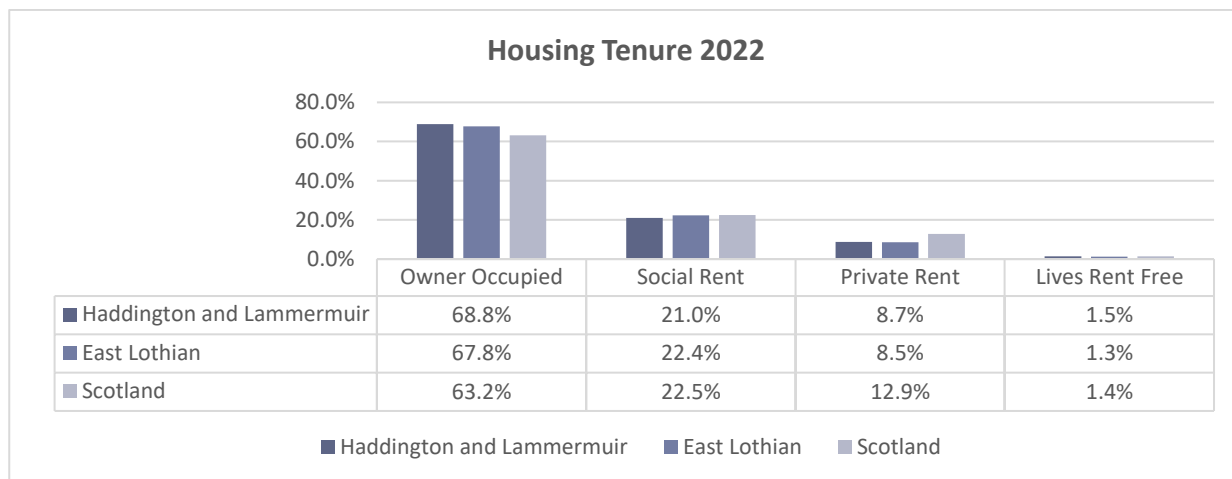

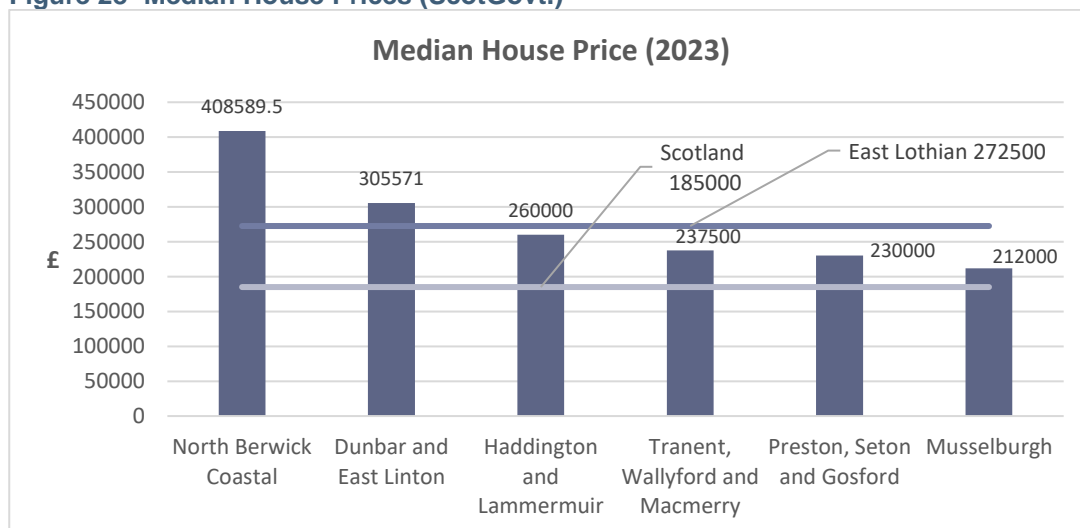

Figure 28 -Median House Prices (ScotGovt.)

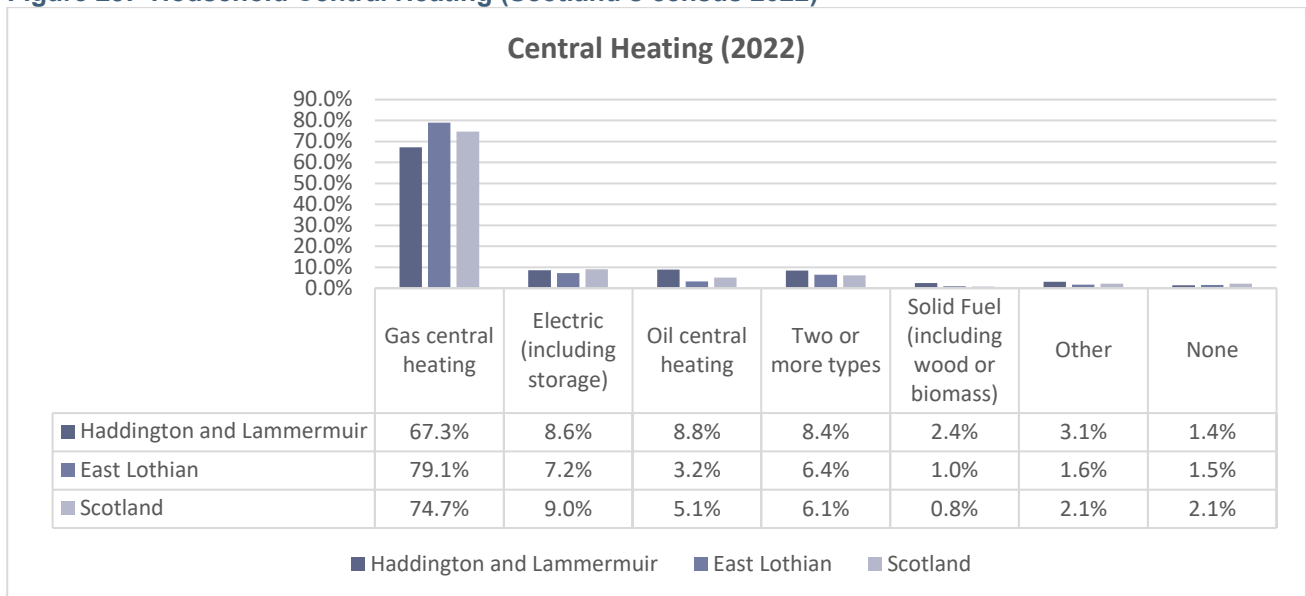

Fuel Poverty

A household is considered to be in fuel poverty if :

- More than 10% (20% for extreme fuel poverty) of net income is required to pay for their reasonable fuel needs after housing costs have been deducted.
- The remaining household income is not enough to maintain an acceptable standard of living, defined as at least 90% of the UK Minimum Income Standard (MIS) once childcare costs and disability or care benefits are deducted.

