3 BACKGROUND

- 3.1 On 21st January 2020 Cabinet approved commencement of the statutory procedures necessary to close Johnnie Copes Road to vehicular traffic and redetermine as an active travel route
- 3.2 Statutory and public consultation took place between 23rd January and 24th March 2023.
- 3.3 No objections were received from statutory stakeholders. 152 responses were received during the public consultation of which 5 were supportive and 147 objecting. These are listed at Appendix 1 and 2 (attached).
- 3.4 A summary of the responses together with comments is contained within the Council report for the meeting on 27th June 2023.

To who it may concern,

I would make the following comments and observations on this consultation.

This is an unclassified road which should have been closed when it was first proposed around 1986 or so. The fact that it was wasn't was probably down to political expediency at the time more than anything else. It is now for our current elected members to decide whether to proceed with closure or not. I wish them well in their deliberations.

I ceased driving on this road many years ago as it is clearly not fit for purpose on the southern section (Tranent side). It is far safer to drive to Prestonpans by using the established route the B6371 or alternatively the A199 to Wallyford roundabout and the B1361 eastwards which puts negligible time on your journey.

Pedestrian use of the Johnny Cope road would be enhanced if its closure were to go ahead. It can hazardous, especially crossing the bridge straddling the A1.The existing footpaths also leave a lot to be desired.

There is evidence that much of the traffic driving to Tranent from Prestonpans on this road are using it to access the A1 dual carriageway at Dolphinstone junction thereby avoiding Wallyford. There is also the fact traffic turning right on to the road from the A199 heading to Prestonpans can be potentially a dangerous manoeuvre and needs to be negotiated with care.

It would be also interesting to hear how many reportable accidents have occurred since 1986 in respect of any case for closure.

I suggest the following options for the East Lothian council to consider.

Option A Status Quo

Option B Closure as proposed

Option C Full Upgrade of the existing road, footpaths and new traffic lights at the existing bridge over the A1.

Option D Consider making the road one way, either North to South or vice versa with appropriate safety measures put in place.

On balance and taking everything into consideration I support option B

I am writing in support of the proposal to close Johnnie Cope's Road.

As a narrow road, with tight bends and with a pinch point on the A1 bridge, it is not especially attractive to walk or to cycle. Crossing the bridge can be a particular problem as the forward sightlines are poor and a cyclist meeting a vehicle will be tightly squeezed. If it was closed off to through traffic, it would become an attractive and safe rural lane for cycling and walking, giving connections to the paths to Meadowmill and the Brickworks Rd as well as a route through to the quiet road along Fa'aside Hill. It would also provide a safe connection to Prestonpans rail station.

Further to your recent notice posted in the East Lothian Courier regarding the above I wish to object to the redetermination of this road on the following grounds.

1) Emergency service vehicles access to residential properties at Bankton.

I find it very difficult to understand how such vehicles would have rapid access to these properties in the event of an emergency.

There are quite a few high buildings around Bankton House and Steading which in the event of a fire would require the use of a high lift appliance to fight the fire. This would definitely put people's lives at risk!

I have been informed by a local paramedic that ambulances from outlying areas may need to cover Prestonpans area when local ambulances are attending elsewhere, would they have gate keys?

Have the emergency services been contacted to ascertain how such a system would operate?

2) If you are telling us that the road is being redetermined due to road safety where can I find the information that supports this case? ie road usage/ bridge weight restrictions/ accident statistics.

There are other (older)bridges in East Lothian which were not designed to carry modern vehicles and why have they not been closed?

3) Closing this road to vehicular traffic will prevent people on the south of this bridge (namely Tranent) from accessing the railway station. At the same time this traffic would need to use the Blindwells road thereby adding to increased traffic usage on this road.

4)Sceptic tanks at Bankton require emptying at regular intervals by tanker vehicles. How would the system operate to allow these vehicles to gain access in a timeous manner?

Objection to the closure of The Johnnie Cope Road, Prestonpans East Lothian

To all those that this concerns, East Lothian Councillors – ELC Council officers – ELC Council Legal department - Scottish secretary of state for Transport.

I herby object to the intended closure by ELC of The Johnnie Cope Road in Prestonpans – Tranent

The Councils officers stated reasons for closing this road have changed numerous times over the last few weeks and months - their original reason being that this was an administrative oversight from the mid 1980's is completely and utterly irrelevant from where we are today. They then change their stance on more than one occasion from (it's not a well-used road to then it has too much traffic) you really can't make this nonsense up. to where we are now being fed the completely <u>unsubstantiated</u> "by which I mean they have given absolutely no evidence to back up this drivel that the bridge over the A1 was not intended to carry such volume of traffic as it does today". However, the council officers state that its original intended use as a farm access road for moving of agricultural equipment such as tractors and combine harvesters.(Again, it is irrelevant what the original use was for, as the fact is its used significantly by locals as a daily commuting access route.

So here are the dimensions and importantly the weight of a claas Lexion 480 combine harvester

length: 10,25 m, width: 3,9 m (without header), height: 3,87 m (with cab), weight: 14000 kg (without header), drive wheels: 800/65R32 (front), swivel wheels: 600/55-26,5 (rear)

So, the council officers are stating that the bridge isn't suitable for the average 1,200kg car of which you could only ever get three on the bridge at a time but is more than suitable for the 14,000kg combine Harvester to go back and forth on. I do hope whoever is reading this - clearly sees the point I'm making and the absurdity of the claim by said officers. The very notion that transport Scotland would have put a bridge over such an important main road as the A1 and somehow make it inferior to any other bridge over the A1 is frankly just nonsense just as is the claims of intended/unintended use, if you use their own figures.

With the council's own figures saying approximately 1153 use the road daily which is incidentally one of only 2 roads that link Prestonpans with Tranent something that seems to be being conveniently ignored, the majority of which is at peak traffic times, either to access the railway station from Tranent or to the A1 slip road on Brickworks Road from Prestonpans without going through the heavily congested Blindwells route or all the way through an ever expanding and busy Wallyford.

So there has been no consultation with the community councils about whether this road should close there has been no consultation with the residents and businesses who live and work on The Johnnie Cope road to address their rightful concerns regarding access for Emergency vehicles (The Councils stated position of giving the emergency services a key for the intended gates either side of the bridge is utterly preposterous. One can only imaging the need for a fire engine with a high ladder that can only come in from Brickworks Road saying to one another – have you got the key – and the reply – naw I thought you had it—Seriously !

So, let's get to the crunch of why the Council are really wanting to close this road. MONEY £

The wilful neglect by the different Councils over many years to allow the road to become in the state that it is in now and therefore, the need to spend the relevant amount to properly bring this road up to standard is the real reason behind all this smoke and mirrors about this that and the other. A manipulation of the reasons given and the consequences of years neglect, do not make this look good on the present Council, they have been ill advised by officers that this is merely a administrative delay in the implementation of an order from 35 years ago.

Remember Councils/Councillors are elected to serve their communities interests and not their own.

The Council have stated that the want this to become a pedestrian/cycle route but we have one already in place running almost parallel to it, its called the Heugh.

Yes, the local community understands the councils tight fiscal responsibilities but we have just been given a 7% rise in council tax a reduction in refuse collection and new charges for brown bin collections as well as changes to other services. But here's the thing East Lothian is massively expanding - there are new developments going up all over the place including thousands between Tranent, Blindwells, Prestonpans and Wallyford and with them comes huge revenue for the coffers at the Council through taxation.

This consultation must result in this decision being brought back to a full Council meeting to review the status of this well used local road and review the funding for bringing this road and its improvements forward.

Hi

I'd like to register my objection to the closure of the above road. This road is a necessary and vital link between Tranent and Prestonpans. The excessive house building across East Lothian is making travel increasingly difficult in the area and this road provides a vital link to

Prestonpans train station which seems extremely short sighted at a time when the council is trying to get people onto public transport.

The councils reason of safety for the closing the road also makes no sense. If the bridge really is dangerous then why is it not closed already? What evidence/testing proves this safety concern? The closure of the road is a much bigger safety concern, particularly for any disabled passengers trying to reach the platform on the Tranent side of the station and for the people who live between the bridge and the station car park who would have no choice but to use the regularly flooded road under the train line which also has poor access/a blind corner.

I use the road at least 5 times a week and nearly always see other traffic on the road so it is very well used. If the purpose of the council is to serve the people who live here then I cannot see any argument for taking the road away and making peoples lives even harder.

The main issues with the road are the terrible state of the surface and the blind summit of the a1 bridge. The road could easily be fixed with proper resurfacing and maintenance and the bridge fixed with a set of traffic lights. Surely with the massive influx of council tax and developers funds arising from the thousands and thousands of new builds in the area the improvements to this vital link road are but a drop in the ocean.

I also think the council have handled this issue poorly. I have not been able to find any evidence of the safety concerns the council has or any details of traffic surveys carried out showing what the impact would be so therefore can only assume that these have not been carried out and that the council decision to close the road is based on nothing at all. That being the case I have to question the suitability of our council members for the position they hold if they don't even require facts to base decisions on.

I'd appreciate some common sense being applied to this process and the road to remain open and be improved for safer ongoing use.

I am writing to object against the closure of the Johnny Cope Road. I have to use this road 3-4 times a day in order to get to my Father in law to provide his care as he is severely disabled following a stroke a few years ago. I often receive calls from the Community Alarms Team to say he has had a fall and therefore have to jump in the car and get to my Father in law ASAP. If this road were to close, it would take me at least an extra 8-10 mins to get to him, not to mention the additional mileage and fuel costs incurred having to go either via Strawberry Corner or Blindwells. My Wife plays golf at the Royal Musselburgh, we use the shops at the bottom of Johnnie Cope Road, we use the vets there and also the train station frequently-closing this road adds time and cost to our daily lives.

The bigger picture would mean more fuel emissions as people will be having to drive much further to get between the two towns, not to mention heavy traffic placed on either alternative route-especially at peak travel times. You simply have to look at what happened recently when temporary traffic lights were put at Blindwells-the queues were massive so many more people used JCR to alleviate the pressure.

It would appear to me that this proposal is merely a cost cutting exercise from ELC but may I suggest that rather than fund projects in more favourable areas (North Berwick, Gullane), invest the money in our community-do something that would help OUR residents as well as the environment. Invest in traffic lights at the bridge, insert passing places and maintain the road properly.

I object to the proposed plan to make part of this road suitable for pedestrians, cyclists and certain vehicles only.

While I'd normally be happy to support such a path, there is a perfectly good one less than a mile to the east linking Tranent and Prestonpans, and indeed beyond to Cockenzie. It's been there since 1722.

I have found it necessary to use Johnnie Cope's road on many occasions when the B6371 has been subject to serious delays because of roadworks around Blindwells, or the infamous hole in

the road further north on the road. But many others will have bought houses, relying on the road to take them north, or to the railway station for speedy access to Edinburgh.

Its an ancient right of way and by putting gates across the road is blocking access for emergency vehicles. I believe they are being given a key to open the gates which is an issue in an emergency and a concern for the residents who if trapped in a fire in a 4 storeys building; ie Bankton House their lives could be put at risk.

The Johnnie Cope Road is one of two direct roads between Prestonpans and Tranent. It is a vital link to both villages and therefore must remain open.

Originally ELC based the redetermination on paperwork from 1986 but this is now 2023 and the area has been developed greatly with housing and a new village. At a time when East Lothian is growing and developing all roads are required especially the Johnnie Cope Road and it would be very foolish of East Lothian Council to close the road based on statistics from 1986.

The recent reason is now seemingly the Bridge over the A1 is unsafe.

This bridge is owned by Transport Scotland so why is East Lothian Council making a decision without a discussion with transport Scotland and without a structural engineers report or any evidence to say the bridge is unsafe. Transport Scotland would not build a unsafe bridge over the A1, I fear this is an excuse to close the road.

East Lothian council have neglected this road for years and have made it clear that it will cost them too much money to repair , this seems to be the real reason they want to close the road

The Johnnie Cope road does requires resurfacing and an upgrade with traffic lights at the bridge over the A1, but ALL roads need maintenance and upgrading at some point why should the Johnnie Cope road be any different?

There already is an active travel route linking the villages of Prestonpans and Tranent do we need a second? It would make sense to keep it open for everyone to use it is possible with funding and common sense it CAN be achieved.

The road under the railway bridge floods and if it does vehicles will get trapped if the road is closed. There are businesses on the road that require to be able to access the road when they need to, instead East Lothian insist they have to give advance notice if they need access. In this day and age you cannot know when a delivery is going to arrive or when a client needs the gates open for their horse box this is why the road must remain open.

What about access for emergency services? Have they been consulted.?.no...... The gates ..what happens if they become vandalised and are unable to be opened for emergency services or access to the houses at Bankton..

There has been no consultation with the community or the residents of the Johnnie Cope road surely East Lothian council should be working with the community to find out their concerns

There really is no reason to close this road ,it is well used and needed and as East Lothian grows and develops it needs our roads to remain open and used.

I strongly implore that Transport Scotland should be directly involved with this decision making and the Transport Minister..as well as taking on board the wishes of the local communities ,after all this affects local people who actually use this route and not just some pen pushing decision.





I am writing to object against the closure of the Johnny Cope Road. I have to use this road 3-4 times a day in order to get to my Dad to provide his care as he is severely disabled following a stroke a few years ago. I often receive calls from the Community Alarms Team to say he has had a fall and therefore have to jump in the car and get to my Dad ASAP. If this road were to close, it would take me at least an extra 8-10 mins to get to him, not to mention the additional mileage and fuel costs incurred having to go either via Strawberry Corner or Blindwells. My husband plays golf at the Royal Musselburgh, we use the shops at the bottom of Johnnie Cope Road, we use the vets there and also the train station frequently-closing this road adds time and cost to our daily lives.

The bigger picture would mean more fuel emissions as people will be having to drive much further to get between the two towns, not to mention heavy traffic placed on either alternative route-especially at peak travel times. I wish to OBJECT to the ludicrous plan currently proposed by East Lothian Council to close the Johnnie Cope Road to mechanised traffic, one of only two direct routes between the growing populations of Prestonpans and Tranent.

I need spend little time on the original intention to close the route in 1986, as this 37 year old proposal was not carried out at the time and subjected to the due legally defined processes defined in the Roads (Scotland) Act 1984. Accordingly, original intentions to close and any reasons or justifications the officers of a now defunct local authority might have had for doing so, that cannot now be tested, explored or validated, are utterly immaterial to current considerations and completely irrelevant to the current proposal.

Despite regular requests to your officers for the research data that would prove that this **new** proposal to close this ancient right of way is an evidence-driven proposal, very little data has been provided. So far, the only work that appears to have been done to arrive at this significant decision before your consultation opened was an informal sight survey by your Council engineer of the bridge, owned by Transport Scotland, and a single week of monitoring of winter usage on Johnnie Cope Road in November.

Where is the full engineering study of the bridge, carried out in collaboration with its owners? Where are the traffic studies of current usage and projected impacts on other roads? Where are the carbon impacts of the thousands of increased weekly journey times caused by forcing current users to take longer routes? What assessment on taxi usage and impacts, an integral part of the local public transport network, has been carried out? Where are the formal risk assessments outlining the delays to emergency responders, forced to fumble with keys on either side of a bridge, en route to situations where every extra second could cost a life? Where are the studies exploring alternatives to closure?

I believe this road should be repaired and upgraded to accommodate all users. Speed-calming measures and pavements should be introduced, where appropriate, and traffic lights put in place on either side of the bridge.

There is already a segregated active travel route between Prestonpans and Tranent just a few hundred yards to the east, in desperate need of further investment to make it safer and more appealing. The idea that a local authority can simply close a section of B-road, that it has failed to adequately invest in for decades, and simply rebrand it as an active travel route is simply unacceptable and quite outrageous.

With Blindwells growing rapidly, the adjacent section of the A198 can barely cope now accommodating users to and from Prestonpans, Cockenzie & Port Seton, Longniddry, North Berwick, Aberlady, Drem and Gullane. Two recent problems along this overburdened stretch (roadworks and a serious RTA) caused immense chaos to local communities, including massive tailbacks lasting up to an hour at peak times and severe bus service disruption.

There is simply no justification for closing a road that services such significant population densities and I will continue to object in the strongest possible terms until East Lothian Council makes a convincing case to persuade me that this is anything other than a cyncial attempt to save money on road repairs.

I object strongly to the proposal to close Johnny Cope Road, it is a vital route between Tranent and Prestonpans especially with all the developments going on all around the two towns.

• Inch Cape have planning permission for building a substation and onshore transmission works. They have finalised and secured their plans with ELC. They have stated that there will be an increase in HGV traffic using the coal road to Cockenzie.

This means there will be an increase of HGVs and construction traffic and machinery as well as employees vehicles on the A1 Bypass, Bankton Roundabout and the A198 to access the Power Station site. These roads are already congested add to this the traffic listed and it will increase greatly adding to congestion and pollution which will all increase. The Power Station site will be worked from 7am to 7pm, 5 and a half days a week with a continuous stream of vehicles using these junctions and roads. ELC have the opportunity to keep the JCR open by doing this it will help ease congestion at the Bankton Junction, the roundabout at the B1361and at Blindwells.

• As well as this SeaGreen has in principle permission to build a substation on the site. More HGVs and more works traffic using these roads

• There is also to be a battery energy storage development built at the south of the substation. More HGVs and works traffic using these roads

The basis of the 11.3 million is to undertake site preparation and remediation works, to allow for future employment development. These works include: removal of the earthwork bunds surrounding the coal store and regrading that site to increase its developable area; using the bund material to infill the void where the power station stood; works to the underground cooling water tunnels; repair of the sea wall and improvement works to the John Muir Way. It is quite clear that the power station site will be hugely developed which will increase the vehicles using these roads making them even more congested in the hot spot areas of Bankton Roundabout and Blindwells. By keeping the JCR open ELC can help reduce the congestion and pollution that will ensue.

• Add to this at the same time the creation of a cycle and pedestrian path on the B1361 and the traffic works and lights and closure of part of the road as this is created

• Add to this the housing development of a few hundred houses opposite Charles Phillips and son, Drummore House on the B1361 with the road works and traffic management systems and part closure that will ensue during the build. This will add to the congestion and queues of traffic.

I am writing with objection to the proposed closure of the Johnny Cope Road, linking Prestonpans and Tranent.

My objections and concerns are:

 This road, now more than ever, provides a vital link between the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent. The constant house building between Tranent, Prestonpans and Wallyford, as well as the new town of Blindwells, have increased traffic to the point that none of the road infrastructure in the area is adequate for the amount of traffic having to use it. Most recently we have seen our bus service suspended between Prestonpans and Tranent because of traffic. 40-60 minute delays at the Bankton Roundabout which, had the Johnny Cope Road been closed, would have resulted in delays of more than an hour.

- 2. There is no good reason to close the road, I accept that there must have been a few bumps, but never in my 57 years have I heard of people being killed or badly injured. The reason for these bumps lies with East Lothian Council. Had you implemented traffic lights at the bridge, mirrors on the corners, or maintained the road in any way there is no reason for accidents other than driver error.
- 3. People from Tranent use this road to access the Train Station south car park. Closing the road will mean a large increase of traffic from the Prestonpans side, going under the narrow bridge, and possibly causing gridlock in the area. The entrance under the bridge to the south platform is already congested at busy times, especially when I need to go to work. As a wheelchair user, who does not drive, I already need to compete with cars on the **road** since there are no adequate or safe pavements. A good bit of the pavement is too narrow for a wheelchair, the remainder of the pavement is blocked by street furniture (ELC bin and new cable boxes) It's hard enough getting to the south platform as things are, but doubling the traffic will make it impossible. I currently can sit waiting up to 10 minutes, breathing in car emissions, before its safe to proceed. I ask you not to take away my right to live independently, I'm pretty sure there's legislation to cover that.
- 4. I object to you changing the goalposts regarding the closure of the Johnny Cope Road. Initially you told the Community Council that you were implementing an order where the road was found to be **unnecessary** (based on a 35+ year old order that you've completely ignored for longer than some of our councillors have been alive.) . When you declined the invitation to the Community Council Meeting, you stated that the road was to be closed on **Road Safety**, you also told Martin Whitfield MP in a letter that the reasons were **Road Safety**. Now that the issue is Road Safety, does that not mean you need to begin the process again as your reasons to close the road have changed. Indeed if you do intent to proceed using Road Safety as an excuse, then it should be a requirement to improve the road for pedestrians.
- 5. Even if you close the road to traffic, it will still need to remain open for pedestrians. As far as I can see, this road has been used by residents for more than 250 years. If people are allowed to use the road (without vehicles), then it will STILL need extensive repairs. I demand my right as a wheelchair user to be given the same opportunities as pedestrians, and as it stands today, I could not possibly access that road in its entirety because of the lack of pavements, broken pavements, roads and paving covered in YEARS worth of leaves and litter. I can't use the road past the south platform opening because of the number of potholes, and hidden potholes (the ones that fill up with leaves and water). This will need to be remediated, as well as leaving open access for wheelchairs, prams, scooters etc. Should you go ahead with a locked gate on the bridge, then you will need to provide access for prams, scooters and wheelchairs too.
- 6. Closing this road will increase vehicular emissions. People from Tranent will still need to use the train station in Prestonpans, so they'll drive somewhere between 2-4 extra miles per day to get there, increasing emissions, polluting Prestonpans as they drive through it, lucky us again, we get rid of a lung killing power station, then you increase the traffic pollution, its simply unacceptable. How does this fit in with East Lothian Council's goals for climate change and sustainability?

