EAST LoTHIAN POVERTY COMMISSION REPORT PROPOSED RECOMMENDATIONS

Dear Member,

As you may be aware the Musselburgh Area Partnership recently held a “special meeting” with a view to providing us with a view of poverty within our community.

The meeting was well attended and was delivered through the attendance of key stakeholders with a remit for poverty in East Lothian. Whilst there was much discussion and information delivered the first step forward is to examine the recommendations outlined in the report.

The 54 recommendations outlined in the East Lothian Poverty Commission Report have been reviewed with a view to highlighting the recommendations which the Musselburgh Area Partnership may be able to influence, contribute to or act on through its work and remit.

This has been done to aide our integration of poverty into our work by streamlining the recommendations from the full report to the ones that potentially we have a realistic opportunity of achieving.

The following table highlights the key headings of the report along with the 18 reviewed recommendations.

The column headed score is to allow members to apply a score from 1 -18 to highlight their order of preference. By adding all the scores for each recommendation, we can place them in an order of priority which may assist us move forward.

This is in no way a decided option but a starting point to help us move forward in the right direction and members may feel that other recommendations in the full report may also be worthy of consideration.

I would therefore ask you to consider the table below and apply your score along with any comments you may wish to make, but also feel free to make your views known on any other recommendations you feel you wish included.

Organisational leaders need to share and speak about their vision for a fairer and more equal East Lothian gaining full organizational buy-in to achieving real change	The Musselburgh Area Partnership should embed this in its plan as a matter of course to ensure we endeavour to tackle this issue at every opportunity		

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9.2 - The Partnership needs to consider its response to the Community Empowerment Act to enable further involvement of local communities including the development of Participatory Budgeting and Human Rights based budgeting at the highest level and also at Local Area Partnership level	This is something that we are looking at but need to ensure that the Musselburgh Area Partnership are fully aware.