The Fuel Poverty (Targets, Definition and Strategy) (Scotland) Act 2019 made provisions for 2040 fuel poverty targets:

- no more than 5% of households in Scotland are in fuel poverty
- no more than 1% of households in Scotland are in extreme fuel poverty
- the median fuel poverty gap of households in Scotland in fuel poverty is no more than £250 adjusted in accordance with section 5(5) to take account of changes in the value of money

Properties in rural areas are less energy efficient than those in an urban area with 65.8% banded EPC D or below. Properties in rural areas are less likely to be on the gas grid, reducing their energy efficiency and increasing their energy bills. 36% of homes in 'accessible rural areas' are off the mains gas grid and 13.2% of households are heated with oil.

22% of households in the Haddington & Lammermuir Area Partnership classed as being fuel poor, lower than the 24% for East Lothian and Scotland. Nationally households within the private rented (37%) and social rented sectors (38%) have far higher levels of fuel poverty than owner occupiers (16%). Fuel poverty affects 22% of households in the Musselburgh Area Partnership.

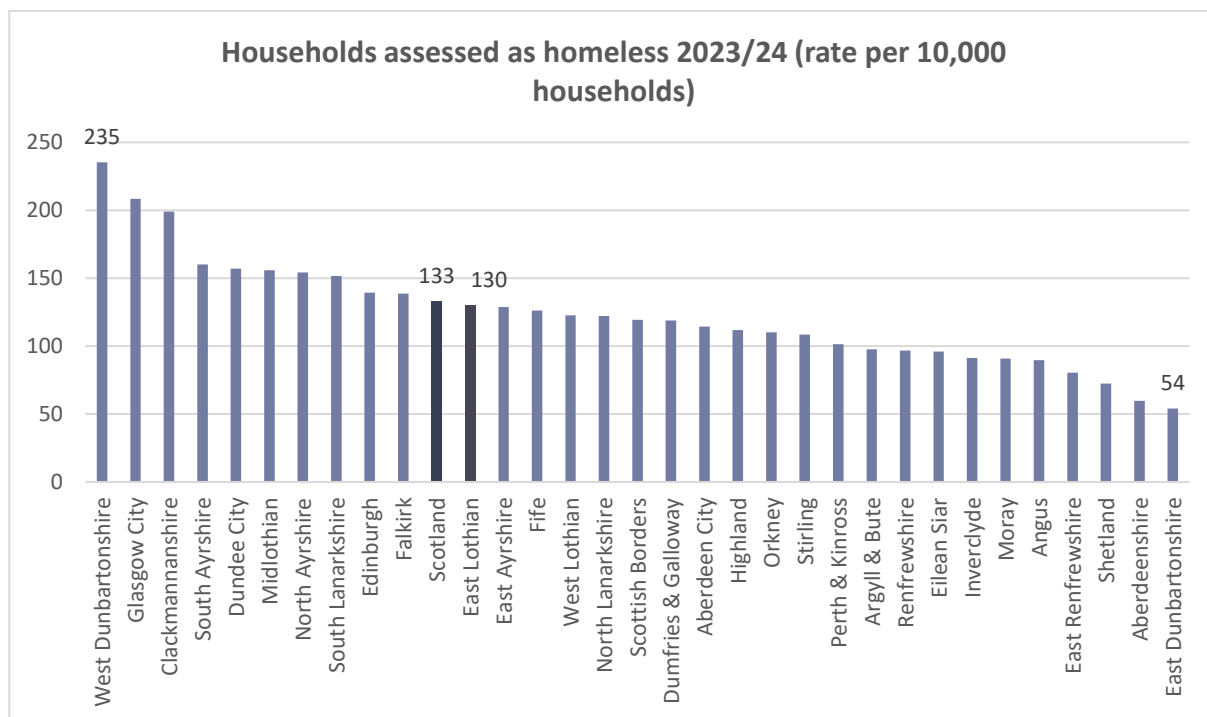

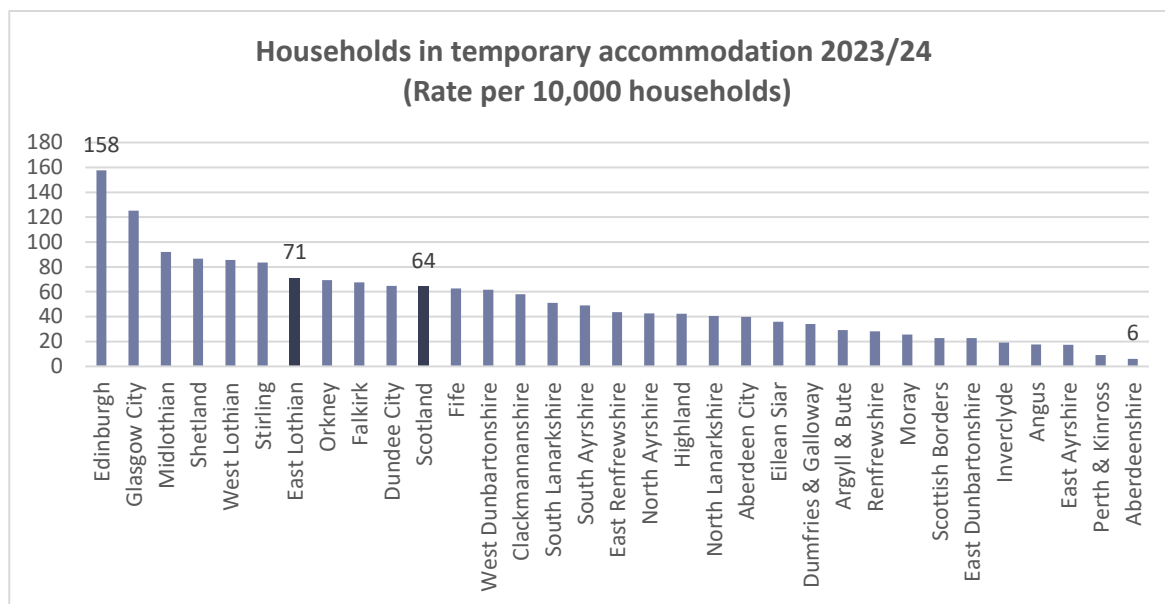
Figure 30- Households assessed as homeless per 10,000 households (Scot.Gov)