- 7. Increasing traffic through Prestonpans at already busy times will likely cause more harm and accidents, only it won't be damage to cars, it will be risking people's lives. There are two primary schools in this area, a lot of children walking to school, crossing roads etc, the increase in traffic along the B1361 from both the Wallyford and Tranent ends of the road will, I fear, be dangerous for the children. Has a traffic study been done on this road to evaluate the risks?
- 8. There is a Scottish Ambulance Service Station at Mid-Road, Prestonpans. This serves, amongst other places, Tranent. Any delay in getting an emergency vehicle to Tranent may result in a life or death situation. When the road is blocked by extra traffic trying to get to and from the south platform, will the council take responsibility for the deaths it may cause? I hope this scenario is recorded in your risk assessment from now, the ambulance station was not there 37 years ago.
- 9. I note from your published accounts that the bridge over the A1 was never meant for heavy traffic or vehicles. Who was responsible for this error? I'm considering the weight of the farm vehicles you say this bridge was built for. The bridge may no longer be suitable for farm vehicles, has this been checked? Farm vehicles have drastically increased in size and weight over the last 10 years (Farm Advisory Service Scotland), and from further research I found that farm vehicles have increased in weight and size by 40% in the last 40 years. If the bridge is not built to deal with this, then I suggest you stop these ultra-heavy machines using our road, and leave it open to locals, or you could have the bridge replaced with something more suitable for general and farm use.

To Whom it may concern

I am writing to voice my objection to the closure of Johnnie Cope Road. I am secretary of Prestonpans Community Council and have sat in disbelief at several meetings listening to local councillors tie themselves in knots over the ownership of the road. In fact, it's only in the last month or so that they admitted that the council are responsible for maintaining the road, Transport Scotland the bridge.

I am old enough to remember Prestonpans before the new A1, indeed, JCR was a vital link between the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent at a time when those communities were a fraction of the size they are now.

I walk there most days with the dog, and the road is a well used road which contradicts your original reason for its closure.

On Thursday 16th March there was an accident at the roundabout at the Meadowmill junction of the A1 which closed the road. The traffic on JCR was treble the usual amount and had JCR been closed to cars, the diversion would have been via Wallyford, adding a significant amount of time to a journey.

Which brings me to my next point. How are the emergency services supposed to navigate whatever barrier is put up? No-one has been able to answer this, and considering council officers declined our invitation to attend CC meetings, we are still in the dark.

Bankton house residents whose businesses rely on access from the south have no idea what will happen to their businesses and fear for their lives should an ambulance or fire engine be delayed by looking for a key and opening a barrier.

The access from the north, under the bridge is in a terrible state - the part you claim to maintain. Should access to the station close from the south, that unsafe and impractical junction will see a significant rise in the number of cars and taxis using it. Can you guarantee the safety of pedestrians and wheelchair users?

My final point is that nowhere else in the whole county would the council close a vital road linking two of the biggest communities in East Lothian. Prestonpans and Tranent have endured

mass house building without improved infrastructure, Prestonpans is having our grassy verges pulled up to lay a concrete path from Blindwells to the train station. This path is not needed. It is environmental vandalism imposed on our communities by a council who only think about us when it's to, guite frankly, shaft us.

Prestonpans and Tranent have at least doubled in size since the new A1 was built in 1986 and the council decided to close the road which of course didn't happen. Then in 2020 you tried again claiming that the road was unnecessary. Fast forward to 2022/3 and again, the goalposts have changed to 'unsafe' - despite allowing vehicles of varying size and weight to continue to use it. When Blindwells is complete the amount of traffic is going to significantly increase further, and your solution is to close roads to cars. This is ridiculous. Congestion will increase at both Meadowmill and Wallvford as folk drive to the train station. The environmental damage to those communities could be severe.

It is abundantly clear that this is a cost saving exercise without a second thought for the people for whom the closure would be extremely detrimental. It's extremely disappointing for me as someone who has watched their hometown increase in population and decrease in investment. A poor show.

I am writing to inform you that <u>I wish to object</u> to the order by ELC to redetermine a section of Johnnie Cope Road as suitable only for pedestrians, cyclists and authorised vehicles, <u>for the following reasons</u>:

This road is a vital road linking the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent. It is one of two roads linking these villages the other is congested with traffic and pollution. Only a couple of days ago there was a traffic accident at Bankton roundabout, and the A1 was closed at the slip road and cars were all diverted down the Johnnie Cope Road showing one of the reasons why this vital road should and must remain open.

Changing the reason for the closure/ redetermination during the consultation process. East Lothian Council decided to firstly use the original reason for closing it under section 68 (1) of the roads Scotland act 1984 which stated the road will become unnecessary and is unnecessary for the local population. Prestonpans Community Council asked for the community's comments and we all trustingly responded to this reason. The community council then replied formally with our objections and comments which they included. How were we the community to know that when it came to the public consultation a few weeks later ELC would change this original reason after reading all our comments. They instead read them and sought legal advice before changing the reason now quoting section 1 (1) and 152(2). This means that all our objections based on the first reason would not be considered.... surely this is illegal. How can the goal posts be changed in this way. ELC seemingly apologised for the misleading information contained in the original notification but would not consider starting the whole process again. This is just simply wrong I know of no other councils that would change the criteria during a consultation its totally immoral. The original consultation included horse riders but after my comments horse riders were removed from the list of who would have access.

The original consultation led us to believe there would be 2 gates at each end of the bridge, but the public consultation shows a plan with the access closed further north of the bridge and no mention of how this would be done. I find ELC have not been transparent their mission has been to close this road and they have made it very clear this is what they will do no matter what the community thinks.

There has been no consultation or discussion with the residents who live on JCR or Bankton House or with the businesses who use this road or with the community council. Instead ELC chose not to attend an open invitation to the community council meeting to discuss this redetermination. It would be in everyones interests if instead of closing the road ELC looked at ways of working with the community to keep it open and come up with solutions. The road is vital for people's businesses. At a time when ELC should be supporting local businesses they shut them down by closing a vital road.

It is an ancient right of way which cannot be closed and therefore must remain open for all to use.

This consultation should never have been made as ELC have not reported how the locked gate system will operate. The paperwork is therefore incomplete, and more information is required.

(Since writing this Martin Whitfield contacted ELC who confirmed emergency services would be given a key to unlock the gates and if a resident required access, they would have to give ELC advanced notice.)

Why was this not addressed in the consultation? Where are the plans? Where is the information on how the gate system will operate? where is the emergency services report on this? Where is the consultation with residents? Where is the structural report from Transport Scotland? Where is Transport Scotland's statement saying the road is unsafe? Surely this closure should have been discussed with the residents who live on the road and use it every day. This will affect their lives and businesses. This gate and key system are not a workable solution. Is every emergency vehicle going to be given a key? This is an impracticable and antiquated idea. The road must remain open for all to use.

For ELC to state because the paperwork wasn't completed in 1986 is not a reason to close this well used vital road.

Since 1986 this area has been developed greatly with large housing estates all over East Lothian particularly Prestonpans, Tranent, Blindwells, Longniddry, Cockenzie and Port Seton and Wallyford resulting in a vast increase in the population, and in the number of vehicles on these roads. Housing developers are in the process of meeting their target of 10,000 houses being built in East Lothian this includes a new settlement at Blindwells. This is not a time to be closing roads but to keeping them open and improving them.

With these new developments brings a great deal of additional cars the result has been queues of traffic and congestion at Wallyford, Church Street in Tranent, Blindwells, Bankton roundabout and slip roads to the A1 bypass resulting in more accidents, more pollution and going against ELCs targets to improve air quality by 2033. You can sit for 45 minutes in queues of traffic polluting the environment. Only a few days ago there was a serious accident with queues of traffic backed up on the slip road and bypass. This resulted in vehicles being directed down the Johnnie Cope Road.... what would happen if it was closed! It is one of two direct routes between the villages of Prestonpans and Tranent. It is a well-used popular route and many commuters use it to access the train station car park. Instead ELC want to send these commuters a further distance to congest our villages and roads by closing the JCR it is ludicrous.

By closing the JCR the traffic that would normally use it will have to travel further adding miles to their journey and by using roads they would not normally use ie Bankton

Roundabout, Church Street, Blindwells or Wallyford and Longniddry roads instead which will add to congestion, pollution and thus add to climate change. So, by closing the JCR ELC will be adding thousands of cars to drive through our congested villages every day adding to air pollution!!

The JCR gives direct access to the A1 Bypass why on earth would you close it. It is ludicrous to base the closing of a road in 2023 on paperwork from 1986. 37 years ago! Blindwells is a new village which is still to reach its capacity. There are already queues of traffic at the roundabout, slip road and access road to the A1. Closing the JCR pushes extra traffic onto this hotspot. It makes absolutely no sense that as EL grows and develops with so much housing the council want to close a road. Tranent High Street and Church Street can barely cope with the number of vehicles using it. By closing the JCR, the traffic at Church Street will become gridlocked as vehicles travel to Prestonpans Train Station via the only road you will leave them with to access the station and that's via Church Street Tranent, Bankton Roundabout, Blindwells, and Gardiner Terrace in Prestonpans. ELC will be increasing the amount of cars on Gardiner Terrace which is to become an active travel route with a pedestrian and cycle path right next to a busy congested road caused by the closure of JCR. It must be kept open to reduce the congestion and pollution. Why would you close it and cause vehicles to divert for miles through our villages?

Vehicles using the bypass filter off at the Bankton Junction to reach all the villages I have listed as well as to follow the coastal route and access our coastal villages ie Cockenzie and Port Seton, Longniddry, Aberlady, North Berwick, Gullane, Direlton etc It is busy, over populated with cars, junctions and roundabouts. Why would you close the JCR as it helps alleviate this problem and the likelihood of accidents.

It is therefore not feasible by any means to base a closure / redetermination on an opinion or reason from 38 years ago when I can assure you EL did not have half the amount of traffic or housing it has now.

The Bridge over the A1 bypass

ELC state the bridge on the JCR was intended only for local farm access. This is incorrect when it was built all vehicles used it as I remember when it was built.

At one point ELC erected gates illegally without any consultation and they were removed. However, it is irrelevant what the original use for the bridge was as it has been used since it was built and currently is still being used regularly by locals as a daily commuting access route.

The bridge is owned and maintained by Transport Scotland however ELC appear to have decided with no consultation with Transport Scotland, with no structural report and no evidence to support their claim that it is not safe for vehicles to use but fine for farm vehicles to use!

To think that Transport Scotland would have built a bridge over such an important main road as the A1 bypass and built it inferior to any other bridge over the A1 is ludicrous.

There are bridges all over the country including East Lothian that are used by all types of traffic today that they were certainly not built for. Some were built for horse and carts and are being used heavily by vehicles. They are not being closed.

The bridge at Drem Train Station is a single bridge with bad bends making it impossible to see oncoming traffic. Based on the above assumption will it close?

The bridge at East Linton and Musselburgh date back hundreds of years. Based on the above assumption will they close?

The bridge at Ormiston has priority arrows and is very old will it close?

There are several bridges without proper pavements ie drem bridge. Based on the above assumption will it close?

There are bridges identical to the Johnnie Cope Road bridge in East Lothian, one crosses the A1 a few miles away connecting Macmerry to St Germains the other a few miles

further on, connecting the houses around the Biel Water to the A199. Does this mean ELC will close these bridges as well?

I question why they can close one bridge on the assumption it is unsafe for cars but fine for combine harvesters and tractors and trailers but not another which is of the same construction and used by both commuting cars and vans as well as farm vehicles. Surely, they would have to close them all!!

ELC state the JCR bridge is safe for combine harvesters and other farm machinery, fire engines, tractors, and trailers to use but not cars or vehicles commuting to the train station and back.

Are ELC aware the weight of the listed vehicles they are allowing to access the road once its closed are a great deal more than a car or van or multiple cars and vans ? It makes no sense to close this road.

If ELC were concerned about the safety of the bridge surely they would have contacted Transport Scotland the owners and closed the road and had a structural engineer investigate it and write a report but again Im afraid there is no evidence to back this up. If they were that concerned the bridge should have been repaired but there is nothing to repair. The only real reason seems to be that ELC just want to close the road to save repairing it and are looking for any excuse to do this.

Neglect of Road

The JCR has been neglected by the different Councils over many years which has resulted in the road falling into extreme disrepair. While other roads all over East Lothian are resurfaced and repaired the JCR has been ignored. Ive been told by the roads department and councillors that there just simply is no money to upgrade and repair the JCR which I find unbelievable when ELC is benefitting from the amount of development in the area and funding is found to the value of 11.3million pounds to regenerate the power station site. What about the regeneration of the JCR? All over East Lothian roads are being resurfaced and repaired why not the JCR? You can't even report potholes etc on the JCR as they are removed by ELC as soon as they are reported, Im sure this is illegal. By allowing the road to fall into such disrepair it will cost more to bring it up to standard but that is not the communities fault it is ELCs fault for neglecting it.

The Train Station Many vehicles use the JCR to access the car park to travel to Edinburgh via train or to travel to Prestonpans, or Tranent. This is part of Active Travel using the train but by closing the road it may dissuade people to use the train due to the congestion and queues of traffic. By closing the road more vehicles will cause real congestion at the traffic lights on the lower part of the road and just after Bankton House opening, traffic will be forced to turn in the private drive and the amount of vehicles entering and leaving from the Prestonpans end of the road will increase greatly making it extremely dangerous. Large vehicles will be unable to access the cottages and Bankton House as the Railway bridge is low and the turns on the road too tight. The road needs to remain open to allow traffic to flow up and down the road safely.

ELC originally stated that they wished for the JCR to be used by cyclists, pedestrians, horse riders and emergency vehicles who will all be given access. Then once they read the communities objections from Prestonpans Community Council the reason for closure was changed and horse riders were removed from the list of who would have access.

The road will still require to be repaired no matter who has access. I am a cyclist and car driver and horse owner, and I can assure the council that the road would need to be repaired before cyclists, mobility scooters, wheelchairs and prams etc could use it. I will continue to campaign for the road to be repaired and upgraded until it is.

ELC cannot give some people access and not others its discrimination and it's a public right of way for all to use.

By putting gates across the bridge how do you expect mobility scooters, horse riders, cyclists and combine harvesters to gain access. You cannot narrow this bridge. The farmer requires unrestricted access to his fields. The council have not thought this through. If installing gates with some sort of locking system how will horse riders, mobility scooters, cyclists and pedestrians use the bridge as you cannot put two lanes on the bridge, one for combine harvesters, emergency services, hgvs and one for horse riders, cyclists etc the bridge is too narrow for this. If you put gates up, you are restricting access for everyone.

Does the council expect a horse rider to dismount to open the gate hold a horse and shut the gate walk and lead the horse over the bridge, what happens if it bolts, it would be trapped between two gates and the consequence could be life threatening (I am a horse owner and was an instructor) so can speak from experience. Then the rider must walk across the bridge leading the horse and open the second gate. What type of gates will be installed, there is no description, depending on how they open ie if it's just a barrier as in an arm that goes up in the air or an automatic gate both systems may cause a horse to bolt and with no rider on board the consequence would be fatal. We haven't even discussed how the council would expect the rider to mount the horse again. Would they have to stand on the said gate to mount there horse again no thought has been given to this. There must be no barriers, or gates on this road it's far too dangerous for the people who will be opening and closing them. Bollards cannot be put up as emergency services would be unable to get through resulting in loss of lives and motorbikes would be able to drive through them. The road must remain open for its full length.

Deliveries ELC have stated that if the residents require the gates to be open for a delivery or a horse lorry that cannot get under or round the bridge, they can book the gates to be unlocked by giving advanced notice. In this day and age, we do not know when delivery drivers etc will deliver and slots can be all day so how will this work especially in the winter will ELC employees be expected to stand at the gate for hours, days waiting to unlock them for a delivery?

Emergency Vehicles, Fire Engines, Ambulances, Horse Lorries and trailers, Combine Harvesters, Tractors, JCBs, Removal Lorries, HGVs to empty septic tanks all need access on a daily basis.

These vehicles will be unable to access the housing on JCR or at Bankton House as the road under the railway bridge is too narrow, with tight bends and the bridge is low. If the road is closed, the Prestonpans end of the road would be the only entrance and exit to the Railway car park it is highly likely an accident would happen as the number of vehicles will double and an HGV would not get around or under the bridge.

No thought has been given to the fact that wheelchair and mobility scooters have to use the road if they wish to travel to Edinburgh, they have no choice but to use the road as the pavement is narrow at the Prestonpans end of the road to the railway bridge. By closing the JCR to all vehicles and erecting gates the road will have more traffic on it as vehicles will have to enter and leave on the Prestonpans end of the road making others vulnerable. The road must remain open for its full length.

ELC have not considered the businesses that are on this road. The animal physiotherapist and her horses and customers require unrestricted access from the top of the road and the bottom. They drive HGV horse lorries which cannot fit under the railway bridge or around the corners. The residents have had no discussion or consultation on this. By closing the road to all vehicles except emergency and farm vehicles it will affect her business! If she wants the gate open she has to book this in advance. This is not practical and is unachievable and unrealistic. Does ELC expect the horse lorries to enter from the top of the road and park blocking the road while they lead

their horses over the bridge. These horses and other animals require a physio so could be lame. They would then have to reverse back up the JCR . I just do not see how this would work. The road needs to remain open as it will cause great danger if closed.

The farmer must get his combine harvester, Tractors etc in and out of his fields. If the gates are locked do you expect him to jump off his combine harvester from a height to open a gate climb back on , climb off, shut the gate, drive on the bridge, climb off on the bridge above the height of the bridge barrier (health & safety issue) open the gate climb back on, drive through, climb off, shut the gate, climb back on etc etc etc...that will not happen and it's a danger for him and his employees. Again, no thought has been given to the implication for businesses and other vehicles who use this road daily. The road must remain open for its full length.

The emergency services, fire service police and ambulance. They would all require the road to be open it's a vital quick route to the residents at bankton house and the residents in the cottages on JCR. There is an ambulance base at the bottom of the JCR in Prestonpans and the JCR is a direct access to the A1 without any queues of traffic. If you close the JCR they will have to find a key then find the lock and open the gates locking them behind themselves causing precious time to be lost while someone could be dying.

The JCR is a vital link to the villages of Prestonpans and Tranent in an emergency. If the gates were vandalised, how would the emergency services gain access. ELC are putting people's lives at risk by closing the road. It is paramount that emergency services, police, ambulances, and fire service can continue to safely use the whole road with no obstacles in their way therefore not only keeping residents safe but allowing the services quicker response times to either Tranent or Prestonpans or outlying villages and the bypass as at the top of JCR you can enter the bypass without travelling through any villages.

The police and ambulances use the road frequently. In the event of a fire, from what I believe, there is only one fire engine small enough to fit under the rail bridge. I am not sure if this has an extendable ladder, as the houses are all between 3 & 5 storeys high with the exception of a 1, 2 storey house. By putting gates on this road, you are putting lives at risk. The road must remain open for its full length.

Where is the emergency services consultation report have, they been out to Bankton House and assessed the situation if there was a fire? Have they been out to check their fire engines with ladders can manoeuvre under the bridge and around the corner? Has ELC invited them to attend a meeting with the residents to discuss access?No they haven't I have seen no reports etc so why are ELC putting peoples lives at risk? The JCR must remain open its entire length.

Local Taxi firms as well as the public need a road with no barriers as they use it regularly otherwise, they will be diverted for several miles adding to pollution and congestion.

No traffic survey or management has been carried out by ELC where are the statistics? I have seen none therefore they are choosing to close a road without any evidence to back it up. There is absolutely no reason to close it. It is a well-used vital road for the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent. My family and I use it regularly. You cannot close a road to all vehicles without having completed a traffic management survey of the area and the road itself.

By upgrading the road and keeping the road open it ensures current and future residents can receive deliveries, emergency services, removal trucks and horse lorries without there being a height restriction or delay while gates/barriers are opened. The residents of JCR deserve a road and pavement that is maintained, An easy solution would be to put traffic lights on the bridge or right of way arrows after all Ormiston Bridge has this and the top of fishers road is narrow and vehicles use it without any issues. This road has been neglected by ELC for as many years as I care to remember and there have

been no accidents on it or the bridge. The road can easily be improved with traffic signals or priority signs, road repairs and resurfacing and a shared pedestrian and cyclist path. ELC repair and resurface other roads in EL I do not understand why they are not repairing this vital link between our communities and it's a direct access point from and to the A1. The road must remain open for its full length.

The road has been neglected for years. The JCR should be upgraded and repaired like any other road in ELC. Not being able to afford to repair it, as I have been informed by the roads department is no excuse not to repair and upgrade it. If it is closed it will still require upgrading and resurfacing. There is absolutely no reason to close this well used vital road. Only recently ELC resurfaced Gullane main street and a large section of road near Merryhatton and part of Fishers Road in Port Seton and a road in Longniddry and the road at the side of Chalmers Church Port Seton and numerous others so why not the JCR I have never seen such an appalling state of a road anywhere in Scotland in my life its shocking and ELC should be held accountable. Don't put up barriers instead repair and upgrade the road and keep it open.

The Road is bordered by farmland, making it easy to widen. The bridge over the A1 would benefit from Traffic Lights for pedestrians, cyclists and vehicles to use. With the County swarming with developers, money should be available to upgrade the existing infrastructure. Only recently 11.3 million has been obtained for the Power Station site why are ELC not funding or finding funding to repair and upgrade the Johnnie Cope Road.

Active Travel. ELC are promoting Active travel but by closing the JCR vehicles will be forced to travel further adding to pollution and climate change. Commuters who would normally travel by train will be caught up in the congestion at Church Street and Blindwells adding to it and causing delays of 40minutes or more. Many will miss trains and resort back to travelling by car. This is not encouraging active travel. I regularly use the road and leave the bypass to venture straight down JCR, if the barriers /gates are installed I will have to leave at Wallyford adding to the pollution, queues and congestion or drive further to Blindwells then back on myself. Waiting and travelling longer and further while my vehicle pollutes the air. There is already an Active Travel Route linking Prestonpans to Tranent called the Heugh. By closing the JCR you will be increasing and doubling in places the amount of cars travelling through our villages which goes against the concept of active travel. You will instead achieve poorer Air Quality within our local villages as you force vehicles to increase their journeys and create and add to congestion.

<u>Traffic lights on the bridge and speed control measures (bumps</u>) and resurfacing the road would make a huge difference to current safety issues. Pushing all the station traffic into accessing only from the Prestonpans side will increase the likelihood of accidents due to the sharp bend at the entrance to the JCR. Money should be spent on improving the road rather than closing it! Does ELC think by closing the road they would not have to repair it or is it that if they make it an active travel route they will receive funding. Personally I do not see why it cant remain open and incorporate all of these upgrades.

The road under the railway bridge regularly floods. We currently live in a world with climate change one of the results of this is flash floods and more rain. If the road floods as it has done how will the cars parked in the car park get out and what about people in mobility scooters and wheelchairs they will be trapped. By erecting barricades across this road, the implications are vast and ELC will be held to account if anyone is trapped or injured due to this decision. The JCR must remain open with no barriers so if there is flooding vehicles, mobility scooters, and wheelchairs are not trapped as they have no other way to get out except to phone ELC and wait for someone to arrive with a key to unlock the gates and I wonder realistically how long that would take. This idea is an antiquated one which will cost lives.

<u>The Power Station Site</u> It is important to remember that with the 11.3 million levelling fund, the Power Station site will be developed over the next two and a half years starting this spring.

□ Inch Cape have planning permission for building a substation and onshore transmission works. They have finalised and secured their plans with ELC. They have stated that there will be an increase in HGV traffic using the coal road to Cockenzie.

This means there will be an increase of HGVs and construction traffic and machinery as well as employees vehicles on the A1 Bypass, Bankton Roundabout and the A198 to access the Power Station site. These roads are already congested add to this the traffic listed and it will increase greatly adding to congestion and pollution which will all increase. The Power Station site will be worked from 7am to 7pm, 5 and a half days a week with a continuous stream of vehicles using these junctions and roads. ELC have the opportunity to keep the JCR open by doing this it will help ease congestion at the Bankton Junction, the roundabout at the B1361and at Blindwells.

□ As well as this SeaGreen has in principle permission to build a substation on the site. More HGVs and more works traffic using these roads

□ There is also to be a battery energy storage development built at the south of the substation. More HGVs and works traffic using these roads

The basis of the 11.3 million is to undertake site preparation and remediation works, to allow for future employment development. These works include: removal of the earthwork bunds surrounding the coal store and regrading that site to increase its developable area; using the bund material to infill the void where the power station stood; works to the underground cooling water tunnels; repair of the sea wall and improvement works to the John Muir Way.

It is quite clear that the power station site will be hugely developed which will increase the vehicles using these roads making them even more congested in the hot spot areas of Bankton Roundabout and Blindwells. By keeping the JCR open ELC can help reduce the congestion and pollution that will ensue.

 $\hfill\square$ Add to this at the same time the creation of a cycle and pedestrian path on the B1361 and the traffic works and lights and closure of part of the road as this is created

Add to this the housing development of a few hundred houses opposite Charles Phillips and son, Drummore House on the B1361 with the road works and traffic management systems and part closure that will ensue during the build. This will add to the congestion and queues of traffic.

ELC need to look at the bigger picture to see how the JCR road is absolutely vital to our communities. ELC have developed this area greatly with huge housing developments and a new village add to this the power station site and the amount of work and development happening there as well as the additional work to our roads to create a cycle pedestrian path an additional 300 houses at Drummore and it makes absolute sense to keep the JCR open to alleviate the mayhem that will ensue.

Do ELC really think closing the JCR road will help alleviate what will be the most congested roads in East Lothian. Absolutely not we need to keep it open, in this way, it will help alleviate the gridlock, congestion and pollution that is about to ensue.

All in all, this is not a well thought out proposal and just because a process was started and never completed is not a reason to close this road, which as I have said is a vital road for our communities and the residents and businesses who use it. The JCR is one of two direct routes linking the villages of Prestonpans and Tranent and must remain open for all to use. It is also a direct link to the A1 with an exit and entrance road within metres of the JCR. By keeping it open it also helps to alleviate the congestion at other hotspots in the area. (blindwells, Bankton Roundabout, the A198, Church Street, Gardiner Terrace, the B1361 etc)

THE SOLUTION

There is a solution....KEEP IT OPEN.....HOW?


There are ways to fund the work required on the JCR to keep it open and create a pedestrian and cycle path as well as giving access to all vehicles at the same time. Other villages have done this ie gullane to drem path, Beckys strip near North Berwick, the cycle path from blindwells to the train station, the improvements to dean woods in Longniddry, the resurfacing of the Longniddry to Haddington railway walk. All mainly achieved from funding. (Sustrans, community funds etc) There is a diverse range of people in our community who all want to see this road remain open for all to enjoy. The road just requires widening, resurfacing, some street lights and traffic lights installed at the bridge. ELC state it is too far and costly to run power to the bridge for traffic lights however with funding and the money created from all the new developments this can be achieved. Cyclists, pedestrians, and vehicles can all share the road and if more land is required a portion can be purchased from the farmer although it is possible to use the grass verges which are large in themselves.

With the amount of resurfacing that has happened this month in East Lothian the JCR could have been resurfaced twice over.

Prestonpans should not be neglected in this way. If the road was in North Berwick, Dunbar, Gullane or Haddington I'm sure I would not be having to write a letter to object and justify why in this day and age a well-used road linking to the A1 should remain open. I hope you will make the right decision for the communities you serve.

Please note I wish to object to the closure of Johnnie Cope Road, as outlined above.

My reasons for objecting to the closure are as follows.

1. By closing this road, this will push more traffic onto Gardiner Terrace / Bankton Terrace, Mid Road Prestonpans. That these streets are already inadequately policed from speeding motorists will only make the situation worse. Increased emissions and more speeding traffic is hardly fair for the local residents in Prestonpans.

2. By closing this road, this will push more traffic towards Blindwells new town. Due to the number of new houses in this area this will literally increase car journeys by the thousands on this stretch of road. Only a fortnight ago, motorists faced 20 minute delays and bus routes were

cancelled for days as the road simply couldn't cope with a set of temporary traffic lights! Increased emissions from stationary traffic in this area is hardly fair on local residents.

3. By closing this road, access will be denied to the South car park of Prestonpans railway station directly from Tranent on Johnnie Cope Road. This will a) deter people from using public transport and b) have a detrimental effect on wheelchair and pushchair users wishing to use Edinburgh bound rail services. This platform is inaccessible for wheelchair users from the North car park.

4. Dozens of new flats are nearing completion at the North end of Johnnie Cope Road adjacent to Prestonpans train station. To close an adjacent road just as these flats are finished is simply ludicrous. I'd be interested to know if, during the planning process for these flats, if reference was made to the potential closure of this road, or whether it was simply assumed this road would remain open as an access road. Perhaps you could enlighten me?

5. There is now a small shopping centre at the North end of Johnnie Cope Road adjacent to the new flats and the railway station. These shops including a Vet, a carpet shop, a pizza takeaway and a very busy Co-op attract a lot of traffic from approximately 6am to 10pm every day. That any southbound traffic will now be forced into the local busy streets, instead of directly accessing Johnnie Cope Road is very unfair on the residents of Prestonpans.

6. There are literally thousands of new houses being built in the West of the county. To close one of only two direct access routes from Prestonpans to Tranent is beyond belief. Indeed not only should this road remain open it should be subject to an upgrade and properly maintained as per other roads throughout the county e.g. traffic lights should be installed on the bridge, with the road surface relaid and marked accordingly.

7. To be perfectly frank, this proposal is an affront to the people of Prestonpans. This proposal seems to have been raised without any serious consideration to the needs and requirements of local businesses, residents, car users and railway commuters. This proposal must be dropped as a matter of urgency and the road improved and maintained, NOT closed.

1. I believe that this closure would risk the lives of the residents and animals located here.

Talking from personal experience when we had to call an ambulance after an accident in which someone was bleeding profusely from a head wound it was sent from West Lothian. Will they be able to access a key for the proposed locked gates. Or will they have to take an unnecessary detour adding to essential time.

2. When the bottom road floods I take it residents and people using the overflow car park will have to know in advance so that they can arrange for a key to be brought from Council Offices.

3. There is an historic building here. Does the council have no regard for the people living there or for the building itself for which they were happy to give a grant towards the restoration.

A fire engine of the size required would not be able to get under the bridge and valuable time would be lost whilst dealing with locating a key.

4. There is only one other road between Tranent and Prestonpans which is going to get busier with the development of the new town of Blindwells. Why would you close the second road which is the nearest one to the railway station.

I want to protest in the strongest possible terms about East Lothian Council's plan to close Johnnie Cope Road in Prestonpans to vehicular traffic.

It may well be the case that the intention in 1986 was to close the road when the A1 dual carriageway was built, but this is now utterly immaterial. The road wasn't closed then and has been continuously used by motor vehicles.

ELC state that the road is now 'unsafe'. This is probably true to some extent but has arisen through the council's neglect of the road and failure to keep it repaired and upgraded to suitable standards for the traffic using it.

Johnnie Cope Road is a vital link between the ever-growing communities of Tranent and Prestonpans, there being only one other viable road linking the towns. Closing it will increase the distance driven by cars currently using the route, having a negative effect on carbon footprint.

The council have also stated that the road will become an active transport route for cyclists and pedestrians. If this is the case, the road is clearly unsuitable even for this and will require upgrading for safety reasons. How can cyclists and pedestrians safely share this route in its current design with combine harvesters, emergency vehicles and other vehicles which will still have access? If the funds have to be spent, they should be spent on improving the road for all traffic with footpaths, traffic calming measures and traffic lights at the bridge. In addition, there is already a perfectly good route for cyclists and pedestrians down The Heugh from Tranent which will soon link up with the new route from Blindwells to Prestonpans. Further, the most dangerous part of this road for me as a local runner, is at the top where the road meets the main Tranent to Wallyford Road. Major safety measures would need to be put in place to allow non vehicular traffic to safely cross this road to access the farm tracks and road leading to Fa'side Castle.

There is clearly very little public support for this road closure which is frankly just a lazy, costsaving exercise without any proper planning, a proposal based on a decision made almost 40 years ago. This is a shocking example of a local authority riding roughshod over a local community without listening to their wishes.

I live in Tranent and commute daily to Edinburgh, using the car park on the south side of Prestonpans, although I rarely drive along Johnnie Cope Road. The reason I don't use the road more often is the state of repair and the awkward single-track bridge. However, there have been numerous times over the last 10 years when I have had NO option but to use Johnnie Cope Road to drive home when the road under the bridge has been closed for repair or due to floods. I have heard that the this is unlikely to happen again – have you seen the state of the potholes under the bridge at the moment?? I will not use the south car park at the station if there is any chance of being stranded, as I feel it would be an issue for my personal safety if I had to walk home alone. My options are to park in the north car park, on the road outside it, or drive further than necessary.

Hi There, I'm a long-term resident of Tranent, East Lothian. Who uses the Prestonpans train station to access my full-time job in Edinburgh every day. In order to make my way to the train station, My initial route is via the very important town-connection road Johnnie Cope Road (Birsley Brae). This journey will usually take me 6 minutes from Tranent Police Station. This same journey via Bankton Jct & Church Street will typically take me 10 minutes or more.

Over the last month, Bankton Jct/Church street has been closed too many times. This Junction is typical for high speed crashes, Busy A1 Traffic & Traffic that will soon be forced as the only way through every town south of Tranent, to Prestonpans. Johnnie Cope Road is a vital congestion-relieving road that should be upgraded and kept to high standards. If Johnnie cope road closes, and there's an issue at any point between Tranent/Church Street/Bankton Junction & Prestonpans (Which given the past 4/5 closures in the last 3 weeks alone) The only route will be to go through wallyford, adding an additional 15 minutes to my drive to Prestonpans Train Station from the Tranent Police Station.

In line with Scottish goals for net-zero, This should also be considered as a way to improve carbon neutrality. The Journey between the Tranent Police Station is a measly 1.6 Miles. With the same journey doubled if you take the much busier route via Church Str & Bankton Juct. This is not only an issue itself, but should there be any slow traffic (like there usually is on this badly

designed Major junction) will only add to this insanity (e.g the 40m I had to wait to get between Tranent and Prestonpans only 3 weeks ago, because of roadworks on Bankton Jct.) I am writing to voice my objection to the closure of Johnnie Cope Road. I am secretary of Prestonpans Community Council and have sat in disbelief at several meetings listening to local councillors tie themselves in knots over the ownership of the road. In fact, it's only in the last month or so that they admitted that the council are responsible for maintaining the road, Transport Scotland the bridge.

I am old enough to remember Prestonpans before the new A1, indeed, JCR was a vital link between the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent at a time when those communities were a fraction of the size they are now.

I walk there most days with the dog, and the road is a well used road which contradicts your original reason for its closure.

On Thursday 16th March there was an accident at the roundabout at the Meadowmill junction of the A1 which closed the road. The traffic on JCR was treble the usual amount and had JCR been closed to cars, the diversion would have been via Wallyford, adding a significant amount of time to a journey.

Which brings me to my next point. How are the emergency services supposed to navigate whatever barrier is put up? Noone has been able to answer this, and considering council officers declined our invitation to attend CC meetings, we are still in the dark.

Bankton house residents whose businesses rely on access from the south have no idea what will happen to their businesses and fear for their lives should an ambulance or fire engine be delayed by looking for a key and opening a barrier.

The access from the north, under the bridge is in a terrible state - the part you claim to maintain. Should access to the station close from the south, that unsafe and impractical junction will see a significant rise in the number of cars and taxis using it. Can you guarantee the safety of pedestrians and wheelchair users?

My final point is that nowhere else in the whole county would the council close a vital road linking two of the biggest communities in East Lothian. Prestonpans and Tranent have endured mass house building without improved infrastructure, Prestonpans is having our grassy verges pulled up to lay a concrete path from Blindwells to the train station. This path is not needed. It is environmental vandalism imposed on our communities by a council who only think about us when it's to, quite frankly, shaft us.

Prestonpans and Tranent have at least doubled in size since the new A1 was built in 1986 and the council decided to close the road which of course didn't happen. Then in 2020 you tried again claiming that the road was unnecessary. Fast forward to 2022/3 and again, the goalposts have changed to 'unsafe' - despite allowing vehicles of varying size and weight to continue to use it. When Blindwells is complete the amount of traffic is going to significantly increase further, and your solution is to close roads to cars. This is ridiculous. Congestion will increase at both Meadowmill and Wallyford as folk drive to the train station. The environmental damage to those communities could be severe.

It is abundantly clear that this is a cost saving exercise without a second thought for the people for whom the closure would be extremely detrimental. It's extremely disappointing for me as someone who has watched their hometown increase in population and decrease in investment. A poor show.

I am a resident at Bankton House Steading and find the proposed closure of this road to be very concerning.

This is a VERY busy road and instead of closing it I actually believe that it needs MAJOR upgrades to make it a suitable road for cars/walkers/cycalists a like whicj right now it is not. First of all it needs to be completely re-tarmaced and widened. Every so often the pot holes are filled however it never lasts long due to the volume of traffic which uses it. A traffic light system also needs to be introduced on the narrow bridge above the A1 just like at the bottom of the road at the train station. There are many occasions where vehicles have to reverse all the way back to let other cars passed and when walking along this road it can cause added dangers for pedestrians too.

There are no pavements for most parts of the road and the pavement that is there towards the train station is inadequate for buggies/wheelchairs and there is no street lighting either to walk home from the train station.

I also believe the closure of this road will have a detrimental impact to us as residents meaning we will not have the required emergency service vehicle access as well as the need for deliveries or removal lorries who cannot enter from the Prestonpans side due to the low bridge.

The road is integral to both towns and many people use it to access the train station. If it is closed it only means additional journey times and an added build up of traffic at the new blind Wells Estate side which is also concerningly large and will make the volume of traffic in and around that area even higher.

I believe many people hold the same views as above and hope that they are considered seriously instead of keeping the road open with minimal effort to upgrade it from the council, or worse close it with no upgrades.

I am a frequent visitor to the area and I am extremely concerned over the closure of this local road to public vehicles. I believe this to be unnecessary and potential detrimental to both the people and businesses that live on the the road and potential future development in this area. There is also the issue of the increased distances current road users will be required to make increasing vehicle pollution on the roads the traffic will be forced onto. Looking at the reasons given by yourselves for the closure your reasons do not fit with those of the people affected who live and work along this route.

All the communities around this road are increasing in size and at some point the fields between Preston Pans, Wallyford and Tranet will be developed, this is the only road with access under the railway and the council will then be forced to reopen it as there is not sufficient capacity on the other roads in the network for all the traffic it would create. The road has services and would be easy to widen making it the obvious supply road for any new builds.

Emergency vehicles need full access 24/7, any gate, bollards or pinch points to stop through traffic may result in emergency vehicle access being blocked. You cannot guarantee where those vehicles will be coming from or rely on keys or codes being shared with the services. This is putting lives on the line. Given the proximity of the ambulance base to the road its also removing the ability for them to reach people in other communities within target response times.

The location of this road makes it a vital link with public transport, reducing pollution and reducing the increase in private vehicle ownership. The road can be reclassified as it has been in other council areas as a pedestrian priority route without stopping traffic being able to travel the length of the road.

The Station parking can only be accessed on the south side when the road is not flooded under the bridge under the restricted road plan, without this parking the residential streets around the station have selfish parking stopping them from accessing their homes and businesses. Likewise then the water under the bridge prevents vehicular use it also stops pedestrians and other road users using the parking and if they have parked on that side how are they to get their vehicles out so they can get home.

Reviewing all the information provided by others, the consultation process adopted by the council is biased in favour of closing a road on

the basis it was planned 20 years ago. Many things have changed in

that time including government policies of reducing vehicle emissions and improving the environment we live in, closing this road meets none of that. Recent requests for additional evidence by residents and the Community Councils appears to have gone unheard by Council Officials and I have been unable to find sufficient evidence in the information made available by the council for the forced closure of this route. By contrast all the information made public by those fighting this closure has made it clear the road is used, its wanted and its necessary. The Bridge over the A1 is owned and Maintained by Transport Scotland and that maintenance has to continue, to use it as a closure argument is not valid. Its not part of the council budget.

I am writing on behalf of myself and my husband to formally object to your publicly stated plans to close the Johnnie Cope road to cars and vehicles. We have been local residents in Prestonpans for 12 years and feel this is an essential access point. It is a road we use at least weekly to access Tranent and we use the train station multiple times a week. Despite the poorly maintained state of the road, it is still a far quicker route onto the A1 heading east for us than travelling to Strawberry Corner.

The closure of this road would mean increased traffic and congestion at both Strawberry Corner and Blindwells. The Blindwells junction is already significantly more congested in the last six months due to the addition of very slow to change traffic lights.

The closure of the Johnnie Cope road is also of significant concern to passengers accessing Prestonpans railway station. Those who need wheelchair access or pushchair access to the Edinburgh side or just want to access the station at all from Tranent will face a very much longer detour to get to the station. And will this be accessible at all in the event of flooding which happens at frequent intervals under the bridge access from the Prestonpans side? It is possible people would end up stranded.

We are also concerned that the restricted nature of the low bridge from the Prestonpans end and the closure of the road from the Tranent end would be a significant safety issue for the small number of residents who live on the road. How for example could a fire engine safely reach these people in the event of a fire?

Ideally we feel some maintenance of the road is very much overdue. The bridge would benefit from something such as a traffic light system to prevent people having to reverse to allow someone coming the other way to cross. Given the huge increase in housing in both Tranent and Prestonpans this is surely not an unrealistic option and well warranted given the high numbers of residents in both towns?

I do hope you will reconsider this decision, we feel that taking away this essential access is detrimental to both towns and to us as regular users. It is also evident that it is a well used route by all sorts of vehicles.

I am writing to voice my objection to the above proposed order, for the below reasons.

The importance of the route and unsuitability of alternatives

As you know, despite a population of some 12,000+ and growing, Tranent does not have its own railway station. Prestonpans Station is a vital travel route for Tranent residents and Johnnie Cope's Road in turn is a vital route to get there. The alternative options are unsatisfactory and unsuitable. Using my own circumstances as an example, I live in Bankpark Grove and travel to work in Edinburgh city centre. At present, my journey to the station is 1.2 miles, a simple and quick journey avoiding major junctions and both town centres. Under the proposal, I would be required to take a loop either west, increasing the journey to 3.8 miles, or east, increasing the journey to 2.7 miles. In both cases, in addition to increasing the distance which of course has environmental implications, I would be required to travel through built up (and growing) town and residential areas which are already congested. As you are well aware, all of these areas are in the process of having hundreds more houses built which will already put an additional strain on the A198, A199 and B1361 - namely the new developments outside Wallyford at Strawberry Corner to Dolphingstone and of course the enormous new Blindwells development. For me, the additional distance and time, taking into account the added congestion, could be the difference between being able to collect my son from nursery on time or not. I cannot see any benefit to sending the current 'Johnnie Cope traffic' on these alternative routes which are already set to become more and more busy and congested.