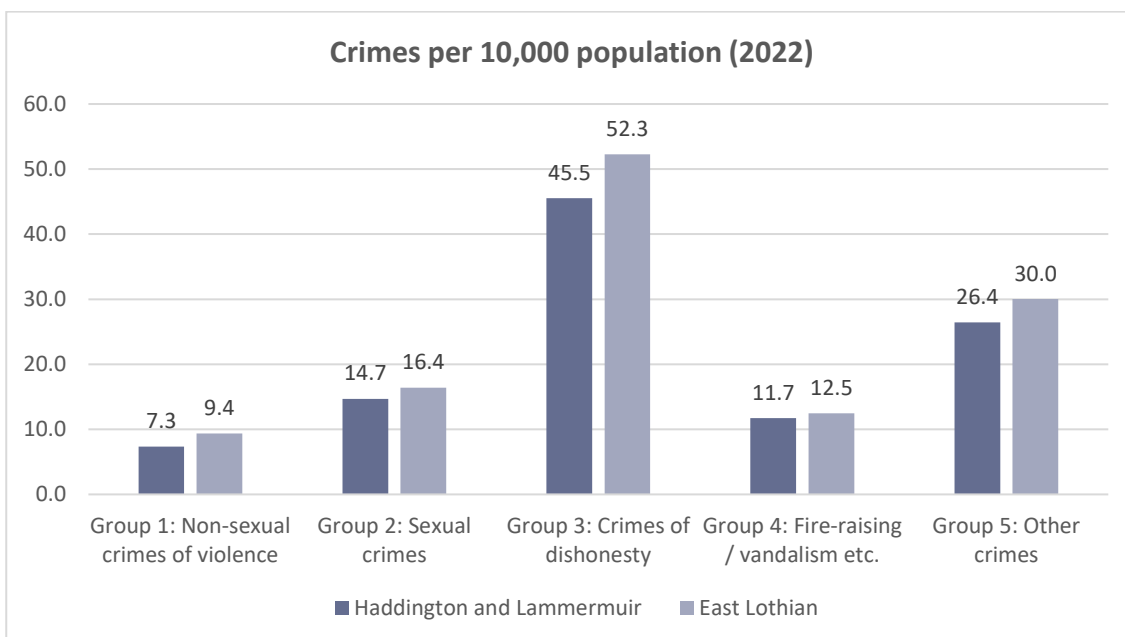

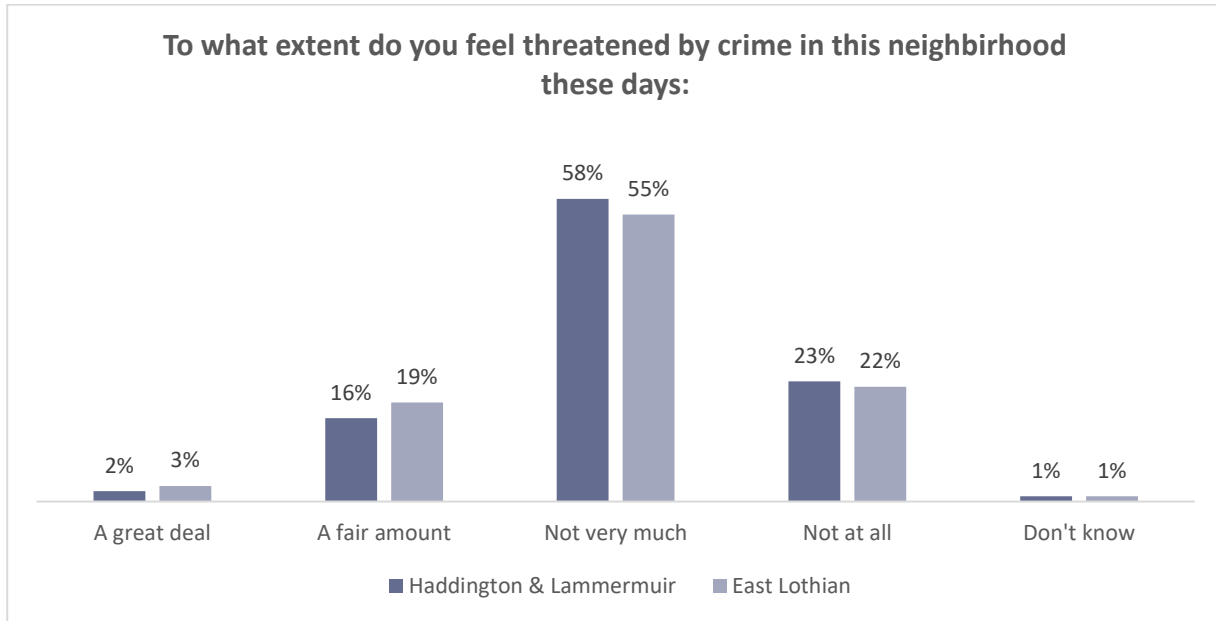

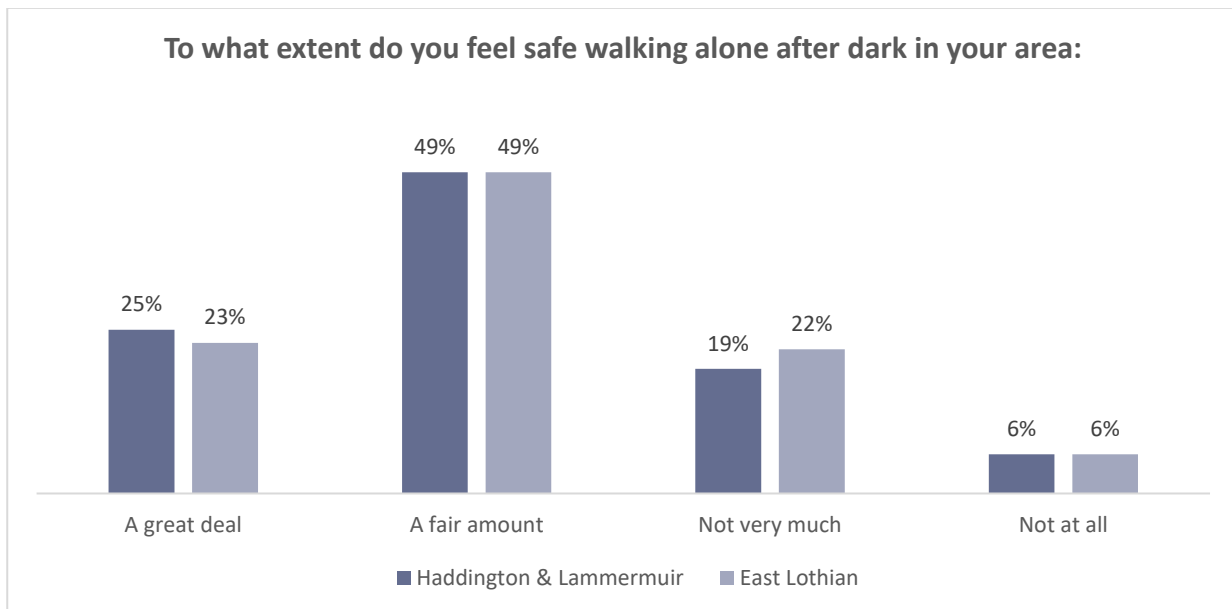

Figure 33 – Perceived Threat of Crime in Local Neighbourhoods (East Lothian Residents Survey 2024)



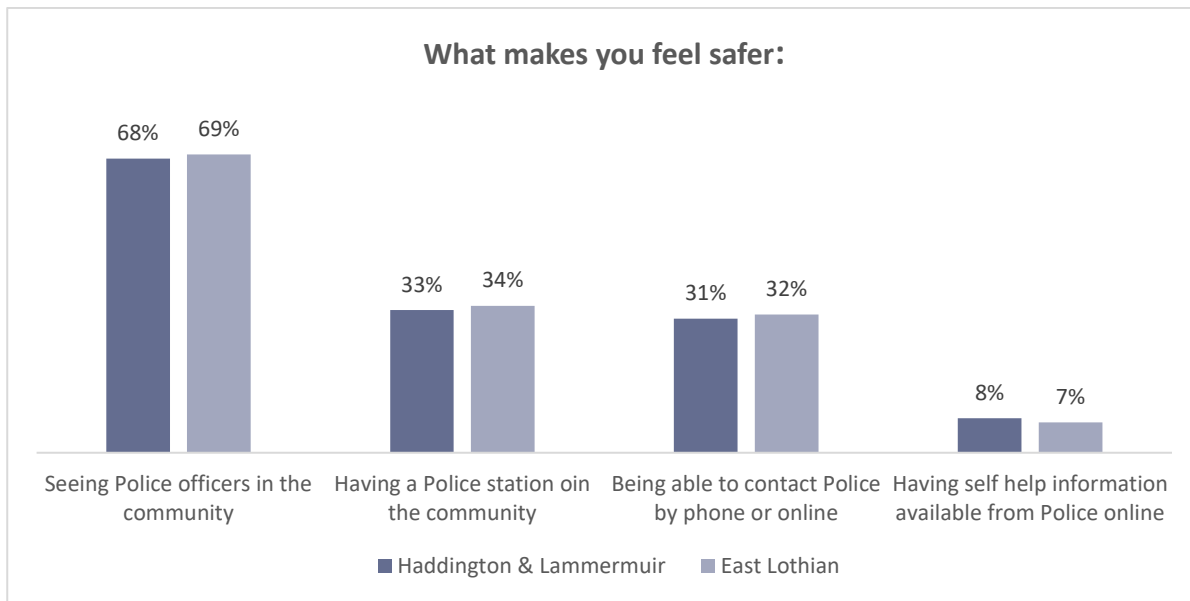