The road itself

East Lothian as a rural/semi-rural county is criss-crossed by hundreds of minor roads joining its towns and villages, and Johnnie Cope's Road is no less suitable then any of them. The current issues with the road stem from a historic lack of maintenance which is easily rectified by repairing the road surface and managing it on an ongoing basis in the same way as any of the other minor roads in the county. To help with traffic flow, the narrow road bridge crossing the A1 could be managed by simply installing a set of reactive traffic lights, identical to those already in place where the road goes on to cross under the railway – the section you intend to keep open – which work extremely well. These solutions are not complicated, difficult or expensive in the scheme of the Council's budget.

Many, many residents of both Tranent and Prestonpans will be negatively impacted by this plan which will have knock-on impacts to residents of the surrounding areas. I would implore the Council to reconsider this proposal.

I am writing to advise of my objection to the proposed closure of Johnnie Cope Road which links Prestonpans and Tranent.

As a resident of Prestonpans, I am someone that uses this passage way regularly be that to visit Tranent for my grocery shopping or more often than not, to access the A1. As I'm sure you're fully aware, the recent developments either side of Prestonpans at Blindwells and

Wallyford have had a significant impact of the ease of movement in and out of Prestonpans which now feels 'landlocked' by these new developments. The increased amount of traffic from these developments as well as the existing pressure on the roundabout between Prestonpans, Blindwells and the coal road to Port Seaton - from travellers from North Berwick all the way to Longniddry, makes it nigh on impossible to move freely in or out of Prestonpans at any given time, especially around rush hour.

The Johnnie Cope road, significantly alleviates this pressure on the access and egress to Prestonpans by allowing us to head to the A1 without passing through Blindwells or Wallyford, both of which are hugely congested areas already, without all the new residents that will be moving into these new properties in the coming months and years. It is also extremely useful access to the train station for Tranent's residents wishing to use the service.

The removal of access to use this route will result in even more congestion at the Blindwells and Wallyford ends of Prestonpans and will also have a detrimental effect of the rail service given how difficult it will be for people from Tranent to access the station due to the traffic and the much longer journey to get there.

I understand the road is quite narrow however out with the bridge that spans the A1, 2 vehicles are always able to pass without issue. To Whom It May Concern:

I am a resident of said road where I reside with my partner Louise Doctor, we have lived at 3 Bankton Cottages for over 23yrs.

We object to the closure of this road for the following reasons,

Safety, blocking the road with bollards could stop emergency vehicles i.e. fire engines getting to us without having to stop and check they have a key to open bollards and then to actually stop to open the bollards. Minutes can save lives!

The Council have suggested that redesignating the road for pedestrians and cyclists will make it safer! In 23yrs of living here and using both ends of the road multiple times daily I have never heard of any of these stated above to have been hurt or in an accident, you could argue that the state of the road is more likely to cause an accident than just simply using the road. However, I will address this further down this correspondance.

As for actual vehicle accidents there have been a couple over the years but mainly very minor, can that be said off other roads around Prestonpans and Tranent?

Flooding, under the rail bridge has been a thorn in our side for a number of years and although there has been attempts to clear the drains etc on a couple of occasions, currently under the bridge is beginning to flood again. Last week when we had a few days of rain there was once again a large puddle. There have been many occasions over the years where we have had to make a choice of which flooded area to drive through, the one under the rail bridge or the flooded area at the other side of the bridge over the A1. We would always choose the second as it is on the whole a very large puddle, whereas the one under the rail bridge can be more like a moving river of water. On numerous occasions cars have attempted to go through and had to be rescued, at least currently if this was area floods we have an alternative.

General issues, this road would be where large delivery, removal type vans would access our homes and the expectation that as council tax payers we would have to book with the council to get access for a delivery is a nonsense.

This road is well used by all emergency services, often blue light vehicles. Police and ambulance service regularly use it as a quick route to either Prestonpans or Tranent. Traffic chaos is alleviated when this road is in use, only last week when there was an accident at bottom of Church Street the Police were redirecting vehicles to our road therefore preventing Tranent and Prestonpans coming to a standstill.

Currently the increase in traffic through Wallyford and at Blindwells with the volume of new housing only makes it more reason to keep this road open.

I would like to comment on what is required to make this road safe for all users, and here lies the main problem. The council have neglected this road for many years and are I am sure fully aware of the cost of bringing it up to a standard that makes it safe, so it feels to us that closing it off is the cheap alternative. However, a few years ago when they did resurface the road from the new car park they chose not to re-kerb or bring up to a decent standard the pavement that runs from the car park to the cottages. This has always been a hazard and in fact approximately 20yrs ago my elderly mother got caught up in some wire that was hidden in the weeds and made a successful claim against the council.

This road, like the one recently done going into Meadowmill and not used by as many people, requires to be re-surfaced, drainage put in at the Tranent end down to meet the drainage at the cottages, pavements created where possible by cutting back some of the substantial hedgerow, traffic lights at the A1 bridge, pavement down to the station car park upgraded and made safe, speed bumps and priority user signs would all go a long way to making it safer if that what the council are aiming for.

As stated we have resided here for 23yrs and paid full council tax all this time for what? No street lights, we put in lights all round our cottage to make it safer. No decent pavement to talk off and at times being cut off from both sides due to flooding. In actual fact we have had a very limited service from the council and would really like to have something done for our benefit for a change.

This is my written objection to the proposed closure of Johnnie Copes Road.

I have lived at Bankon House North for 17 years. I strongly object to the closure of Johnnie Copes Road on safety grounds.

If the proposal goes ahead only small fire appliances will be able to get under the railway bridge. These have to be dispatched from North Berwick which is 20 minutes away.

The bedrooms of my property are on the 4th and.5th floor. A small appliance will.not be able to access the upper floors therefore putting the lives of myself, my husband and 2 children at risk.

I also have major concerns re the proposal for accessible locked gates at the Tranent end to allow larger fire engines access. There are so many scenarios that can impede the swift opening of such gates putting my family at risk and creating a significant risk that doesn't currently exist.

I would also highlight the situation.when the railway bridge has been hit by a vehicle. The road has to be closed while the bridge which carries the main east coast railway line is assessed effectively stranding the residents of the 13 properties that have no access except via Johnnie Copes Road.

This situation will also occur on the frequent occasions the road under the railway bridge floods. Although recent work has improved this the area quickly floods after heavy rain the the extent that I'm not comfortable to drive my car through for concern of the potential damage to my car engine but now I will have no alternative.

I also object to the closure of Johnnie Copes Road as it will force significant traffic onto already busy roads that at rush hour can't cope with the volume of traffic and this volume of traffic will be increasing even more significantly over the coming months and years with the new housing developments.

I note the Council plans to close the road to traffic to make it a green access route. 



I write to object to the proposed redetermination of Johnnie Cope's Road as unsuitable or most vehicular traffic.

I live on the west side of Tranent and drive to Cockenzie three times a week. Usually I go via Church Street and Coal Plant Road. However, for most of December 2022 Coal Plant Road was closed due to subsidence. My best alternative route was Johnnie Cope's Road.

More recently, Church Street was unexpectedly closed due to a gas leak. Again, I needed to use Johnnie Cope's Road.

Similar issues are bound to arise again and when they do we will need Johnnie Cope's Road.

Church Street is narrow and will not cope with being the only direct route out of Tranent to the coast. A long detour to Strawberry Corner and Prestonpans High Street is unsatisfactory and increases fuel consumption.

Johnnie Cope's Road is the route from Tranent to its nearest railway station, Prestonpans. Closing off routes to train stations, as was done in Wallyford, is the opposite of environmentally friendly, as it discourages rail use, and for those who are not discouraged, means more miles driven (therefore more exhaust fumes emitted) to reach them.

The justifications for the restriction are mutually contradictory. The Council refers to a decision supposedly taken in the 1980s that the road was "unnecessary". More recently it has been stated that the road cannot cope with the volume of traffic using it. These imply opposite situations - they cannot both be true. In any event, there have been drastic changes to

population in the towns of East Lothian since the 1980s and a decision taken then cannot be uncritically followed now without a thorough review of the rationale for it.

I recognise there may be safety issues, particularly with the narrow bridge over the A1. The latter could be solved by either a traffic light, or if that is considered too expensive, a convex mirror on a long pole. Clearly it has been a long time since the potholes were filled in but that cannot be a justification for closure. The potholes present a much bigger problem to cyclists, who you propose should be the main users of the road, than to motorists.

The proposal to allow emergency services to go through by using a key to unlock a barrier is concerning. In a life-threatening situation, every second counts, and if for whatever reason the key is not available at the crucial moment the delay could cost someone's life. Is every ambulance and fire engine in East Lothian going to have a key to Johnnie Cope's Road sitting in the glove compartment, handily labelled? This seems unlikely.

- 1. The road provides a vital short cut link between two communities, reducing carbon footprint as the alternatives mean a much longer journey and high possibility of being stuck in slow moving traffic.
- In less busy times the road is an important route for taxis and can be a lifesaving shorter routes for emergency vehicles. It also provides access to the rail station at Prestonpans for people who would otherwise have a long drive to reach a rail station.

I want to protest in the strongest possible terms about East Lothian Council's plan to close Johnnie Cope Road in Prestonpans to vehicular traffic.

It may well be the case that the intention in 1986 was to close the road when the A1 dual carriageway was built, but this is now utterly immaterial. The road wasn't closed then and has been continuously used by motor vehicles.

ELC state that the road is now 'unsafe'. This is probably true to some extent but this has been caused by the council's neglect of the road and their failure to keep it repaired and upgraded to suitable standards for the traffic using it.

Johnnie Cope Road is a vital link between the ever-growing communities of Tranent and Prestonpans, there being only one other viable road linking the towns. Closing it will increase the distance driven by cars currently using the route, having a negative effect on carbon footprint.

The council have also stated that the road will become an active transport route for cyclists and pedestrians. If this is the case, the road is clearly unsuitable even for this and will require upgrading for safety reasons. How can cyclists and pedestrians safely share this route in its current design with combine harvesters, emergency vehicles and other vehicles which will still have access? If the funds have to be spent, they should be spent on improving the road for all traffic with footpaths, traffic calming measures and traffic lights at the bridge. In addition, there is already a perfectly good route for cyclists and pedestrians down The Heugh from Tranent which will soon link up with the new route from Blindwells to Prestonpans.

There is clearly very little public support for this road closure which is frankly just a lazy, costsaving exercise without any proper planning, a proposal based on a decision made almost 40 years ago. This is a shocking example of a local authority riding roughshod over a local community without listening to their wishes. I implore you to reverse this decision and allocate funds to upgrading Johnnie Cope Road to keep this historic and well-used route open to all.

Afternoon,

I live just off the Edinburgh Road in Tranent and use this road everyday going to and from Prestonpans train station, and both primary and high school in Prestonpans, which my children attend. I am not necessarily objecting to the closure as I am happy to continue to use this road as a pedestrian if I cannot use it ad a driver. A few points I would like to raise about the proposed Johnnie Cope Road closure are below.

If the road does close what arrangements will be in place for emergency vehicles? The proposed bollards will cause havoc with traffic at the top, and possibly cause deaths if emergency services are delayed by having to open gates/locks/bollards. How do the residents of that road receive deliveries and how do they access their houses? The rail bridge at the bottom of the road is not particularly high therfore not all high sided vehicles can fit under it. What would I do if I had my car parked in the Tranent side car park of the station and the road under the rail bridge flooded? It often floods in heavy rain and the only way to get out of that side of the car park is to go up the Johnnie Cope Road as the road under the rail bridge becomes impassable for vehicles and pedestrians.

Church Street in Tranent is currently closed, the Johnnie Cope Road is the closest alternative for people making their way to Blindwells, Meadowmill, Prestonpans and cockenzie & post seton by vehicle without having to take a massive detour. If the road was closed permanently we would see higher emissions and longer ques of traffic, especially on the Edinburgh road. The traffic at the new blindwells development is already very heavy with long ques at peak times, this will be made worse if the Johnnie Cope Road is closed.

If the road closes to vehicles it would still require maintenance for pedestrians and cyclists, perhaps a cycle lane and the filling in of pot holes and general maintenance. I believe there should be some form of street light also for pedestrians, this is vital in the winter months.

There would have to be some arrangements made before the closure to combat all of the above issues.

On the other side of the coin, if the road reminds open there are many more issues that need addressed.

A speed limit needs to be imposed on this road as there are many speeding drivers, perhaps a speed camera would slow them down. A pavement is required for pedestrians as it is sometimes a case of life and death when walking. A traffic light installed on either side of the bridge due to the blind summit is also a necessity. Lighting for pedestrians would also be helpful. There are none, other than at the station car park and the Edinburgh road. I feel that having no lights discourages people from walking as it feels unsafe, especially in the dark. There is no safely lit walkways to walk between Prestonpans and Tranent unless you walk to Blindwells, which is unacceptable.

Hi,

I would like to place on record my objection to the above road being permanently closed to traffic. I think it's an extremely short sighted viewpoint to take to save a bit of money, when everything points to keeping it open and laying it out better.

- The first and most serious point is emergency vehicles. I see numerous ambulances using this road daily (quickest route for an ambulance to get onto the A1 from Preston Road depot). I've heard they will be given 'a key'. One key for a padlock, between how many emergency vehicles? How long would this add on to a journey time when there may be a life dependant emergency? And I'd hate to even contemplate a fire a either the big house or any of the bungalows, which would require multiple fire appliances to get over the bridge in a timely manner.
- Related to the above point, even if the road was closed, it would still need maintained to allow these select vehicles to drive over it. Therefore I'm unsure of the savings it would create.
- Two of the biggest developments in East Lothian are happening on our doorsteps. Blindwells and Wallyford. If we remove Birsley Brae, residents travelling between Tranent and Prestonpans have two options: Bankton junction, or Strawberry corner.

Both of which, within a couple of years, are going to be exponentially busier. I'm already unsure whether both of these junctions (especially Bankton) will cope with the rise in traffic, let alone needlessly adding more to it.

Just this week we have seen Church Street in Tranent closed. Most traffic will therefore
have used JCR as a thoroughfare to Prestonpans. Closing this is going to push a whole
load of traffic down Coalgate and Tranent Mains road in Tranent if this were to happen
again. Small, narrow residential streets with children playing is an accident waiting to
happen.

JCR should remain open. Unless there is a sound business case for closing it, then it is bewildering to see the push to close it. Things have changed since the original order was produced. I have lived in Prestonpans for nearly 15 years and during this time there has been a massive expansion in the number of houses built in Prestonpans, Tranent, Wallyford and Musselburgh. At the same time there has been very little investment in the local road infrastructure to accommodate the extra traffic. On Thursday 16th March there was an accident at the roundabout at the Meadowmill junction of the A1 which closed the road. The traffic on JCR was treble the usual amount and had JCR been closed to cars, the diversion would have been via Wallyford, adding a significant amount of time to a journey.

Which brings me to my next point. How are the emergency services supposed to navigate whatever barrier is put up? Noone has been able to answer this, and considering council officers declined our invitation to attend CC meetings, we are still in the dark.

Bankton house residents whose businesses rely on access from the south have no idea what will happen to their businesses and fear for their lives should an ambulance or fire engine be delayed by looking for a key and opening a barrier.

The access from the north, under the bridge is in a terrible state - the part you claim to maintain. Can you guarantee the safety of pedestrians and wheelchair users?

There's not many places if any in the county that the council would close avital road linking two of the biggest communities in East Lothian. Prestonpans and Tranent have endured mass house building without improved infrastructure, Prestonpans is having our grassy verges pulled up to lay a concrete path from Blindwells to the train station. This path is not needed. It is environmental vandalism imposed on our communities by a council who only think about us when it's to, quite frankly, shaft us.



I am writing to inform you that <u>I wish to object</u> to the order by ELC to redetermine a section of Johnnie Cope Road as suitable only for pedestrians, cyclists and authorised vehicles, <u>for the following reasons</u>:

This road is a vital road linking the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent. It is one of two roads linking these villages the other is congested with traffic and pollution. Only a couple of days ago there was a traffic accident at Bankton roundabout, and the A1 was closed at the slip road and cars were all diverted down the Johnnie Cope Road showing one of the reasons why this vital road should and must remain open.

Changing the reason for the closure/ redetermination during the consultation process. East Lothian Council decided to firstly use the original reason for closing it under section 68 (1) of the roads Scotland act 1984 which stated the road will become unnecessary and is unnecessary for the local population. Prestonpans Community Council asked for the community's comments and we all trustingly responded to this reason. The community council then replied formally with our objections and comments which they included. How were we the community to know that when it came to the public consultation a few weeks later ELC would change this original reason after reading all our comments. They instead read them and sought legal advice before changing the reason now quoting section 1 (1) and 152(2). This means that all our objections based on the first reason would not be considered.... surely this is illegal. How can the goal posts be changed in this way. ELC seemingly apologised for the misleading information contained in the original notification but would not consider starting the whole process again. This is just simply wrong I know of no other councils that would change the criteria during a consultation its totally immoral.

The original consultation included horse riders but after my comments horse riders were removed from the list of who would have access.

The original consultation led us to believe there would be 2 gates at each end of the bridge, but the public consultation shows a plan with the access closed further north of the bridge and no mention of how this would be done. I find ELC have not been transparent their mission has been to close this road and they have made it very clear this is what they will do no matter what the community thinks.

There has been no consultation or discussion with the residents who live on JCR or Bankton House or with the businesses who use this road or with the community council. Instead ELC chose not to attend an open invitation to the community council meeting to discuss this redetermination. It would be in everyones interests if instead of closing the road ELC looked at ways of working with the community to keep it open and come up with solutions. The road is vital for people's businesses. At a time when ELC should be supporting local businesses they shut them down by closing a vital road.

It is an ancient right of way which cannot be closed and therefore must remain open for all to use.

<u>This consultation should never have been made</u> as ELC have not reported how the locked gate system will operate. The paperwork is therefore incomplete, and more information is required.

(Since writing this Martin Whitfield contacted ELC who confirmed emergency services would be given a key to unlock the gates and if a resident required access, they would have to give ELC advanced notice.)

Why was this not addressed in the consultation? Where are the plans? Where is the information on how the gate system will operate? where is the emergency services report on this? Where is the consultation with residents? Where is the structural report from Transport Scotland? Where is Transport Scotland's statement saying the road is unsafe? Surely this closure should have been discussed with the residents who live on the road and use it every day. This will affect their lives and businesses. This gate and key system are not a workable solution. Is every emergency vehicle going to be given a key? This is an impracticable and antiquated idea. The road must remain open for all to use.

For ELC to state because the paperwork wasn't completed in 1986 is not a reason to close this well used vital road.

Since 1986 this area has been developed greatly with large housing estates all over East Lothian particularly Prestonpans, Tranent, Blindwells, Longniddry, Cockenzie and Port Seton and Wallyford resulting in a vast increase in the population, and in the number of vehicles on these roads. Housing developers are in the process of meeting their target of 10,000 houses being built in East Lothian this includes a new settlement at Blindwells. This is not a time to be closing roads but to keeping them open and improving them.

With these new developments brings a great deal of additional cars the result has been queues of traffic and congestion at Wallyford, Church Street in Tranent, Blindwells, Bankton roundabout and slip roads to the A1 bypass resulting in more accidents, more pollution and going against ELCs targets to improve air quality by 2033. You can sit for 45 minutes in queues of traffic polluting the environment. Only a few days ago there was a serious accident with queues of traffic backed up on the slip road and bypass. This resulted in vehicles being directed down the Johnnie Cope Road.... what would happen if it was closed! It is one of two direct routes between the villages of Prestonpans and Tranent. It is a well-used popular route and many commuters use it to access the train station car park. Instead ELC want to send these commuters a further distance to congest our villages and roads by closing the JCR it is ludicrous.

By closing the JCR the traffic that would normally use it will have to travel further adding miles to their journey and by using roads they would not normally use ie Bankton Roundabout, Church Street, Blindwells or Wallyford and Longniddry roads instead which will add to congestion, pollution and thus add to climate change. So, by closing the JCR ELC will be adding thousands of cars to drive through our congested villages every day adding to air pollution!!

The JCR gives direct access to the A1 Bypass why on earth would you close it. It is ludicrous to base the closing of a road in 2023 on paperwork from 1986. 37 years ago! Blindwells is a new village which is still to reach its capacity. There are already queues of traffic at the roundabout, slip road and access road to the A1. Closing the JCR pushes extra traffic onto this hotspot. It makes absolutely no sense that as EL grows and develops with so much housing the council want to close a road. Tranent High Street and Church Street can barely cope with the number of vehicles using it. By closing the JCR, the traffic at Church Street will become gridlocked as vehicles travel to Prestonpans Train Station via the only road you will leave them with to access the station and that's via Church Street Tranent, Bankton Roundabout, Blindwells, and Gardiner Terrace in Prestonpans. ELC will be increasing the amount of cars on Gardiner Terrace which is to become an active travel route with a pedestrian and cycle path right next to a busy congested road caused by the closure of JCR. It must be kept open to reduce the congestion and pollution. Why would you close it and cause vehicles to divert for miles through our villages?

Vehicles using the bypass filter off at the Bankton Junction to reach all the villages I have listed as well as to follow the coastal route and access our coastal villages ie Cockenzie and Port Seton, Longniddry, Aberlady, North Berwick, Gullane, Direlton etc It is busy, over populated with cars, junctions and roundabouts. Why would you close the JCR as it helps alleviate this problem and the likelihood of accidents.

It is therefore not feasible by any means to base a closure / redetermination on an opinion or reason from 38 years ago when I can assure you EL did not have half the amount of traffic or housing it has now.

The Bridge over the A1 bypass

ELC state the bridge on the JCR was intended only for local farm access. This is incorrect when it was built all vehicles used it as I remember when it was built.