Figure 35 – What makes you feel safer (East Lothian Residents Survey 2024)



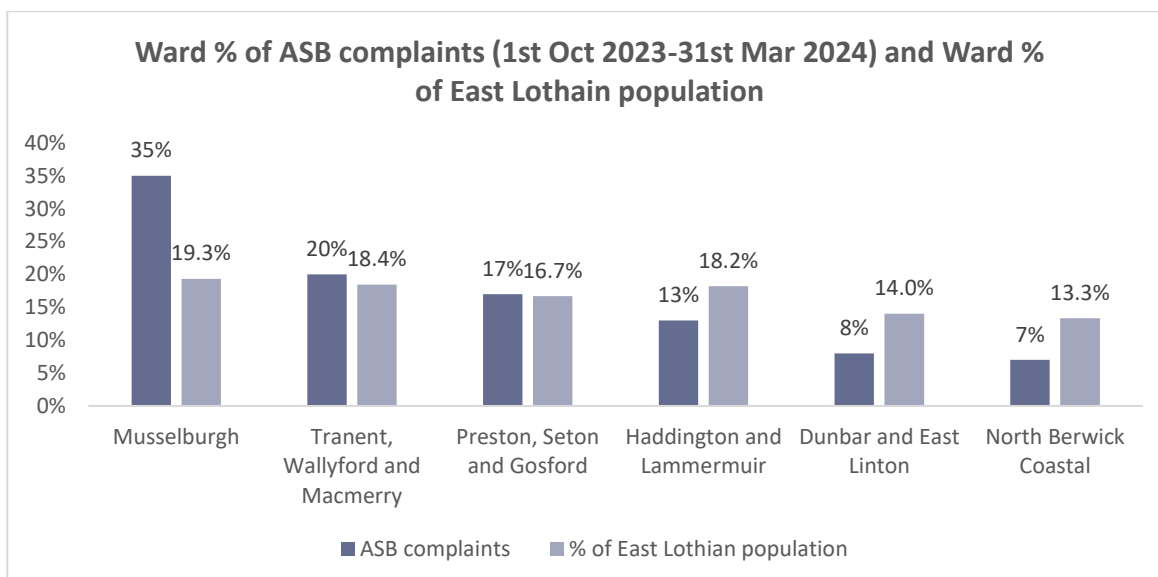
Anti-Social Behaviour

Anti-social behaviour (ASB) covers a range of incidents reported to the police and East Lothian Council’s ASB Hotline.