At one point ELC erected gates illegally without any consultation and they were removed. However, it is irrelevant what the original use for the bridge was as it has been used since it was built and currently is still being used regularly by locals as a daily commuting access route.

The bridge is owned and maintained by Transport Scotland however ELC appear to have decided with no consultation with Transport Scotland, with no structural report and no evidence to support their claim that it is not safe for vehicles to use but fine for farm vehicles to use!

To think that Transport Scotland would have built a bridge over such an important main road as the A1 bypass and built it inferior to any other bridge over the A1 is ludicrous.

There are bridges all over the country including East Lothian that are used by all types of traffic today that they were certainly not built for. Some were built for horse and carts and are being used heavily by vehicles. They are not being closed.

The bridge at Drem Train Station is a single bridge with bad bends making it impossible to see oncoming traffic. Based on the above assumption will it close?

The bridge at East Linton and Musselburgh date back hundreds of years. Based on the above assumption will they close?

The bridge at Ormiston has priority arrows and is very old will it close?

There are several bridges without proper pavements ie drem bridge. Based on the above assumption will it close?

There are bridges identical to the Johnnie Cope Road bridge in East Lothian, one crosses the A1 a few miles away connecting Macmerry to St Germains the other a few miles further on, connecting the houses around the Biel Water to the A199. Does this mean ELC will close these bridges as well? I question why they can close one bridge on the assumption it is unsafe for cars but fine for combine harvesters and tractors and trailers but not another which is of the same construction and used by both commuting cars and vans as well as farm vehicles. Surely, they would have to close them all!!

ELC state the JCR bridge is safe for combine harvesters and other farm machinery, fire engines, tractors, and trailers to use but not cars or vehicles commuting to the train station and back.

Are ELC aware the weight of the listed vehicles they are allowing to access the road once its closed are a great deal more than a car or van or multiple cars and vans? It makes no sense to close this road.

If ELC were concerned about the safety of the bridge surely they would have contacted Transport Scotland the owners and closed the road and had a structural engineer investigate it and write a report but again Im afraid there is no evidence to back this up. If they were that concerned the bridge should have been repaired but there is nothing to repair. The only real reason seems to be that ELC just want to close the road to save repairing it and are looking for any excuse to do this.

Neglect of Road

The JCR has been neglected by the different Councils over many years which has resulted in the road falling into extreme disrepair. While other roads all over East Lothian are resurfaced and repaired the JCR has been ignored. Ive been told by the roads department and councillors that there just simply is no money to upgrade and repair the JCR which I find unbelievable when ELC is benefitting from the amount of development in the area and funding is found to the value of 11.3million pounds to regenerate the power station site. What about the regeneration of the JCR? All over East Lothian roads are being resurfaced and repaired why not the JCR? You can't even report potholes etc on the JCR as they are removed by ELC as soon as they are reported, Im sure this is illegal. By allowing the road to fall into such disrepair it will cost more to bring it up to standard but that is not the communities fault it is ELCs fault for neglecting it.

<u>The Train Station</u> Many vehicles use the JCR to access the car park to travel to Edinburgh via train or to travel to Prestonpans, or Tranent. This is part of Active Travel using the train but by closing the road it may dissuade people to use the train due to the congestion and queues of traffic. By closing the road more vehicles will cause real congestion at the traffic lights on the lower part of the road and just after Bankton House opening, traffic will be forced to turn in the private drive and the amount of vehicles entering and leaving from the Prestonpans end of the road will increase greatly making it extremely dangerous. Large vehicles will be unable to access the cottages and Bankton House as the Railway bridge is low and the turns on the road too tight. The road needs to remain open to allow traffic to flow up and down the road safely.

ELC originally stated that they wished for the JCR to be used by cyclists, pedestrians, horse riders and emergency vehicles who will all be given access. Then once they read the communities objections from Prestonpans Community Council the reason for closure was changed and horse riders were removed from the list of who would have access.

The road will still require to be repaired no matter who has access. I am a cyclist and car driver and horse owner, and I can assure the council that the road would need to be repaired before cyclists, mobility scooters, wheelchairs and prams etc could use it. I will continue to campaign for the road to be repaired and upgraded until it is.

ELC cannot give some people access and not others its discrimination and it's a public right of way for all to use.

By putting gates across the bridge how do you expect mobility scooters, horse riders, cyclists and combine harvesters to gain access. You cannot narrow this bridge. The farmer requires unrestricted access to his fields. The council have not thought this through. If installing gates with some sort of locking system how will horse riders, mobility scooters, cyclists and pedestrians use the bridge as you cannot put two lanes on the bridge, one for combine harvesters, emergency services, hgvs and one for horse riders, cyclists etc the bridge is too narrow for this. If you put gates up, you are restricting access for everyone.

Does the council expect a horse rider to dismount to open the gate hold a horse and shut the gate walk and lead the horse over the bridge, what happens if it bolts, it would be trapped between two gates and the consequence could be life threatening (I am a horse owner and was an instructor) so can speak from experience. Then the rider must walk across the bridge leading the horse and open the second gate. What type of gates will be installed, there is no description, depending on how they open ie if it's just a barrier as in an arm that goes up in the air or an automatic gate both systems may cause a horse to bolt and with no rider on board the consequence would be fatal. We haven't even discussed how the council would expect the rider to mount the horse again. Would they have to stand on the said gate to mount there horse again no thought has been given to this. There must be no barriers, or gates on this road it's far too dangerous for the people who will be opening and closing them. Bollards cannot be put up as emergency services would be unable to get through resulting in loss of lives and motorbikes would be able to drive through them. The road must remain open for its full length.

Deliveries ELC have stated that if the residents require the gates to be open for a delivery or a horse lorry that cannot get under or round the bridge, they can book the gates to be unlocked by giving advanced notice. In this day and age, we do not know when delivery drivers etc will deliver and slots can be all day so how will this work especially in the winter will ELC employees be expected to stand at the gate for hours, days waiting to unlock them for a delivery?

Emergency Vehicles, Fire Engines, Ambulances, Horse Lorries and trailers, Combine Harvesters, Tractors, JCBs, Removal Lorries, HGVs to empty septic tanks all need access on a daily basis.

These vehicles will be unable to access the housing on JCR or at Bankton House as the road under the railway bridge is too narrow, with tight bends and the bridge is low. If the road is closed, the Prestonpans end of the road would be the only entrance and exit to the Railway car park it is highly likely an accident would happen as the number of vehicles will double and an HGV would not get around or under the bridge.

No thought has been given to the fact that wheelchair and mobility scooters have to use the road if they wish to travel to Edinburgh, they have no choice but to use the road as the pavement is narrow at the Prestonpans end of the road to the railway bridge. By closing the JCR to all vehicles and erecting gates the road will have more traffic on it as vehicles will have to enter and leave on the Prestonpans end of the road making others vulnerable. The road must remain open for its full length.

ELC have not considered the businesses that are on this road. The animal physiotherapist and her horses and customers require unrestricted access from the top of the road and the bottom. They drive HGV horse lorries which cannot fit under the railway bridge or around the corners. The residents have had no discussion or consultation on this. By closing the road to all vehicles except emergency and farm vehicles it will affect her business! If she wants the gate open she has to book this in advance. This is not practical and is unachievable and unrealistic. Does ELC expect the horse lorries to enter from the top of the road and park blocking the road while they lead their horses over the bridge. These horses and other animals require a physio so could

be lame. They would then have to reverse back up the JCR . I just do not see how this would work. The road needs to remain open as it will cause great danger if closed.

The farmer must get his combine harvester, Tractors etc in and out of his fields. If the gates are locked do you expect him to jump off his combine harvester from a height to open a gate climb back on , climb off, shut the gate, drive on the bridge, climb off on the bridge above the height of the bridge barrier (health & safety issue) open the gate climb back on, drive through, climb off, shut the gate, climb back on etc etc etc...that will not happen and it's a danger for him and his employees. Again, no thought has been given to the implication for businesses and other vehicles who use this road daily. The road must remain open for its full length.

The emergency services, fire service police and ambulance. They would all require the road to be open it's a vital quick route to the residents at bankton house and the residents in the cottages on JCR. There is an ambulance base at the bottom of the JCR in Prestonpans and the JCR is a direct access to the A1 without any queues of traffic. If you close the JCR they will have to find a key then find the lock and open the gates locking them behind themselves causing precious time to be lost while someone could be dying.

The JCR is a vital link to the villages of Prestonpans and Tranent in an emergency. If the gates were vandalised, how would the emergency services gain access. ELC are putting people's lives at risk by closing the road. It is paramount that emergency services, police, ambulances, and fire service can continue to safely use the whole road with no obstacles in their way therefore not only keeping residents safe but allowing the services quicker response times to either Tranent or Prestonpans or outlying villages and the bypass as at the top of JCR you can enter the bypass without travelling through any villages.

The police and ambulances use the road frequently. In the event of a fire, from what I believe, there is only one fire engine small enough to fit under the rail bridge. I am not sure if this has an extendable ladder, as the houses are all between 3 & 5 storeys high with the exception of a 1, 2 storey house. By putting gates on this road, you are putting lives at risk. The road must remain open for its full length.

Where is the emergency services consultation report have, they been out to Bankton House and assessed the situation if there was a fire? Have they been out to check their fire engines with ladders can manoeuvre under the bridge and around the corner? Has ELC invited them to attend a meeting with the residents to discuss access?No they haven't I have seen no reports etc so why are ELC putting peoples lives at risk? The JCR must remain open its entire length.

Local Taxi firms as well as the public need a road with no barriers as they use it regularly otherwise, they will be diverted for several miles adding to pollution and congestion.

<u>No traffic survey or management has been carried out by ELC</u> where are the statistics? I have seen none therefore they are choosing to close a road without any evidence to back it up. There is absolutely no reason to close it. It is a well-used vital road for the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent. My family and I use it regularly. You cannot close a road to all vehicles without having completed a traffic management survey of the area and the road itself.

By upgrading the road and keeping the road open it ensures current and future residents can receive deliveries, emergency services, removal trucks and horse lorries without there being a height restriction or delay while gates/barriers are opened. The residents of JCR deserve a road and pavement that is maintained, An easy solution would be to put traffic lights on the bridge or right of way arrows after all Ormiston Bridge has this and the top of fishers road is narrow and vehicles use it without any issues. This road has been neglected by ELC for as many years as I care to remember and there have been no accidents on it or the bridge. The road can easily be improved with traffic signals

or priority signs, road repairs and resurfacing and a shared pedestrian and cyclist path. ELC repair and resurface other roads in EL I do not understand why they are not repairing this vital link between our communities and it's a direct access point from and to the A1. The road must remain open for its full length.

The road has been neglected for years. The JCR should be upgraded and repaired like any other road in ELC. Not being able to afford to repair it, as I have been informed by the roads department is no excuse not to repair and upgrade it. If it is closed it will still require upgrading and resurfacing. There is absolutely no reason to close this well used vital road. Only recently ELC resurfaced Gullane main street and a large section of road near Merryhatton and part of Fishers Road in Port Seton and a road in Longniddry and the road at the side of Chalmers Church Port Seton and numerous others so why not the JCR I have never seen such an appalling state of a road anywhere in Scotland in my life its shocking and ELC should be held accountable. Don't put up barriers instead repair and upgrade the road and keep it open.

The Road is bordered by farmland, making it easy to widen. The bridge over the A1 would benefit from Traffic Lights for pedestrians, cyclists and vehicles to use. With the County swarming with developers, money should be available to upgrade the existing infrastructure. Only recently 11.3 million has been obtained for the Power Station site why are ELC not funding or finding funding to repair and upgrade the Johnnie Cope Road.

<u>Active Travel</u>. ELC are promoting Active travel but by closing the JCR vehicles will be forced to travel further adding to pollution and climate change. Commuters who would normally travel by train will be caught up in the congestion at Church Street and Blindwells adding to it and causing delays of 40minutes or more. Many will miss trains and resort back to travelling by car. This is not encouraging active travel. I regularly use the road and leave the bypass to venture straight down JCR, if the barriers /gates are installed I will have to leave at Wallyford adding to the pollution, queues and congestion or drive further to Blindwells then back on myself. Waiting and travelling longer and further while my vehicle pollutes the air. There is already an Active Travel Route linking Prestonpans to Tranent called the Heugh. By closing the JCR you will be increasing and doubling in places the amount of cars travelling through our villages which goes against the concept of active travel. You will instead achieve poorer Air Quality within our local villages as you force vehicles to increase their journeys and create and add to congestion.

<u>Traffic lights on the bridge and speed control measures (bumps</u>) and resurfacing the road would make a huge difference to current safety issues. Pushing all the station traffic into accessing only from the Prestonpans side will increase the likelihood of accidents due to the sharp bend at the entrance to the JCR. Money should be spent on improving the road rather than closing it! Does ELC think by closing the road they would not have to repair it or is it that if they make it an active travel route they will receive funding. Personally I do not see why it cant remain open and incorporate all of these upgrades.

The road under the railway bridge regularly floods. We currently live in a world with climate change one of the results of this is flash floods and more rain. If the road floods as it has done how will the cars parked in the car park get out and what about people in mobility scooters and wheelchairs they will be trapped. By erecting barricades across this road, the implications are vast and ELC will be held to account if anyone is trapped or injured due to this decision. The JCR must remain open with no barriers so if there is flooding vehicles, mobility scooters, and wheelchairs are not trapped as they have no other way to get out except to phone ELC and wait for someone to arrive with a key to unlock the gates and I wonder realistically how long that would take. This idea is an antiquated one which will cost lives.

<u>The Power Station Site</u> It is important to remember that with the 11.3 million levelling fund, the Power Station site will be developed over the next two and a half years starting this spring.

• Inch Cape have planning permission for building a substation and onshore transmission works. They have finalised and secured their plans with ELC. They have stated that there will be an increase in HGV traffic using the coal road to Cockenzie.

This means there will be an increase of HGVs and construction traffic and machinery as well as employees vehicles on the A1 Bypass, Bankton Roundabout and the A198 to access the Power Station site. These roads are already congested add to this the traffic listed and it will increase greatly adding to congestion and pollution which will all increase. The Power Station site will be worked from 7am to 7pm, 5 and a half days a week with a continuous stream of vehicles using these junctions and roads. ELC have the opportunity to keep the JCR open by doing this it will help ease congestion at the Bankton Junction, the roundabout at the B1361and at Blindwells.

- As well as this SeaGreen has in principle permission to build a substation on the site. More HGVs and more works traffic using these roads
- There is also to be a battery energy storage development built at the south of the substation. More HGVs and works traffic using these roads

The basis of the 11.3 million is to undertake site preparation and remediation works, to allow for future employment development. These works include: removal of the earthwork bunds surrounding the coal store and regrading that site to increase its developable area; using the bund material to infill the void where the power station stood; works to the underground cooling water tunnels; repair of the sea wall and improvement works to the John Muir Way.

It is quite clear that the power station site will be hugely developed which will increase the vehicles using these roads making them even more congested in the hot spot areas of Bankton Roundabout and Blindwells. By keeping the JCR open ELC can help reduce the congestion and pollution that will ensue.

- Add to this at the same time the creation of a cycle and pedestrian path on the B1361 and the traffic works and lights and closure of part of the road as this is created
- Add to this the housing development of a few hundred houses opposite Charles Phillips and son, Drummore House on the B1361 with the road works and traffic management systems and part closure that will ensue during the build. This will add to the congestion and queues of traffic.

ELC need to look at the bigger picture to see how the JCR road is absolutely vital to our communities. ELC have developed this area greatly with huge housing developments and a new village add to this the power station site and the amount of work and development happening there as well as the additional work to our roads to create a cycle pedestrian path an additional 300 houses at Drummore and it makes absolute sense to keep the JCR open to alleviate the mayhem that will ensue.

Do ELC really think closing the JCR road will help alleviate what will be the most congested roads in East Lothian. Absolutely not we need to keep it open, in this way, it will help alleviate the gridlock, congestion and pollution that is about to ensue.

All in all, this is not a well thought out proposal and just because a process was started and never completed is not a reason to close this road, which as I have said is a vital road for our communities and the residents and businesses who use it. The JCR is one of two direct routes linking the villages of Prestonpans and Tranent and must remain open for all to use. It is also a direct link to the A1 with an exit and entrance road within metres of the JCR. By keeping it open it also helps to alleviate the congestion at other hotspots in the area. (blindwells, Bankton Roundabout, the A198, Church Street, Gardiner Terrace, the B1361 etc)

THE SOLUTION

There is a solution....KEEP IT OPEN.....HOW?

There are ways to fund the work required on the JCR to keep it open and create a pedestrian and cycle path as well as giving access to all vehicles at the same time. Other villages have done this ie gullane to drem path, Beckys strip near North Berwick, the cycle path from blindwells to the train station, the improvements to dean woods in Longniddry, the resurfacing of the Longniddry to Haddington railway walk. All mainly achieved from funding. (Sustrans, community funds etc) There is a diverse range of people in our community who all want to see this road remain open for all to enjoy. The road just requires widening, resurfacing, some street lights and traffic lights installed at the bridge. ELC state it is too far and costly to run power to the bridge for traffic lights however with funding and the money created from all the new developments this can be achieved. Cyclists, pedestrians, and vehicles can all share the road and if more land is required a portion can be purchased from the farmer although it is possible to use the grass verges which are large in themselves.

With the amount of resurfacing that has happened this month in East Lothian the JCR could have been resurfaced twice over.

Prestonpans should not be neglected in this way. If the road was in North Berwick, Dunbar, Gullane or Haddington I'm sure I would not be having to write a letter to object and justify why in this day and age a well-used road linking to the A1 should remain open. I hope you will make the right decision for the communities you serve.

Roads (Scotland) Act 1984 Redetermination of Johnnie Cope Road

With reference to the above, Longniddry Community Council have been made aware that East Lothian Council propose to close the Johnnie Cope Road to mechanised traffic, with the obvious exception of emergency services.

We are also aware that both Prestonpans Community Council and Tranent and Elphinstone Community Council are submitting objections to these plans, and Longniddry Community Council would also like to make our objections known.

We are of the opinion that if this well used historical road is closed to mechanised traffic as suggested, this will have a large impact on traffic using the A198 from Bankton Roundabout towards Meadowmill Roundabout to drive back and forth between Tranent and Prestonpans, particularly at peak times when commuters are travelling to and from Prestonpans Railway Station. This is already a particularly busy stretch of road at the present time, and which will obviously become even more so as the building of houses increases in this area. You may be aware that recent roadworks at Meadowmill Roundabout caused gridlock on this stretch of the A198, therefore we are concerned that an upsurge in the volume of traffic may have a similar effect.

We would therefore like to object to the closure of the Johnnie Cope Road and suggest that the road should be retained and maintained to a good standard by East Lothian Council.

We note that Longniddry Community Council were not given prior notice of these proposals and would be obliged if you could please note that as Blindwells has not yet been designated as a separate area and cannot have its own Community Council at the present, it still requires the help and support of Longniddry Community Council for the immediate future. Bearing that in mind, we would therefore be obliged if you could copy Longniddry Community Council into any further communications in respect of this proposal.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing to you all in relation to the proposed closure/redetermination of the Johnnie Cope Road, Prestonpans, East Lothian.

I appreciate there may have been a plentiful supply of objections prior to my own. Even if you do not read my letter in full please read the following very important point, which may be unique from all others already put forward.

I am a Police Constable with the British Transport Police (BTP), I am also a resident of Prestonpans. Prestonpans railway station and all railway tracks and associated buildings/services are policed by my force.

I have first-hand experience in attending emergencies on the railway throughout East Lothian and most pertinently at Prestonpans railway station. The Johnnie Cope Road is an invaluable route in ensuring I, and my colleague's, are able to attend life threatening emergencies quickly, and when absolutely necessary, to the south side of the station.

Incidents I have attended at Prestonpans railway station include people in mental health crisis who are intent on ending their life by stepping out in front of a train where seconds do really count in attending and removing them before the next high speed non-stopping train is due through. For reference - the line speed for this section, bearing in mind it is the East Coast mainline, is 125mph.

I have attended numerous incidents where there have been children trespassing on the line, again the Johnnie Cope Road provided an invaluable route to get to where we were needed to access the line and remove children before any trains were able to pass through.

In instances where people have sadly been struck by a train and are deceased, the best access to the station and the line is provided by all routes possible, this includes the Johnnie Cope Road and access gates to the south of the station.

Whilst I am able to share my experiences I am not commenting on behalf of my force and all views are my own. Nonetheless, any decision to close or hamper the use of the Johnnie Cope Road will likely have a detrimental impact on the ability of emergency services responding to incidents in and around Prestonpans railway station. The proposal for access to be provided upon giving notice and a key being brought for the gates will never work in an emergency where we, and other emergency services, would likely be on scene within minutes of a call being made.

In the event of a train on fire, it is necessary for the driver of the affected train to make for the nearest station, if safe to do so, to allow the safe disembarking of any passengers. This would result in a train on fire stopping at Prestonpans railway station. If this was an Edinburgh bound service, which stops at the south side of the station, the fire service would need to attend the south car park accessed via the Johnnie Cope Road, none of their vehicles would likely fit underneath the underpass and if the bridge was compromised by a major incident there would be no vehicular access from north to south of the station.