Across all wards there was a total of 876 ASB complaints to the council during the period 01/10 2023 to 31/03/2024, 48% were in relation to noise, 14% youths, 11% drug misuse and 27% other.

The ward breakdown in Figure 37 shows that Musselburgh had a higher % of complaints relative to its share of the East Lothian population, with Haddington & Lammermuir, Dunbar & East Linton and North Berwick Coastal having a lower percentage of complaints.

Figure 36- ASB Complaints by ward (East Lothian Council) and population (Scotland’s Census 2022)

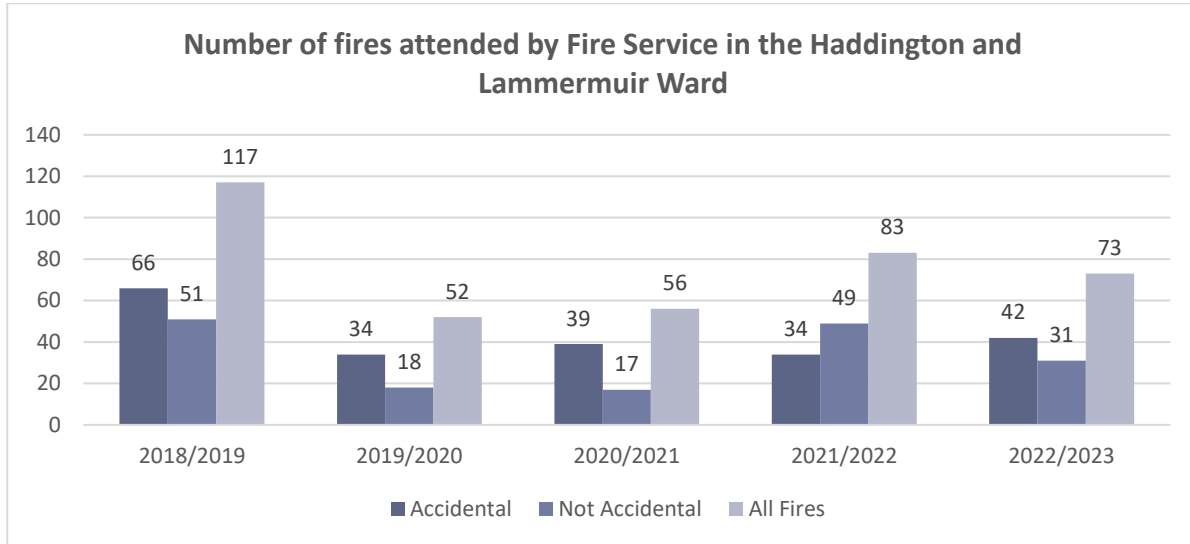


Fire incidences across the ward

Across East Lothian around 100 uniformed and support staff are employed by the Fire and Rescue Service within 6 community fire stations based at Musselburgh, East Linton, North Berwick, Tranent, Dunbar and Haddington.

- Figure 37 shows that the number of fires in this ward decreased during Covid, largely due to a decrease in non accidental fires. The figures for 2022/23 are lower than pre Covid levels.

Figure 37 - Incidences requiring Fire Service attendance (Scot Govt)

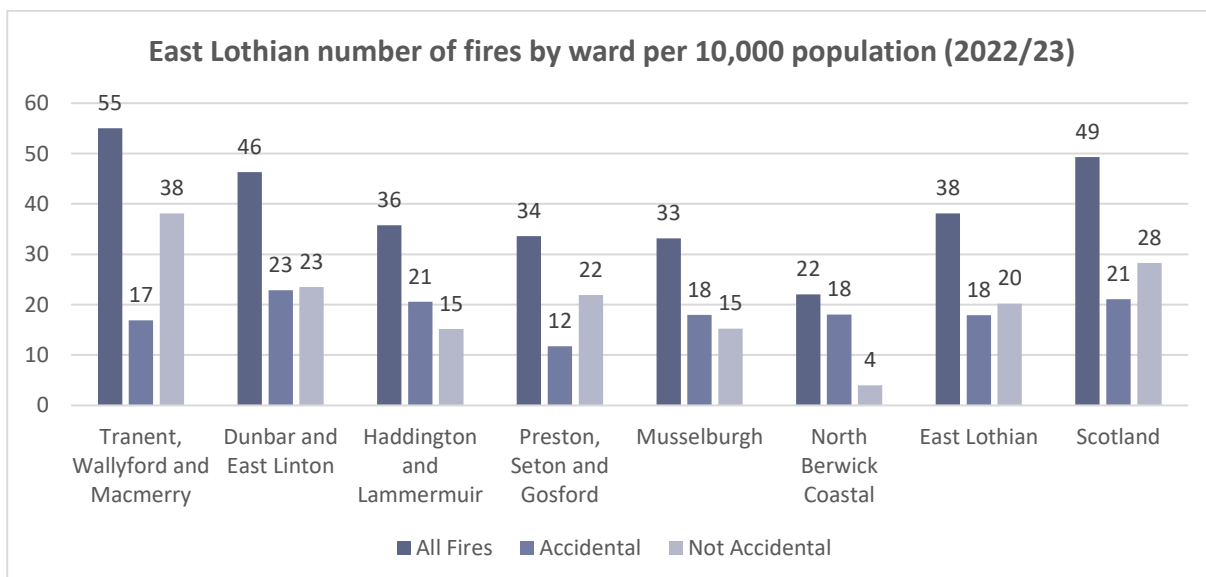

Figure 39 – Do you have a car/light van in household? (East Lothian Residents Survey 2021)

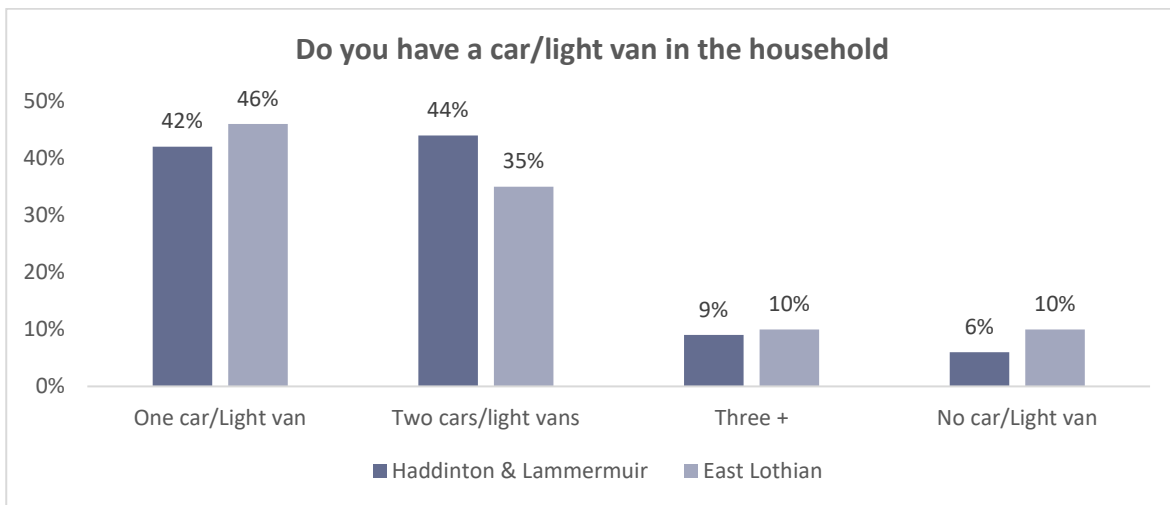
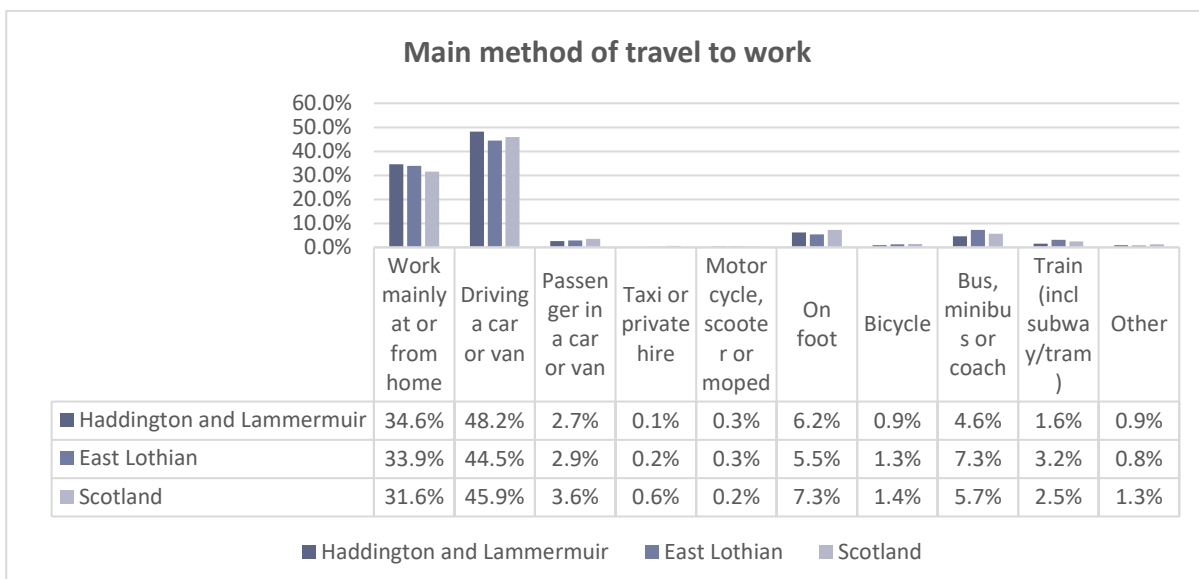

Figure 40 - Main Method of Commuting to Work (Scotland's census 2022)