In the event of a train on fire, it is necessary for the driver of the affected train to make for the nearest station, if safe to do so, to allow the safe disembarking of any passengers. This

would result in a train on fire stopping at Prestonpans railway station. If this was an Edinburgh bound service, which stops at the south side of the station, the fire service would need to attend the south car park accessed via the Johnnie Cope Road, none of their vehicles would likely fit underneath the underpass and if the bridge was compromised by a major incident there would be no vehicular access from north to south of the station. Additional points: I note that the East Lothian Council (ELC) consultation provides no great detail in how any proposed gate/barrier system would operate. This suggests the correspondence is incomplete and additional information is necessary. 1. ELC state that as paperwork was not finalised in 1986 is not an adequate reason to close/redetermine a vital and well used route. In the time since 1986, the area has witnessed a huge increase in population and additional housing estates in the Prestonpans, Tranent, Wallyford and Blindwells areas. Vehicle ownership and use has also greatly increased since 1986. Congestion throughout the area has greatly increased following this pattern and resulted in increasing delays and traffic. 2. I'm led to believe that there has been no traffic survey or management conducted by ELC which suggests ELC are deciding to close a road without any relevant evidence to support the decision. No adequate reason appears to have been put forward to support the closure of a vital and well used road. 3. I believe the Johnnie Cope Road is an ancient public right of way, which existed well before the A1 road development – this should remain open and for use. 4. It has been stated by ELC that it is their intention to re-determine the Johnnie Cope Road for use by cyclists, pedestrians, horse riders and when required, emergency services - who will all be given access through the proposed locked gates. I have already explained why this would not work. 5. The Johnnie Cope Road has fallen into a very poor state and is uncomfortable in a vehicle and is likely dangerous on a bicycle owing to the pot holes, uneven surfaces and damage - if intended for use by these other users the road would undoubtedly require repair and resurfacing in any event. 6. The closure of the Johnnie Cope Road would greatly increase traffic, congestion and inconsiderate or illegal parking to the north side of the station due to a lack of direct access to the south side of the station. 7. I observe that there are similar roads including narrow bridges throughout Scotland which continue to operate and make use of traffic management/traffic lights to provide a safer road for all users. It is not clear if this has ever been considered by ELC. 8. In the 16 years that I have been driving I do not recall the Johnnie Cope Road ever being resurfaced or any major repair works being undertaken – I may be mistaken but that is my recollection. I argue that it would be more beneficial to the residents of the area for the road to be repaired and upgraded to ensure it is able to safely serve the communities for many years to come. 9. The Johnnie Cope Road provides an additional route, alleviating strain on the other residential routes throughout the county. Closure would result in additional congestion and delay through Wallyford, past Blindwells and other neighbouring routes. 10. From experience, the roadway beneath the bridge is prone to regular flooding. In the event of the Johnnie Cope Road being closed and the road beneath the bridge being impassable due to flooding, the south side of the station would be unreachable to vehicles. This would severely affect the north side of the station and surrounding roads whereby people would abandon their vehicles in order to board their train. Additionally, there is no accessible route from north to south except for via the underpass or the Johnnie Cope Road. In the event that both these routes are out of use, those with accessible requirements would be unable to access the station and board services Edinburgh bound. Yours sincerely

Unfortunately, we have found it necessary to bother the Cabinet Secretary and Minister with this matter as they presumably have the devolved power to adjudicate on this matter under section 71 of the *Roads (Scotland) Act 1984* (previously a matter for the Sec of State for Scotland), that is currently being utilised by East Lothian Council to close one of only two direct routes connecting the towns of Prestonpans and Tranent.

As explained at length in the letter, we reluctantly now find ourselves having to politely request the Transport Department to "call in" this decision to ensure detailed research of *all* options is at long last undertaken and for a public inquiry to be held *before* any decision to close this public road is made.

We would greatly appreciate it if the Cabinet Secretary and the Transport Minister were given sight of this letter prior to any response being issued by officials.

For full transparency, we have also copied into this email the local MSPs (constituency and South of Scotland), the Chief Exec and Council Leader of East Lothian Council, their legal department and the eight ward councillors representing the two communities most affected.

Dear Cabinet Secretary and Minister,

Johnnie Cope Road, Prestonpans – Proposed Road Closure I write on behalf of Prestonpans Community Council to formally object to the proposal by East Lothian Council to close an historic right-of-way, Johnnie Cope Road – one of the two direct routes connecting the towns of Prestonpans and Tranent. It is worth noting at the outset that the local authority of the time apparently originally proposed to close this road in 1986 around the time of the opening of the A1 bypass at Tranent. The intention then was for this ancient right of way to remain open solely to walkers and cyclists. However, East Lothian Council advise that the necessary TROs were never progressed by Lothian Regional Council. Despite having failed to follow the correct legal procedure to stop-up the road, the Regional Council did nonetheless briefly introduce gates in the early days after the A1 bisected the Johnnie Cope Road. These gates were apparently swiftly and repeatedly removed by persons unknown and the road has remained open to all users over the decades that have followed. It is our understanding that ELC Cabinet Members

were made aware of this error by Officers in January 2020 and authorised by the Council Cabinet to begin the closure procedure once again. East Lothian Council decided to use the original justifications offered for closure in 1986, covered by Sections 1(1), 68(1) and 152(2) of the Roads (Scotland) Act 1984. We have repeatedly attempted to engage, in good faith, with the local authority over several months to better understand their closure justifications (narrated below), but we now find ourselves in the reluctant position of having to write to yourself to object formally to the proposed stopping up of Johnnie Cope Road under the relevant provision stipulated in Section 71(2) of the same act. We have repeatedly asked the Local Authority for and have failed to receive the robust evidence that normally might be expected to support such a significant decision to close one of only two roads directly connecting a town of c.10.5k with its neighbouring community of c.11.9k. Consequently, we now unfortunately find it necessary to trouble you both, to ask for a determination to be made on this matter by you and your team. Given that transport is now a devolved matter, unlike at the time of the 1984 Act when it was in the hands of the Secretary of State for Scotland, we believe that Section 71 of the above Act empowers one of you to adjudicate on this matter. Page 2 of 5 Background to objection Johnnie Cope Road Johnnie Cope Road is a short stretch of adopted road that directly links the towns of Prestonpans and Tranent. It got its name as the starting point of General Cope's panicked retreat straight to Carlisle following his defeat at the Battle of Prestonpans in 1745. In 1986, as the A1 was being constructed, the road was bisected almost exactly in half and a single track bridge was built across the A1, of exactly the same construction as those still in use elsewhere along the A1 in East Lothian, connecting Macmerry to St Germains and connecting the settlements along the Biel Water to the A199. As briefly narrated above, the then local authority, began a process to close the road, believing that it was unnecessary to the local population. It has been repeated, at length that the bridge put in at the time was intended for local farm access only and that the road was deemed surplus to requirements. Immaterial original justifications We would politely suggest that decisions made (and not submitted to public scrutiny and consultation) almost four decades ago are utterly immaterial to the situation in 2023 and moving forward. In making the original decision, the Regional Council cited a provision under the Roads (Scotland) Act 1984, specifically clause 68 (1) which posited that the road "will become unnecessary". However, noone can be in doubt that the intervening 37 years have shown that this prediction was far from correct. Local circumstances have changed considerably. The settlements of Prestonpans, Tranent, Cockenzie and Port Seton have all virtually doubled in size over that period, with significant housebuilding taking place. As this very decision is being made an entire "new town" development is under way between these settlements at Blindwells, the first phase of which will add 1,600 commuter homes all connecting into a short stretch of the A198 – this is the only other direct connection from Prestonpans to Tranent and the A1. Page 3 of 5 Additionally, this section of the A198, next to the Bankton Junction, also connects the communities of Cockenzie and Port Seton, Longniddry, Gullane, Aberlady and North Berwick to the A1. In our view it is completely illogical and entirely inappropriate to attempt to close the only alternative local relief road, while the traffic pressures on the A198 can only intensify in the coming years. Over the last few months, we have repeatedly attempted to engage with the Council on this point, asking them to provide reports that evidence the usage and the carbon and other impacts of closure on nearby roads. Initially going unacknowledged, we eventually received the results of a single traffic survey completed over a week in the winter of 2022 which showed in excess of a thousand journeys per day on the Johnnie Cope Road (mainly rush hour commuters on the way to and from the railway station park and ride on that road). No other data on adjacent roads was provided, which suggests either that the data conflicts with the reasoning for closure provided by Council officers, or that such data sadly does not exist, leaving the Council's primary justification for closure entirely unevidenced. We would also like to add that the original stated, but so far unsubstantiated, apparent intention for the bridge is also immaterial. We have bridges all over the country, some many centuries old, that are in regular use by all types of traffic today that they certainly were not built to accommodate. Those along our busiest of routes that have no longer been found fit for purpose for 20th or 21st century needs have been replaced, rarely have the roads been closed instead. Emergency and other necessary access to residential properties The Council proposes that the road will close beyond the properties at Bankton House and Farm and the park and ride facilities at the train station. While this will allow those residents to access their properties via Gardiner Terrace, Prestonpans, this access is only suitable for smaller vehicles due to an overhead railway bridge. Larger vehicles such as vans, horse transports and especially emergency vehicles cannot access the properties at Bankton from this direction. The

Council's suggested solution to this is to install a padlocked gate at either side of the bridge over the A1. While emergency vehicles will have access to the keys, Bankton residents have expressed sincere fears that these gates will unnecessarily impede and delay the arrival of emergency vehicles in getting to the scene of an emergency. Other local residents have rightly also pointed out that the route is also regularly used by ambulances housed at the Prestonpans ambulance station, just a few hundred metres away from the entrance to the Johnnie Cope Road. There appears to have been no real consideration given to the extra time or difficulty posed by alternative routes, in the event that the suggested key option fails. One Bankton resident reported at our most recent public meeting, his daughter's bedroom is on the 5 th floor of his property south of the railway line, requiring a ladder vehicle in the event of a fire. The precious seconds or minutes spent fumbling around in the darkness at two gates across the Johnnie Cope Road Bridge, could potentially mean the difference between life and death. As a Community Council, we have yet to see any formal response to these concerns by the emergency services and we struggle to see how the proposed benefits of closure are balanced against this potential risk. Concerns have also been raised repeatedly with the Council that the access via Gardiner Terrace has a history of severe flooding, which would cut off vehicular ingress and egress to Bankton residents. Council officers have indicated that affected residents could request access from the other entrance but would be required to do so in advance. As climate change intensifies and rainstorms become more common, obviously it would not be possible for tenants to predict when flooding may occur, nor have the Council provided compelling evidence that recent remedial works are sufficient to prevent the re-occurrence of serious flooding. Page 4 of 5 The process of requesting access is rumoured to be requesting for a key-holder from the Council offices at Macmerry to be in attendance at a specific time to open both gates. In an age of multihour or all-day delivery windows, for every conceivable good and service, and restricted local authority resources such an arrangement is clearly unworkable. Bridge condition The Council has also recently asserted that the Johnnie Cope Road bridge over the A1, owned and maintained by Transport Scotland, has to be shut "on the grounds of road safety" as the bridge is declared to be unsuitable for the volume of traffic currently using it. Again, we have asked multiple times for the Council to provide recent structural analysis and formal reports that confirm the bridge is dangerously incapable of serving the current number of vehicles that regularly use it. We are told that such a condition survey would be the responsibility of Transport Scotland and that the County Engineer had completed a visual (if not formal) assessment and decreed the bridge unfit. It is of grave concern to us as a Community Council that the Council apparently considers that one of Traffic Scotland's bridges is a potential danger to traffic travelling on the A1, one of the busiest routes in the country. The proposal, going forward, is that the bridge will be safe enough to accommodate the weight of combine harvesters, fire engines, tractors and trailers and other heavy goods vehicles, but not a series of private cars on their way to the park and ride facilities on Johnnie Cope Road. As a Scottish Government agency, we would be grateful if Transport Scotland could provide its view on the safety of its bridge and any structural assessments to support the Council's opinion that the bridge is unsafe. We would also appreciate if Transport Scotland could confirm what engagement they have had with East Lothian Council on this determination, if any, as it would be unfathomable for a local authority not to consult the organisation tasked with the upkeep and maintenance of such a key piece of infrastructure on this road. Similarly, several other communities served by the very similarly designed and contemporary bridges across and along this stretch of the A1 would probably welcome assurances that Transport Scotland is not allowing traffic to pass over and under dangerous bridges in their care. If not, should these communities also be expecting a closure order soon? Inconsistent and problematic consultative process Prior to notable and voluble community opposition, the Council unfortunately seems to have had little sincere intention of engaging in meaningful public consultation on this matter. The reluctance of officers to provide any substantive, objective evidentiary basis to justify the closure of Johnnie Cope Road, their unwillingness to attend a Community Council and meet with local residents and their tendency to ignore very basic questions, offering further subjective assertions and equivocations instead, have given rise to public fears that the current "consultation" exercise is merely ticking statutory boxes. These fears were only exacerbated by a significant "moving of the goalposts" part-way through the consultation process. As a statutory consultee we were asked in January this year to comment upon plans to close the road using only Section 68(1) of the Roads (Scotland) 1984 Act. In good faith, before responding, we sought the views of our local community at our public meetings, on social media and by email. We received 84 objections from concerned residents and just 4 in support of closure. We

submitted our formal and considered objection only to find out a few days later that, following internal legal advice, the Council was now using Sections 1(1) and 152(2) to justify closure in the next Page 5 of 5 stage of the consultative process. When we noticed, we asked for the process to be restarted. The Council apologised for the "misleading information contained in the draft order" but decided that the position of the goalposts had not changed sufficiently to alter their plans. Ways forward For many years it has been evident that the Local Authority has not maintained Johnnie Cope Road to a standard of other similar adopted roads in the county. Misinformation and confusion about the actual ownership of the road and the bridge has also further muddied public discussions and concerns about the condition of both pieces of public infrastructure over many years at the Community Council and other public fora. We are firmly of the opinion that this important road should be maintained and upgraded for all users. It should be repaired to acceptable standards and speed-calming measures and pavements should be introduced where appropriate to do so. Traffic signals should also be erected on either side of the single-track bridge to restrict numbers on the bridge at any one time and to ensure safe passage in both directions. None of this is surely unreasonable to ask for in one of only two busy, well-used, direct routes between the towns of Prestonpans and Tranent, particularly as we already have an excellent, if under-invested, active travel route between these communities just a few hundred metres to the east of the Johnnie Cope Road. However unacknowledged in this specific process, it is hopefully inconceivable and unacceptable to you and your department that Local Authority Officers, seeking to save money on long overdue road upgrades and repairs, might use historic and obscure justifications to close roads in disrepair or turn them into cheaper "active travel" routes instead. Imagine the local and national precedent that such a drastic action as this could set. Would any pot-holed B-road in the country be safe? We would therefore be grateful for your views on both the legality and the spirit of this process and for your calling this decision in for a public inquiry, as per the powers granted to you under Section 71 of the above Act. (Your Ref: N/T1A/23/KS/) We thank you for your letter on the above matter dated 23 January 2023. Having consulted widely with fellow local residents (in person, on our social media and by email), viewed extensive commentary on a new local grassroots campaigning page (with over 700 followers in a few weeks) and discussed the matter in detail at two recent public meetings of the Community Council we write back to you to object to your proposal to close Johnnie Cope Road to mechanised traffic in the strongest possible terms. In the three weeks since you sent us your letter, we have received from members of the public 84 notes and comments objecting to the road's closure and only four in favour. Concerns vary from the likely negative impacts on traffic levels on other nearby routes, access to homes and businesses south of the railway bridge, emergency and heavy goods access to those homes, increased journey time emissions, overall inconvenience and fears about flooding under bridge that might trap vehicles in the railway car park and prevent access and egress from homes south of the bridge. Interestingly, a significant number of correspondents independently share the opinion of our Community Council that rather than being shut, the adopted roads on either side of the bridge over the A1 should instead be properly repaired, traffic-calming measures introduced, adequate pedestrian pavement provided and traffic lights on either side of the bridge added. Your decision to very belatedly seek to enact a provision from the Roads (Scotland) Act 1984, specifically clause 68(1), is a contentious one. The quoted clause specifies that the road in question "will become unnecessary", something that has proved to be demonstrably incorrect over the last 36 years or so given the increasingly heavy use on the road as the numbers of households expanded dramatically in both Prestonpans and Tranent. If it is the Council's assertion that the Johnnie Cope Road is now "unnecessary" what metrics have you used to come to such a decision? 1 of 4 Additionally, this proposed legislative justification for closure actually conflicts with the justification for closure given by your own spokesperson and published in the East Lothian Courier on the 2nd February which states: "The main reason for the road to be closed to vehicular traffic is on the grounds of road safety. The structure was not designed to take the volume of traffic using it." This contradictory justification is notable for two particular reasons. The first is the Council's apparently inadvertent admission that the road is in fact heavily used, therefore suggesting that it is in fact a "necessary" road. Secondly, it suggests that the Council has failed in its statutory duty to ensure that the bridge's owner, Transport Scotland, has kept the bridge connecting the two sides of your adopted road in a condition that is appropriate to the needs of our busy and growing local communities. Your spokesperson goes on to say that the bridge "was built as an accommodation bridge for a farmer" and that it was "always intended to be closed to vehicular traffic." Both of these statements are utterly immaterial to the situation we find ourselves in today. On the first statement, many historic bridges across Scotland were built for different purposes than those which there are currently used. It is often the case that such bridges have had to be adapted or replaced due to wear and tear or simply to meet new needs, this is one of those cases. On the second point, it does not matter what was "intended" almost forty years ago, the fact remains that the appropriate road closure legislation was not implemented at the time and the historic Johnnie Cope Road remained opened to through traffic after the A1 cut right across it. The communities of Prestonpans and Tranent have grown considerably in the last 37 years and the two roads connecting our two towns are used far, far more in 2023 than they ever were in 1986 when an council officer first considered closure but failed to seek the appropriate order. Your spokesperson concluded that "there are alternative, more appropriate roads within close proximity." No objective data to back up such a significant claim has so far been provided to us. Where are the traffic studies and projections for these nearby roads recording current usage and projected modelling to justify this bold assertion? What work has been done to examine how this traffic displacement will impact upon the chaotic traffic jams already being experienced at the Bankton Junction ramps as the new Blindwells development comes on stream? What research has been completed to assess whether an upgraded Johnnie Cope Road (or even more simply a properly maintained Johnnie Cope Road) would be of more benefit to the populations of Prestonpans and Tranent? If any such research has been done, why has this not been shared with us? We appreciate that you have attempted to use a 39 year old year piece of legislation to close the Johnnie Cope Road, but The Local Authorities' Traffic Orders (Procedure) (Scotland) Regulations 1999 requires you to have consulted beforehand with, among others, the operators of public passenger transport services. Has such a consultation taken place with 2 of 4 the various local taxi companies who regularly use this route? Taxis are an integral and recognised part of our public transport system, what consultation work has been carried out with local operators? What impact assessments have been carried out on increased financial costs to users and increased environment emissions of

forcing these vehicles to take a longer route between our two communities? Similarly, much of the public's and Bankton residents' concerns have understandably focused on emergency vehicle access. Your colleagues have assured us that the emergency vehicles will still be able use the bridge, opening the controlled gates or bollards. We have not yet had sight of the official agreement with your proposal from police, fire and ambulance services. Even if these emergency services are contented, in the round, with access provision through your new gates, has the increased likelihood of vandalism or accidental damage to any gate mechanism, particularly high in this isolated spot, been considered? When every second counts following an emergency call, lives may be at stake. Do you have 100% confidence that emergency vehicles will always have access through such barriers and never be delayed? We have also drawn to your officers' attention our serious concerns about flooding under the railway bridge. Their official response was that recent improvement works "...should keep the drains clear from any normal rainfall." We live in an age of climate change, "normal rainfall" is a thing of the past with heavier and heavier rainstorm events predicted. Inevitably, the road has already flooded since your remedial works were carried out. With a locked bridge to the south and flooded road to the north, residents at Bankton and commuters with their cars in the station car park will find their vehicles blocked in. A completely unacceptable situation. Moving back to your decision to use section 68(1) of the Roads (Scotland) Act 1984, to close this vital connecting road between Prestonpans and Tranent, rather than subsequent legislation, clause 71 of that act provides supplementary addenda to clause 68. We would draw your attention to sub-section 2(a)ii of that clause which states that any submitted objection to an application by a local authority to enact section 68 will be determined by the Secretary of State. Given that Transport is now a Devolved matter, we will be exercising our right under this clause to ask that the Scottish Transport Secretary's office for a ruling on this matter and will be encouraging local residents to do likewise. Your office appears to have taken a decision to close a well-used road without exercising a level of due diligence and pre-decision public consultation that most East Lothian residents would like to see as standard practice from their local authority. Your office has offered no qualitative or quantitative evidence to support closure beyond pale, unsubstantiated assertions. 3 of 4 Public opinion overwhelmingly supports not just the road staying open, but that it be properly maintained, traffic-calming on the road and traffic lights introduced at the bridge and proper pavements constructed. But you have ploughed on regardless with this unwanted scheme, convincing yourselves that the stopping up to mechanised traffic of a longestablished right of way is somehow a better solution for the needs of two busy towns in 2023. With only two direct routes connecting two population centres of 10,500 and 12,500, one of which is also the only current route out of and into an emerging "new town", it is ludicrous to the point of absurdity to suggest that one of these two roads is now classed as "unnecessary". Prestonpans Community Council is unanimous in its robust and total objection to this proposal. Yours sincerely, Chairperson, Prestonpans Community Council.

I live at Bankpark therefore I use the road daily. I have no problem with the road being closed completely to traffic as I can easily walk to/from Prestonpans train Station and it would be safer for my children to walk or cycle to/from Prestonpans for school if there was no traffic.

However I realise that some people can't/won't walk so perhaps a one way system would be a good alternative. If the road was to stay fully open, the idea of a traffic light on the bridge, or a widening of the bridge would make sense. Also a pavement all the way up, even if just one one side, would be appreciated by pedestrians.