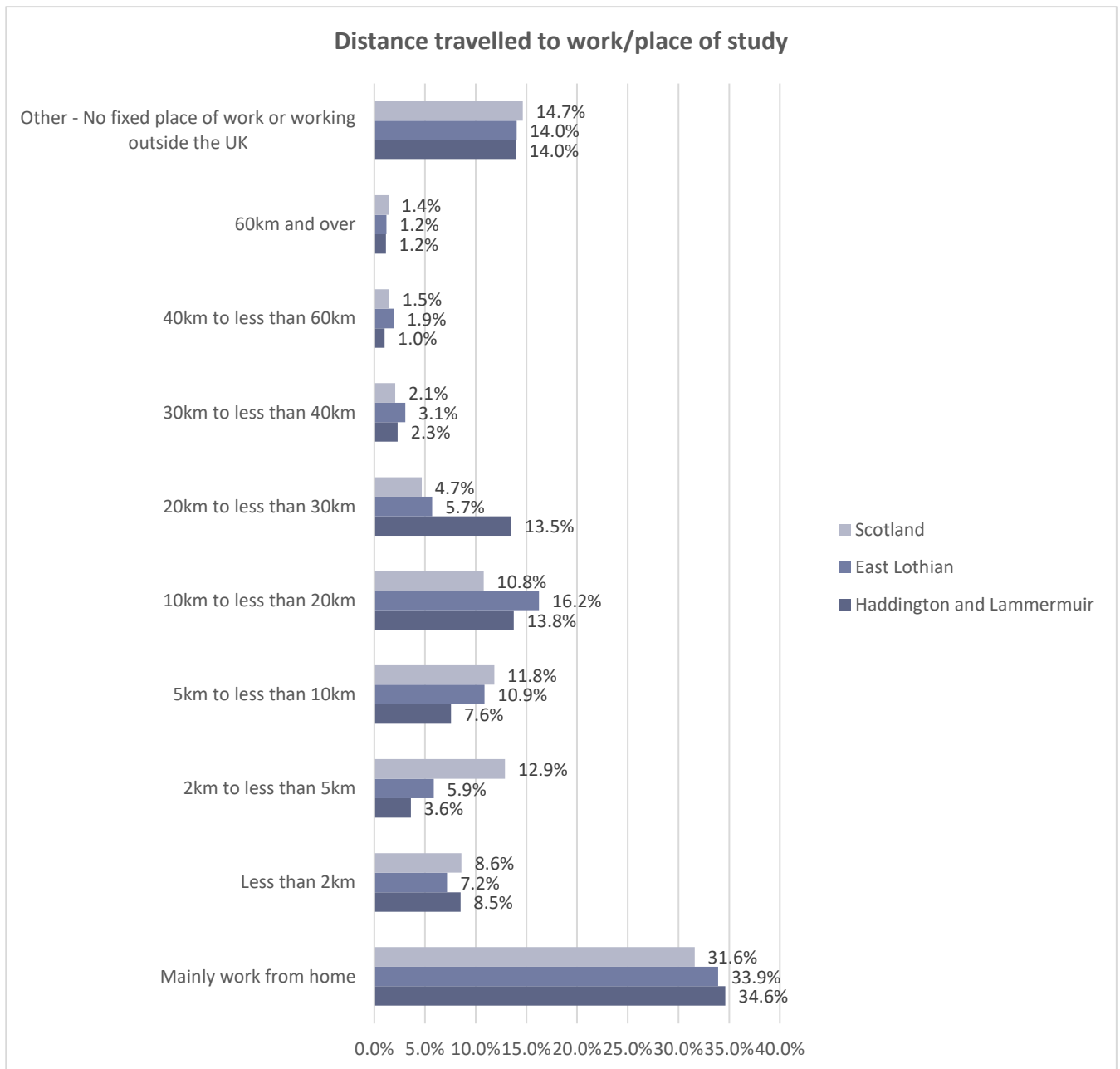

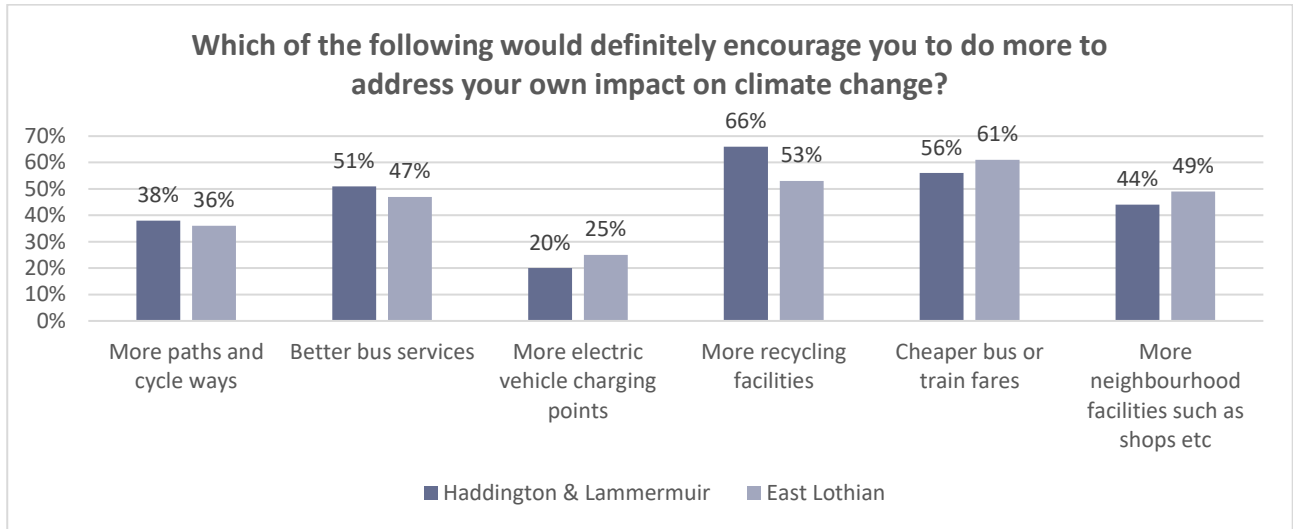

Figure 42 – Satisfaction with parks, gardens and open spaces in East Lothian (East Lothian Residents Survey 2024)