One problem I foresee is access in or out of the train station car park on the Tranent side when the road becomes impassable because of flooding. Also, if the road is closed completely the traffic congestion around the blindwells area with people driving to/from Prestonpans will become even more problematic than it already is.

I wrote this email after seeing that the local councillors are working towards closing Johnnie Cole's road.

After reading their reasoning behind this as, '36 years ago we didn't close it so now we are' I really struggle to understand how this could possibly constitute as an actual reason?

As I'm sure you will be reading in the various community Facebook pages and posts regarding this proposal (if anybody is actually paying attention) there are a huge amount of residents on both sides of the A1 utterly puzzled behind the logic of this.

Also in these pages there are many reasons as to why the road should not be closed. For example, the state of the traffic management at the new Blindwells development causing daily issues with traffic queuing back onto the A1 thanks to the ridiculously short slip road and the lights controlling traffic into the new houses.

(Little side note on this area too, the original agreement with developers in this area was a small, set amount of houses were approved on the basis that the slip roads onto and off the A1 would be reworked to make them more suitable for the increased traffic the new town would bring. Now correct me if I am wrong but it would appear either the developers have failed to follow through with this promise or the councillors have been 'convinced' to waive this part of the terms somehow. I will not be holding my breath for the start of these upgrading works).

Now back to Johnnie Cope's road. We have covered the issues with the blindwells end of prestonpans so let's look at the Wallyford side.

Thanks to the decisions of the local councillors to allow a massive development to go ahead on what was registered as 'green field' area (for years the signs remained on lampposts whilst the groundwork's began) there is now thousands of houses, a new primary school and a new high school being built between Tranent and the existing Wallyford town.

Do the councillors really believe that this will have no affect on the existing roads? Have they driven past a school in the last 30 years? There are cars everywhere, driving like idiots and parking like idiots!

This is, as I am sure you are well aware after keeping up with the comments sections on your posts, just a small amount of concerns from local residents.

Instead of closing the well used road - despite the councils attempts to put people off using it with their complete and deliberate lack of maintenance - why not invest in resurfacing and fitting motion sensing traffic controls at either side of the bridge much like those controlling traffic under the rail bridge slightly further down the road?

If you are unfamiliar with the above mentioned rail bridge let me refresh your memory. It's the one that becomes totally impassable due to flooding on a regular basis! Just what you want when parking at the local train station and having to walk home as the local council have decided to close the only other viable route out.

Please do not respond to this point with 'we recently cleared the drains so this should no longer be an issue' or that 'recent drainage works will 'minimise' risk of flooding during 'normal rainfall' as has been posted on the threads from prestonpans community page as let's be honest that will, at most help for a few weeks. (When has Scotland ever just had 'normal rainfall'?)

Anyone with any knowledge of groundwork's knows you cannot pump millions of pounds worth of concrete into the old mine shafts that are scattered around East Lothian to allow houses to be built on top without seriously affecting the water table.

I draw your attention to the flooding throughout the East Lothian area that has been a growing issue over the last few years thanks to these developments. One such example is the A199 between the Kinweger recycling plant and Dolphingstone.

In short (sic) the proposed closure of Johnnie Cope's Road will without a doubt cause unnecessary delays due to added traffic on either end of Prestonpans, increase the carbon footprint of those drivers having to take the longer route and as it was 36 years ago when the gates were erected be a complete waste of time and money as the local residents break through and continue to use the road!

I am emailing in regards to the planned closure of Johnnie Copes Road linking Tranent and Prestonpans.

This is a road that our family use at least 4 times a week, and saves a much longer drive via Strawberry corner or Blindwells to reach Prestonpans train station. Living off Birseley Brae, it's a 2 mile drive from our home to the train station via Johnnie Copes road. If we were to go via the A199 to strawberry corner and then back on ourselves on the B1361 it's 4.5 miles, and via Blindwells it's 4 miles. Both of these options take us past massive housing developments which are becoming busier and busier with traffic, and are areas we would prefer to avoid if we can. Why add to the pressure on these roads and roundabouts when there is a perfectly good access road already in place?



It is imperative that the above road remains open!

ELC must have the knowledge and statistics to prove that if this road is closed it will involve even more traffic chaos at Blindwells and Meadowmill Roundabout. At the moment to negotiate Meadowmill Roundabout and Blindwells is horrendous and instead of closing the above road it would be advantageous to upgrade the road immediately which makes it shorter and easier for drivers to commute between Tranent and Prestonpans. I am of the opinion that ELC is not giving consideration to roads, etc., and allowing houses to be built anywhere and neglecting the very necessary infrastructure in our County.

I worked for ELC for 47 years and I am greatly disturbed and sad at the significant deterioration and decline in the services now provided by ELC.

In light of the above proposal I wish to raise the following points for consideration.

1 Restricted access to Bankton properties for

- -delivery/removal vehicles
- Horse boxes to Bankton Stables
- Tankers to empty sceptic tanks and most importantly

- emergency services vehicles especially fire engines with extending ladders being unable to access the low bridge at the railway.

2 Loss of use by local traffic between Tranent and Prestonpans, especially people wishing to access the railway station from Tranent.

3 An increase in traffic using the road north of the railway bridge which includes a sharp bend with difficulties encountered bypassing vehicles. Although repairs to the road drains in the past have reduced the amount of flooding, there is still partial flooding during heavy rainfall.

4 Closure of the road would increase the amount of traffic using the Bankton junction at Blindwells and leave no alternative short detour. In addition to the above this road allows traffic from Prestonpans to access the A1 without the need to use the main road through Wallyford.

I hope that these points will be considered by the entire ELC. Thank you



We are writing to inform you that we wish the Johnnie Cope Road to remain open for the following reasons :

Firstly this consultation should never have been made as ELC have not reported how the locked gate system will operate. The paperwork is therefore incomplete, and more information is required.

1. For ELC to state because the paperwork wasn't completed in 1986 is not a reason to close this well used vital road.

Since 1986 this area has been developed greatly with large housing estates all over East Lothian particularly Prestonpans, Tranent, Blindwells, and Wallyford resulting in a vast increase in the population, and in the number of vehicles on these roads. This has resulted in ques of traffic and congestion at Wallyford and Blindwells. By closing the JCR the traffic that would normally use it will have to use either Blindwells or Wallyford and Longniddry roads instead which will add to congestion, pollution and adding to climate change. Even the boundaries of EL have changed. It is ludicrous to base the closing of a road in 2023 on paperwork from 1986. 37 years ago!

- No traffic survey or management has been carried out by ELC therefore they are choosing to close a road without any evidence to back it up. There is absolutely no reason to close it. It is a well-used vital road for the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent. My family and I use it regularly.
- 3. The Johnnie Cope Road is an ancient public right of way that shouldn't be closed.
- 4. <u>ELC state they wish it to be used by cyclists, pedestrians, horse riders and emergency vehicles who will all be given access</u>.

The road will still require to be repaired no matter who has access. I am a cyclist and car driver and horse owner, and I can assure the council that the road would need to be repaired before cyclists, mobility scooters, wheelchairs and prams etc could use it. I will continue to campaign for the road to be repaired and upgraded until it is.

ELC cannot give some people access and not others its discrimination and it's a public right of way for all.

By putting gates across the bridge how do you expect mobility scooters, horse riders, cyclists and combine harvesters to gain access. You cannot narrow this bridge. The farmer requires unrestricted access to his fields. The council have not thought this through. If installing gates with some sort of locking system how will horse riders, mobility scooters, cyclists and pedestrians use the bridge as you cannot put two lanes on the bridge, one for combine harvesters, emergency services, hgvs and one for horse riders, cyclists etc the bridge is too narrow for this. If you put gates up, you are restricting access for everyone.

Does the council expect a horse rider to dismount to open the gate hold a horse and shut the gate walk and lead the horse over the bridge, what happens if it bolts, it would be trapped between two gates and the consequence could be life threatening (I am a horse owner and was an instructor) so can speak from experience. Then the rider has to walk across the bridge leading the horse and open the second gate. What type of gates will be installed, there is no description, depending on how they open ie if it's just a barrier as in an arm that goes up in the air or an automatic gate both systems may cause a horse to bolt and with no rider on board the consequence would be fatal. We haven't even discussed how the council would expect the rider to mount the horse again. Would they have to stand on the said gate to mount there horse again no thought has been given to this. There must be no barriers, or gates on this road it's far too dangerous for the people who will be opening and closing them. Bollards cannot be put up as emergency services would be unable to get through resulting in loss of lives. The road must remain open for its full length.

5. <u>Emergency Vehicles, Fire Engines, Ambulances, Horse Lorries and trailers,</u> <u>Combine Harvesters, Tractors, JCBs, Removal Lorries, HGVs to empty septic tanks</u> <u>all need access on a daily basis.</u>

These vehicles will be unable to access the housing on JCR as the road under the railway bridge is too narrow, with tight bends and the bridge is low. If the road is closed, the Prestonpans end of the road would be the only entrance and exit to the Railway car park it is highly likely an accident would happen as the number of vehicles will double and an HGV would not get around or under the bridge. No thought has been given to the fact that wheelchair and mobility scooters have to use the road as the pavement is too narrow. The road will have double the amount of traffic on it as vehicles will have to enter and leave on this section of road making others vulnerable. The road must remain open for its full length.

6. <u>ELC have not taken into account the businesses that are on this road</u>. The animal physiotherapist and her horses and customers require unrestricted access from the top of the road and the bottom. They all drive HGV horse lorries. The residents have had no discussion or consultation with ELC and DO NOT KNOW how access will be given.

The farmer has to get his combine harvester, Tractors etc in and out of his fields. If the gates are locked do you expect him to jump off his combine harvester from a height to open a gate climb back on , climb off, shut the gate, drive on the bridge, climb off on the bridge above the height of the bridge barrier (health & safety issue) open the gate climb back on, drive through, climb off, shut the gate, climb back on etc etc etc...that will not happen and it's a danger for him and his employees. Again, no thought has been given to the implication for businesses and other vehicles who use this road daily. The road must remain open for its full length.

- 7. The emergency services, fire service police and ambulance. They would all require the road to be open it's a vital quick route to the residents at bankton house and the residents in the cottages on JCR. Its also a vital link to the villages of Prestonpans and Tranent in an emergency. If the gates were vandalised, how would they gain access. ELC people's are puttina life's at risk bv closing the road. It is paramount that emergency services, police, ambulances, and fire service can continue to safely use the whole road with no obstacles in their way therefore not only keeping residents safe but allowing the services quicker response times to either Tranent or Prestonpans. The police and ambulance use the road frequently. In the event of a fire, from what I believe, there is only one fire engine small enough to fit under the rail bridge. I am not sure if this has an extendable ladder, as the houses are all between 3 & 5 storeys high with the exception of 1, 2 storey house. By putting gates on this road, you are putting lifes at risk. The road must remain open for its full length.
- 8. <u>Local Taxi firms</u> as well as the general public need a road with no barriers as they use it regularly otherwise, they will be diverted for several miles adding to pollution and congestion.
- 9. By upgrading the road and keeping the road open it ensures current and future residents can receive deliveries, emergency services, removal trucks and horse lorries without there being a height restriction or delay while gates/barriers are opened. The residents of JCR deserve a road and pavement that is maintained, An easy solution would be to put traffic lights on the bridge or right of way arrows after all Ormiston Bridge has this and the top of fishers road is narrow and vehicles use it without any issues. This road has been neglected by ELC for as many years as I care to remember and there have been no accidents on it. The road can easily be improved with proper signage, a repaired road and a decent pavement. ELC repair and resurface other roads in EL I do not understand why they are not repairing this vital link between our communities. The road must remain open for its full length.
- 10. <u>ELC have neglected the JCR for years.</u> This road should be upgraded and repaired like any other road in ELC. Not being able to afford to repair it, as I have been informed by the roads department is no excuse not to repair and upgrade it. If it is closed it will still require upgrading and resurfacing. There is absolutely no reason to close this well used vital road. Only recently ELC resurfaced Gullane main street and a large section of road near Merryhatton and will be resurfacing the top of Fishers Road in Port Seton there are numerous others so why not JCR. Don't put up barriers instead repair the road and keep it open.
- 11. <u>The Road is bordered by farmland, making it easy to widen.</u> Lights would solve the blind summit problem. With the County swarming with developers, money should be available to upgrade existing infrastructure. Only recently 11.4 million has been obtained for the Power Station site why are ELC not funding or finding funding to repair this road. Where is the option to upgrade the Johnnie Cope Road.
- 12. <u>Active Travel</u>. ELC are supposed to be promoting Active travel but by closing the JCR vehicles will be forced to travel further adding to pollution and climate change. Commuters who would normally travel by train will be caught up in the congestion at Blindwells adding to it and causing delays of 40minutes or more. Many will miss trains and resort back to travelling by car. This is not encouraging active travel. I regularly use the road and leave the bypass to venture straight down JCR, if the barriers /gates are installed I will have to leave at Wallyford adding to the pollution, ques and congestion or drive further to Blindwells then back on myself. Waiting and travelling longer and further while my vehicle pollutes the air.
- 13. <u>Traffic lights on the bridge and speed control measures (bumps</u>) would make a huge difference to current safety issues. Pushing all the station traffic into accessing only from the Prestonpans side will increase the likelihood of accidents due to the sharp bend at the old entrance to the station which has been developed greatly with several roads,

housing and traffic lights. Money should be spent on improving the road rather than closing it!

14. <u>The road under the railway bridge regularly floods</u>. We currently live in a world with climate change one of the results of this is flash floods and more rain. If the road floods as it has done how will the cars parked in the car park get out. The JCR must remain open with no barriers so if there is flooding cars are not trapped.

This is not a well thought out proposal and just because a process was started and never completed is not a reason to close this road, which as I have said is a vital road for our communities and the residents and businesses who use it. In the past the people of Prestonpans fought to keep this road open and were successful we can only hope on this occasion that history repeats itself.

Hi, I've just read Pat Milligan's post to the community council, and would like to pick up on a few points from a wheelchair user's point of view.

If the council close this road, it's fair to assume that people currently using the train station from the Tranent side will need to come to Prestonpans to get to the car park. The increase in volume of traffic will certainly affect wheelchair users who need to get the train into Edinburgh.

We (non-drivers) have no option but to go under the bridge, on the road since the pavement is far too narrow for a wheelchair. It's dangerous enough right now, but it will be impossible if there is an increase in traffic. The flooding under the bridge also makes it impossible to catch a train. Those bevelled mirrors that Pat spoke about would help tremendously, but what would be even better would be to demand a full path for people accessing the station.

The Equality Act says " there's a duty to make reasonable adjustments if you're placed at a **substantial disadvantage** because of your disability compared with non-disabled people or people who don't share your disability." I would argue that making changes that will increase traffic at an already dangerous junction will substantially disadvantage wheelchair users, who will no longer be able to safely use the Train Station.

I don't know if this will be useful, and am happy to leave it up to you to decide whether to pass it on or not. One major disadvantage of passing it on that worries me is that the Council may use the access issue as an excuse to build a new station at Blindwells (a lot less accessible for nondrivers in Presonpans). I have a feeling that closing this road is to give the council more ammunition to carry forward their plan for a station at Blindwells. I think our next fight will be to retain Prestonpans Train Station.

Hi

We live in Prestonpans and have a child where there is shared care with a parent in Tranent. The child also goes to Ross High School.

This road provides an exceptionally important alternative to meadowmill/blindwells/church street route. That route can be very congested and has been closed or has had numerous times in recent months where there has been temporary traffic lights.

I strongly feel the road should remain open, but the council also have a duty of care to the residents of Prestonpans and Tranent that it should be properly maintained.

To whom it may concern:

I reside at Bankton Cottages on the said road and want to make my feelings on the matter very clear.

The road as it stands is an absolute disgrace. We have lived here for 23yrs and paid our council tax but have no decent pavement, no street lighting and at times when there is heavy rain we are marooned by flooding under the rail bridge and at the Tranent side of the bridge over the A1 walking is not an option and you drive through at your peril.

It is my opinion that this entire stretch of road requires appropriate upgrading to make it safe for all.

1. Completely resurfaced (as happened in Gullane main street recently, with no apparent necessity).

2. Traffic lights at the bridge.

3. Widening of the road where possible.

4. Proper drainage put in to stop flooding and erosion of the road surface. (Potholes were filled just before Xmas and heavy rain over the next few days and the holes were washed clean and in fact since then have gotten a lot more dangerous, a waste of tax payers money!).

5. Speed bumps at the bottom part of the road, from the A1 bridge down to car park to deter speeding drivers and therefore make safer the pavements for pedestrians.

6. Work redone on drainage under the rail bridge as it once again floods after heavy rain.

7. A bevelled mirror at the corner opposite old entrance to the station for safety coming round the tight bend.

8. Lastly an upgrade of what pavements exist and where possible, road widening and creation of new pavements or space for walkers.

The safety aspect of doing this work will enhance traffic congestion around the area. For example take pressure of Wallyford a narrow enough road in a very built up area and the slip road /junction at the other end, Blindwells which is already causing congestion without the added lights currently in use.

Ensure emergency services, police, ambulances and fire service can continue to safely use the road. Therefore not only keeping residents safe but allowing the services quicker response

times to either town. I can vouch for both police and ambulance using the road frequently usually when it requires a blue light. Also used frequently by local taxi services as well as the general public.

Prevent all traffic from Tranent side station car park having to use the narrow road under rail bridge to access the new car park. The council are well aware that the new volume of houses at Blindwells will cause more traffic therefore spending money on upgrading a well used local road makes safety sense for all not just the residents on the road

Ensure current and future residents can receive deliveries, emergency services and removal trucks without there being a height restriction or delay while gates/barriers are opened.

I wrote this email after seeing that the local councillors are working towards closing Johnnie Cole's road.

After reading their reasoning behind this as, '36 years ago we didn't close it so now we are' I really struggle to understand how this could possibly constitute as an actual reason?

As I'm sure you will be reading in the various community Facebook pages and posts regarding this proposal (if anybody is actually paying attention) there are a huge amount of residents on both sides of the A1 utterly puzzled behind the logic of this.

Also in these pages there are many reasons as to why the road should not be closed. For example, the state of the traffic management at the new Blindwells development causing daily

issues with traffic queuing back onto the A1 thanks to the ridiculously short slip road and the lights controlling traffic into the new houses.

(Little side note on this area too, the original agreement with developers in this area was a small, set amount of houses were approved on the basis that the slip roads onto and off the A1 would be reworked to make them more suitable for the increased traffic the new town would bring. Now correct me if I am wrong but it would appear either the developers have failed to follow through with this promise or the councillors have been 'convinced' to waive this part of the terms somehow. I will not be holding my breath for the start of these upgrading works).

Now back to Johnnie Cope's road. We have covered the issues with the blindwells end of prestonpans so let's look at the Wallyford side.

Thanks to the decisions of the local councillors to allow a massive development to go ahead on what was registered as 'green field' area (for years the signs remained on lampposts whilst the groundwork's began) there is now thousands of houses, a new primary school and a new high school being built between Tranent and the existing Wallyford town.

Do the councillors really believe that this will have no affect on the existing roads? Have they driven past a school in the last 30 years? There are cars everywhere, driving like idiots and parking like idiots!

This is, as I am sure you are well aware after keeping up with the comments sections on your posts, just a small amount of concerns from local residents.

Instead of closing the well used road - despite the councils attempts to put people off using it with their complete and deliberate lack of maintenance - why not invest in resurfacing and fitting motion sensing traffic controls at either side of the bridge much like those controlling traffic under the rail bridge slightly further down the road?

If you are unfamiliar with the above mentioned rail bridge let me refresh your memory. It's the one that becomes totally impassable due to flooding on a regular basis! Just what you want when parking at the local train station and having to walk home as the local council have decided to close the only other viable route out.

Please do not respond to this point with 'we recently cleared the drains so this should no longer be an issue' or that 'recent drainage works will 'minimise' risk of flooding during 'normal rainfall' as has been posted on the threads from prestonpans community page as let's be honest that will, at most help for a few weeks. (When has Scotland ever just had 'normal rainfall'?) Anyone with any knowledge of groundwork's knows you cannot pump millions of pounds worth of concrete into the old mine shafts that are scattered around East Lothian to allow houses to be built on top without seriously affecting the water table.

I draw your attention to the flooding throughout the East Lothian area that has been a growing issue over the last few years thanks to these developments. One such example is the A199 between the Kinweger recycling plant and Dolphingstone.

I am emailing in regards to the planned closure of Johnnie Copes Road linking Tranent and Prestonpans.

This is a road that our family use at least 4 times a week, and saves a much longer drive via Strawberry corner or Blindwells to reach Prestonpans train station. Living off Birseley Brae, it's a 2 mile drive from our home to the train station via Johnnie Copes road. If we were to go via the A199 to strawberry corner and then back on ourselves on the B1361 it's 4.5 miles, and via Blindwells it's 4 miles. Both of these options take us past massive housing developments which are becoming busier and busier with traffic, and are areas we would prefer to avoid if we can. I worked for ELC for 47 years and I am greatly disturbed and sad at the significant deterioration and decline in the services now provided by ELC.

In light of the above proposal I wish to raise the following points for consideration.

- 1 Restricted access to Bankton properties for
- -delivery/removal vehicles
- Horse boxes to Bankton Stables
- Tankers to empty sceptic tanks and most importantly

- emergency services vehicles especially fire engines with extending ladders being unable to access the low bridge at the railway.

2 Loss of use by local traffic between Tranent and Prestonpans, especially people wishing to access the railway station from Tranent.