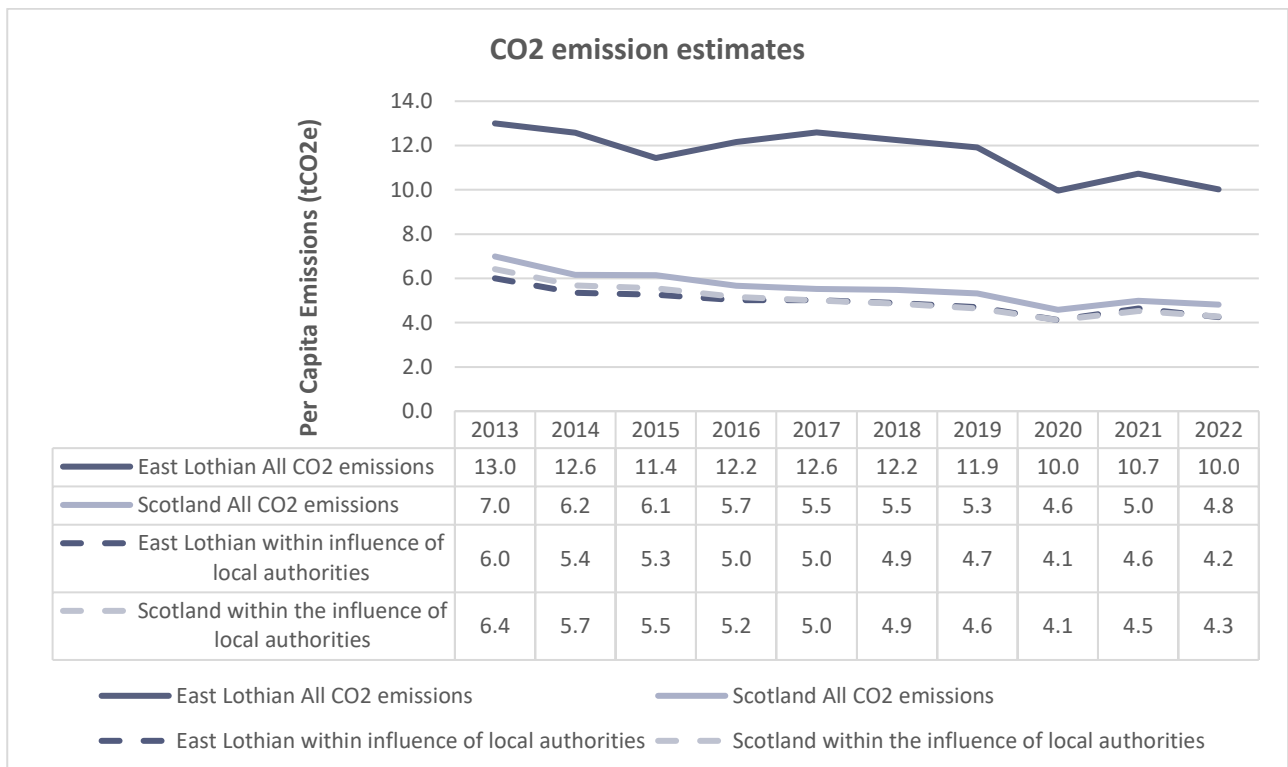


CO2 Emissions

The Figure 43 shows that, in East Lothian between 2013 and 2022 there was a 23% decrease in the overall CO2 emissions, compared to a Scottish decrease of 31%. The East Lothian figure is consistently higher than the Scottish rate for areas that do not fall under the influence of East Lothian Council.

For areas that are within the influence of the Council, East Lothian has a similar level to that of Scotland. The East Lothian rate fell by 29% between 2013 and 2022, compared to 33% across Scotland as a whole.

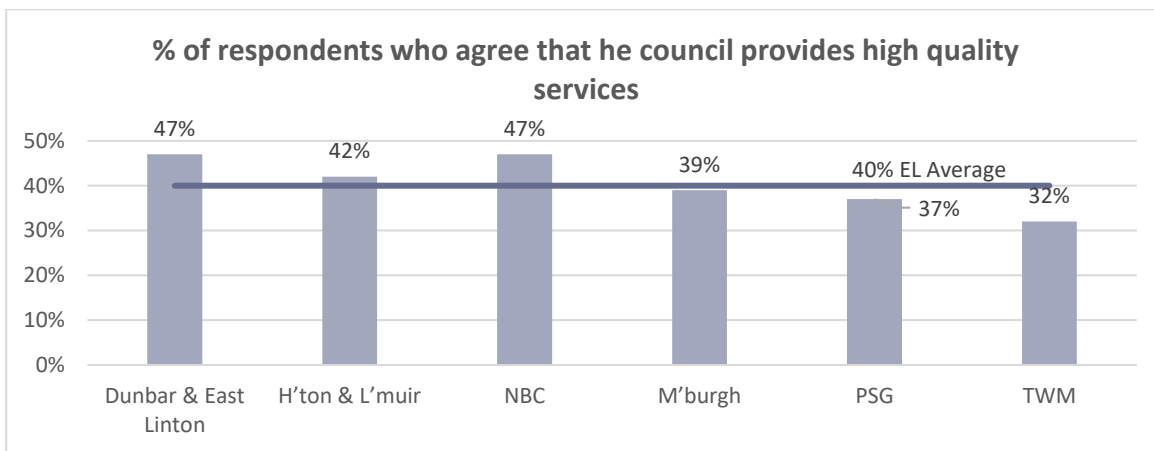

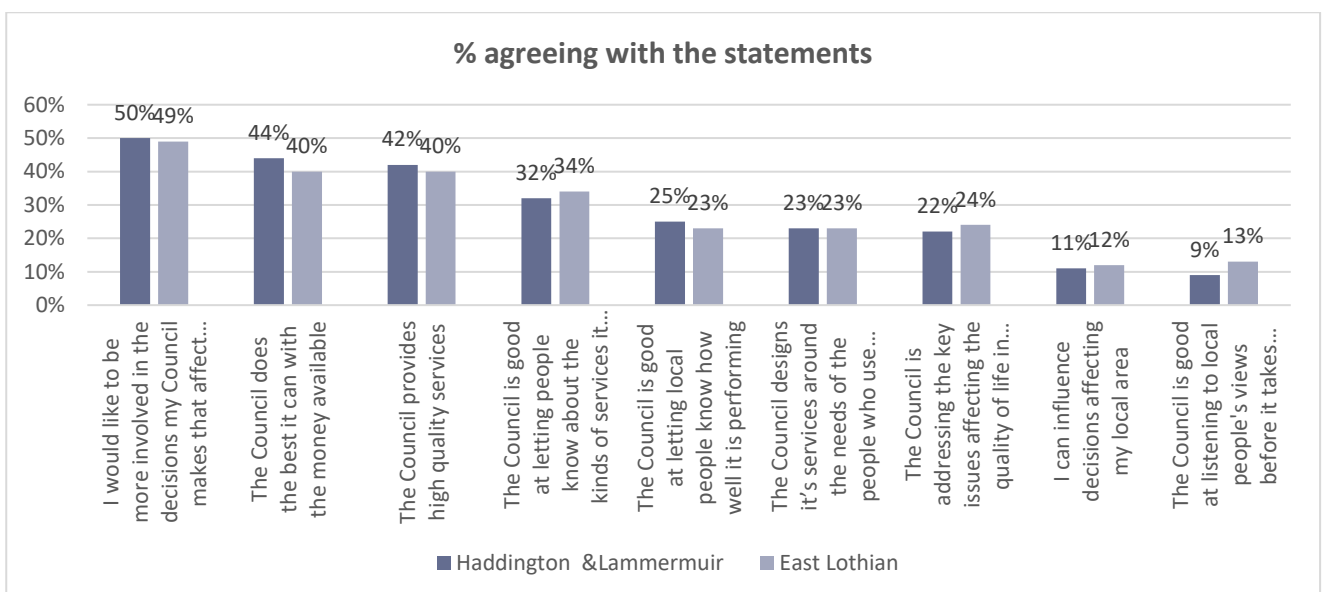