3 An increase in traffic using the road north of the railway bridge which includes a sharp bend with difficulties encountered bypassing vehicles. Although repairs to the road drains in the past have reduced the amount of flooding, there is still partial flooding during heavy rainfall.

4 Closure of the road would increase the amount of traffic using the Bankton junction at Blindwells and leave no alternative short detour. In addition to the above this road allows traffic from Prestonpans to access the A1 without the need to use the main road through Wallyford.

I hope that these points will be considered by the entire ELC. Thank you



We are writing to inform you that we wish the Johnnie Cope Road to remain open for the following reasons :

Firstly this consultation should never have been made as ELC have not reported how the locked gate system will operate. The paperwork is therefore incomplete, and more information is required.

1. For ELC to state because the paperwork wasn't completed in 1986 is not a reason to close this well used vital road.

Since 1986 this area has been developed greatly with large housing estates all over East Lothian particularly Prestonpans, Tranent, Blindwells, and Wallyford resulting in a vast increase in the population, and in the number of vehicles on these roads. This has resulted in ques of traffic and congestion at Wallyford and Blindwells. By closing the JCR the traffic that would normally use it will have to use either Blindwells or Wallyford and Longniddry roads instead which will add to congestion, pollution and adding to climate change. Even the boundaries of EL have changed. It is ludicrous to base the closing of a road in 2023 on paperwork from 1986. 37 years ago!

- No traffic survey or management has been carried out by ELC therefore they are choosing to close a road without any evidence to back it up. There is absolutely no reason to close it. It is a well-used vital road for the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent. My family and I use it regularly.
- 3. The Johnnie Cope Road is an ancient public right of way that shouldn't be closed.
- 4. <u>ELC state they wish it to be used by cyclists, pedestrians, horse riders and</u> <u>emergency vehicles who will all be given access</u>.

The road will still require to be repaired no matter who has access. I am a cyclist and car driver and horse owner, and I can assure the council that the road would need to be repaired before cyclists, mobility scooters, wheelchairs and prams etc could use it. I will continue to campaign for the road to be repaired and upgraded until it is.

ELC cannot give some people access and not others its discrimination and it's a public right of way for all.

By putting gates across the bridge how do you expect mobility scooters, horse riders, cyclists and combine harvesters to gain access. You cannot narrow this bridge. The farmer requires unrestricted access to his fields. The council have not thought this through. If installing gates with some sort of locking system how will horse riders, mobility scooters, cyclists and pedestrians use the bridge as you cannot put two lanes on the bridge, one for combine harvesters, emergency services, hgvs and one for horse riders, cyclists etc the bridge is too narrow for this. If you put gates up, you are restricting access for everyone.

Does the council expect a horse rider to dismount to open the gate hold a horse and shut the gate walk and lead the horse over the bridge, what happens if it bolts, it would be trapped between two gates and the consequence could be life threatening (I am a horse owner and was an instructor) so can speak from experience. Then the rider has to walk across the bridge leading the horse and open the second gate. What type of gates will be installed, there is no description, depending on how they open ie if it's just a barrier as in an arm that goes up in the air or an automatic gate both systems may cause a horse to bolt and with no rider on board the consequence would be fatal. We haven't even discussed how the council would expect the rider to mount the horse again. Would they have to stand on the said gate to mount there horse again no thought has been given to this. There must be no barriers, or gates on this road it's far too dangerous for the people who will be opening and closing them. Bollards cannot be put up as emergency services would be unable to get through resulting in loss of lives. The road must remain open for its full length.

5. <u>Emergency Vehicles, Fire Engines, Ambulances, Horse Lorries and trailers,</u> <u>Combine Harvesters, Tractors, JCBs, Removal Lorries, HGVs to empty septic tanks</u> <u>all need access on a daily basis.</u>

These vehicles will be unable to access the housing on JCR as the road under the railway bridge is too narrow, with tight bends and the bridge is low. If the road is closed, the Prestonpans end of the road would be the only entrance and exit to the Railway car park it is highly likely an accident would happen as the number of vehicles will double and an HGV would not get around or under the bridge. No thought has been given to the fact that wheelchair and mobility scooters have to use the road as the pavement is too narrow. The road will have double the amount of traffic on it as vehicles will have to enter and leave on this section of road making others vulnerable. The road must remain open for its full length.

6. <u>ELC have not taken into account the businesses that are on this road</u>. The animal physiotherapist and her horses and customers require unrestricted access from the top of the road and the bottom. They all drive HGV horse lorries. The residents have had no discussion or consultation with ELC and DO NOT KNOW how access will be given.

The farmer has to get his combine harvester, Tractors etc in and out of his fields. If the gates are locked do you expect him to jump off his combine harvester from a height to open a gate climb back on , climb off, shut the gate, drive on the bridge, climb off on the bridge above the height of the bridge barrier (health & safety issue) open the gate climb back on, drive through, climb off, shut the gate, climb back on etc etc etc...that will not happen and it's a danger for him and his employees. Again, no thought has been given to the implication for businesses and other vehicles who use this road daily. The road must remain open for its full length.

- 7. The emergency services, fire service police and ambulance. They would all require the road to be open it's a vital quick route to the residents at bankton house and the residents in the cottages on JCR. Its also a vital link to the villages of Prestonpans and Tranent in an emergency. If the gates were vandalised, how would they gain access, ELC people's life's at risk are puttina bv closina the road. It is paramount that emergency services, police, ambulances, and fire service can continue to safely use the whole road with no obstacles in their way therefore not only keeping residents safe but allowing the services quicker response times to either Tranent or Prestonpans. The police and ambulance use the road frequently. In the event of a fire, from what I believe, there is only one fire engine small enough to fit under the rail bridge. I am not sure if this has an extendable ladder, as the houses are all between 3 & 5 storeys high with the exception of 1, 2 storey house. By putting gates on this road, you are putting lifes at risk. The road must remain open for its full length.
- 8. <u>Local Taxi firms</u> as well as the general public need a road with no barriers as they use it regularly otherwise, they will be diverted for several miles adding to pollution and congestion.
- 9. By upgrading the road and keeping the road open it ensures current and future residents can receive deliveries, emergency services, removal trucks and horse lorries without there being a height restriction or delay while gates/barriers are opened. The residents of JCR deserve a road and pavement that is maintained, An easy solution would be to put traffic lights on the bridge or right of way arrows after all Ormiston Bridge has this and the top of fishers road is narrow and vehicles use it without any issues. This road

has been neglected by ELC for as many years as I care to remember and there have been no accidents on it. The road can easily be improved with proper signage, a repaired road and a decent pavement. ELC repair and resurface other roads in EL I do not understand why they are not repairing this vital link between our communities. The road must remain open for its full length.

- 10. <u>ELC have neglected the JCR for years.</u> This road should be upgraded and repaired like any other road in ELC. Not being able to afford to repair it, as I have been informed by the roads department is no excuse not to repair and upgrade it. If it is closed it will still require upgrading and resurfacing. There is absolutely no reason to close this well used vital road. Only recently ELC resurfaced Gullane main street and a large section of road near Merryhatton and will be resurfacing the top of Fishers Road in Port Seton there are numerous others so why not JCR. Don't put up barriers instead repair the road and keep it open.
- 11. <u>The Road is bordered by farmland, making it easy to widen.</u> Lights would solve the blind summit problem. With the County swarming with developers, money should be available to upgrade existing infrastructure. Only recently 11.4 million has been obtained for the Power Station site why are ELC not funding or finding funding to repair this road. Where is the option to upgrade the Johnnie Cope Road.
- 12. <u>Active Travel</u>. ELC are supposed to be promoting Active travel but by closing the JCR vehicles will be forced to travel further adding to pollution and climate change. Commuters who would normally travel by train will be caught up in the congestion at Blindwells adding to it and causing delays of 40minutes or more. Many will miss trains and resort back to travelling by car. This is not encouraging active travel. I regularly use the road and leave the bypass to venture straight down JCR, if the barriers /gates are installed I will have to leave at Wallyford adding to the pollution, ques and congestion or drive further to Blindwells then back on myself. Waiting and travelling longer and further while my vehicle pollutes the air.
- 13. <u>Traffic lights on the bridge and speed control measures (bumps</u>) would make a huge difference to current safety issues. Pushing all the station traffic into accessing only from the Prestonpans side will increase the likelihood of accidents due to the sharp bend at the old entrance to the station which has been developed greatly with several roads, housing and traffic lights. Money should be spent on improving the road rather than closing it!
- 14. <u>The road under the railway bridge regularly floods</u>. We currently live in a world with climate change one of the results of this is flash floods and more rain. If the road floods as it has done how will the cars parked in the car park get out. The JCR must remain open with no barriers so if there is flooding cars are not trapped.

This is not a well thought out proposal and just because a process was started and never completed is not a reason to close this road, which as I have said is a vital road for our communities and the residents and businesses who use it. In the past the people of Prestonpans fought to keep this road open and were successful we can only hope on this occasion that history repeats itself.

Hi, I've just read Pat Milligan's post to the community council, and would like to pick up on a few points from a wheelchair user's point of view.

If the council close this road, it's fair to assume that people currently using the train station from the Tranent side will need to come to Prestonpans to get to the car park. The increase in volume of traffic will certainly affect wheelchair users who need to get the train into Edinburgh.

We (non-drivers) have no option but to go under the bridge, on the road since the pavement is far too narrow for a wheelchair. It's dangerous enough right now, but it will be impossible if there is an increase in traffic. The flooding under the bridge also makes it impossible to catch a train. Those bevelled mirrors that Pat spoke about would help tremendously, but what would be even better would be to demand a full path for people accessing the station.

The Equality Act says " there's a duty to make reasonable adjustments if you're placed at a **substantial disadvantage** because of your disability compared with non-disabled people or people who don't share your disability." I would argue that making changes that will increase traffic at an already dangerous junction will substantially disadvantage wheelchair users, who will no longer be able to safely use the Train Station.

I don't know if this will be useful, and am happy to leave it up to you to decide whether to pass it on or not. One major disadvantage of passing it on that worries me is that the Council may use the access issue as an excuse to build a new station at Blindwells (a lot less accessible for nondrivers in Presonpans). I have a feeling that closing this road is to give the council more ammunition to carry forward their plan for a station at Blindwells. I think our next fight will be to retain Prestonpans Train Station.

We live in Prestonpans and have a child where there is shared care with a parent in Tranent. The child also goes to Ross High School.

This road provides an exceptionally important alternative to meadowmill/blindwells/church street route. That route can be very congested and has been closed or has had numerous times in recent months where there has been temporary traffic lights.

I strongly feel the road should remain open, but the council also have a duty of care to the residents of Prestonpans and Tranent that it should be properly maintained.



To whom it may concern:

I reside at Bankton Cottages on the said road and want to make my feelings on the matter very clear.

The road as it stands is an absolute disgrace. We have lived here for 23yrs and paid our council tax but have no decent pavement, no street lighting and at times when there is heavy rain we are marooned by flooding under the rail bridge and at the Tranent side of the bridge over the A1 walking is not an option and you drive through at your peril.

It is my opinion that this entire stretch of road requires appropriate upgrading to make it safe for all.

1. Completely resurfaced (as happened in Gullane main street recently, with no apparent necessity).

2. Traffic lights at the bridge.

3. Widening of the road where possible.

4. Proper drainage put in to stop flooding and erosion of the road surface. (Potholes were filled just before Xmas and heavy rain over the next few days and the holes were washed clean and in fact since then have gotten a lot more dangerous, a waste of tax payers money!).

5. Speed bumps at the bottom part of the road, from the A1 bridge down to car park to deter speeding drivers and therefore make safer the pavements for pedestrians.

6. Work redone on drainage under the rail bridge as it once again floods after heavy rain.

7. A bevelled mirror at the corner opposite old entrance to the station for safety coming round the tight bend.

8. Lastly an upgrade of what pavements exist and where possible, road widening and creation of new pavements or space for walkers.

The safety aspect of doing this work will enhance traffic congestion around the area. For example take pressure of Wallyford a narrow enough road in a very built up area and the slip road /junction at the other end, Blindwells which is already causing congestion without the added lights currently in use.

Ensure emergency services, police, ambulances and fire service can continue to safely use the road. Therefore not only keeping residents safe but allowing the services quicker response times to either town. I can vouch for both police and ambulance using the road frequently usually when it requires a blue light.

Also used frequently by local taxi services as well as the general public.

Prevent all traffic from Tranent side station car park having to use the narrow road under rail bridge to access the new car park. The council are well aware that the new volume of houses at Blindwells will cause more traffic therefore spending money on upgrading a well used local road makes safety sense for all not just the residents on the road

Ensure current and future residents can receive deliveries, emergency services and removal trucks without there being a height restriction or delay while gates/barriers are opened.

Dear Sir/Madam RESPONSE TO PROPOSED JOHNNIE COPE'S ROAD CLOSURE I am writing to object in the strongest terms to the closure of Johnnie Cope's Road or the reclassification to solely a pedestrian/cycle route. There are several reasons which demonstrate that this proposal is unjust and is being attempted without due diligence. The impression being given is that this is simply a cost saving exercise without due regard to the residents of Johnnie Cope's Road, or the populations of Prestonpans and Tranent. Johnnie Cope's Road is a road which connects the 2 communities across the Tranent Bypass (A1) over a singletrack humpback bridge which was built in the late 1980s. The road is well used, with recent sample audit showing approximately 1100 users in a one-day period in November 2022. This despite the roads lack of maintenance by East Lothian Council. East Lothian Council appears to have changed the justification for this closure from being the condition of the bridge over the A1 to a situation of concern regarding safety. At this present moment the condition of the road, after years of neglect, is a situation which could easily cause damage to vehicles and certainly injury to others. Yet, this is a situation of the Council's own doing through lack of care in maintaining this road to the standard that it should be expected to be. This does not mean that the Council should simply turn their back and effectively say 'no money in the pot now that we have spent it all, lets close the road'. A few years ago, I ended up with a broken finger (now permanently damaged) after being thrown off my bicycle when the wheels became trapped in ruts/potholes on Johnnie Cope's Road. This was reported to the Council at the time, and minor repairs made. All these minor repairs however do not last, and the road needs to be completely resurfaced. This is not outwith the powers of the Council, who have recently publicised a number of other road resurfacing projects in the area. Long-term residents of Prestonpans have already indicated to me that several connections both sides of the A1 have been severed since the building of the A1. This is an attempt to break another link and make access between the 2 communities more challenging. In fact, restricting access to the road means that there is a large detour required, adding to the congestion particularly at Blindwells and longer term at Dolphingstone. Can this truly be said to be in the interest of Council Taxpayers or indeed the environment with greater distances needing to be travelled with carbon impact? Google Maps shows that a detour is 7 minutes (3.2 miles) via Strawberry Corner/Dolphingstone and 8 minutes (2.7 miles) via Blindwells. The current proposal appears to be suggesting that access will be blocked at both ends of the road with locked gates, which can only be unlocked by making an appointment in advance with East Lothian Council. For the residents who live on this road this suggests nothing far short of being imprisoned in their homes. Taking the thought

further, when has it been possible to arrange a grocery, furniture, or other delivery within such a tight timescale for someone to be there holding the key at the exact moment? There is a Health and Safety concern regarding emergency access for the residents at Bankton House and the cottages. While a key may be a "master nationwide council key" held by all emergency vehicles, there is still a delay in unlocking/opening and relocking one or more gates. Continuing the apparent lack of due diligence, the public have been given no access to a Fire Risk Assessment for the proposal, which needs a fire appliance with ladders to be able to quickly access the premises. Which other local communities are being split in this way across the county? If costs are the issue why haven't developers been asked to contribute more to infrastructure improvements? Blindwells is the prime example with traffic using the same arterial route from the A1 also serving Prestonpans, Cockenzie, Port Seton, North Berwick and Longniddry. The other entrance to Prestonpans comes from Wallyford with traffic accessing via the junction of the A1 north of Strawberry Corner, again no improvements have been made to the A1 to support increased traffic with the developments at Dolphingstone/Wallyford. This additional pressure to a limited extend is being released by what currently is a sub-standard connection between Tranent and Prestonpans – Johnnie Cope's Road. There is an opportunity to improve connections and the Infrastructure Team within the Roads Department and Councillors should be expected to think of solutions to issues arising for constituents, rather than the 'easy' option of closure. One of the arguments which has been raised is that Johnnie Cope's Road should become an Active Travel Route for pedestrians and cyclists. There is already a route called the Heugh via Meadowmill. The road at Meadowmill recently being resurfaced which demonstrates that money is available when required. Closure of the road (or 'reclassification') should not be considered the easy cost saving measure that it appears. No structural reports have been made available to the public, which it would be assumed East Lothian Council have access to if the bridge is as claimed and not structurally sound. Yet, if the bridge is a safety hazard concerning weight limits, then surely it should be being replaced as heavy equipment including Combine Harvesters require to use the access. It could be said that the bridge is not being used for what it was designed for, yet there are countless other bridges across the country which are in a similar situation, some quite historic. This does not mean that closure is the only option, there have been no other suggestions put forward such as installation of traffic lights as at the Nungate Bridge in Haddington, or similar near Linlithgow in West Lothian. It cannot be denied that at times traffic uses the road with some inappropriate speeds, yet again there is a simple solution to this with installation of appropriate speed calming measures. Going beyond the argument of closure, consideration should be given to a wider project to upgrade this road and make it one of the main roads into Prestonpans rather than a minor road which is already doing a great job assisting with traffic demands, despite its poor condition. In terms of safety apart from the single-track bridge other issues which could be resolved to make this road more useful would be the elimination of the 4 bends in the road - none of which are of current concern with a lowspeed limit being implemented and proper resurfacing. In fact, while frustrating, traversing the bridge with traffic coming in the opposite direction, everybody acts in a respectful manner and gives way as required. East Lothian Council should be considering a forward-thinking approach to meet the traffic demands of the future. In the strongest sense I reiterate that this road should neither be reclassified or closed, indeed it is a fundamental link not only between two communities but has a wider impact on serving those in Blindwells and the new developments at Dolphingstone and will become even more important in the years to come. Whether or not the road should have been closed in 1986 if paperwork was in order is completely immaterial to the situation, we find ourselves in today. It is simply irresponsible to 'wave through' legislation and reclassification/closure without recognising the long-term harm that this will cause. With traffic only going to increase with new houses being built at both ends of Prestonpans, there is a need for maintaining and improving this current connection. In addition, taking account of East Lothian Council's own "Strategic Masterplan - Former Power Station & Surrounding Area", it is recognised that there are "potential opportunities to enhance current road infrastructure" within the Council - Johnnie Cope's Road should equally fall into this category as the specific road mentioned in the master plan. Further consideration should be given to: "enhanced utilisation of the rail infrastructure, particularly with regard the potential opportunities of 'four tracking' from Prestonpans to Drem, which would create significant opportunities for additional local (and intercity) rail services on the East Coast Main Line in East Lothian. Also potential options for stations to serve the Blindwells/Cockenzie area" with "examination of potential options for stations to serve the Blindwells/Cockenzie area reveals that there are many options from relatively minor upgrades to the existing stations at Prestonpans

and Longniddry, through relocation of either or both of these two stations, to the construction of an additional new station to directly serve Blindwells and/or Cockenzie." Obviously not wishing to lose the station at Prestonpans as it is well used by the communities that it serves - notably within realistic walking distance of everybody in the expanding town of Prestonpans; some significant work would need to be undertaken. It is reasonable to assume that this could involve the demolition of the current narrow historic railway bridge which holds the track and a wider bridge being installed. Indeed, this option allows a realignment and creation of a straight road direct to Tranent without restriction, while at the same time resolving the flooding issues that plague the residents of Bankton House and the cottages on Johnnie Cope's Road. This would allow a proper pavement to be installed to assist with disabled access to the other platform unless the rail authority chooses to install lifts during a station refurbishment. Questions could remain over the cost of replacing the road bridge (which would be ideal to be 2-way) yet with traffic lights installed there is no reason why the current bridge isn't suitable now. Once again why are developers being permitted planning permission without investing in local infrastructure for an area? Note infrastructure doesn't just include roads, but other basic facilities which build a community. The junction at the bottom of Johnnie Cope's Road where it meets the junction to the local Co-op and Mid Road is a disgrace and greater oversight should have been taken at the time of giving planning permission to the shop units. With the "waste ground" a roundabout could easily be installed to ease flow, and equally would be a traffic calming measure along mid-road. A junction traffic lights or roundabout on exit from Tranent just past the Jet Garage would be a traffic calming measure for traffic entering Tranent. It could be viewed that by forcing Tranent residents on a de-tour to Prestonpans Railway Station that this will increase traffic along Mid-Road and then become the excuse for Prestonpans residents to lose their station, or at the very least require a car (for many) to access the station if it is moved further towards Blindwells and away from the centre of Prestonpans. Upgrading Johnnie Cope's Road in its present state with resurfacing is the first step, traffic lights for the bridge the second (unless the bridge was widened), followed by the forward-thinking approach which long term would continue to redirect some traffic and be of benefit to all within the area - note not just Prestonpans residents. In summary, the road is an essential lifeline for those that use it. Residents on the road deserve better, restricting their access with "key entry" via a gate is not humane nor realistic on a day-to-day level. Emergency vehicles use the road regularly to access Tranent, the ambulance station is in Prestonpans. The Fire Service must have unrestricted access should their services be needed at Bankton House or the cottages. The road is one of few links left across the A1 for the communities which reside on both sides. The road already serves a purpose of being able to reduce demand on other arterial routes into Prestonpans. I look forward to being able to receive detailed feedback to each of these concerns and long-term views for "opportunities to enhance current road infrastructure". Original use or intention is immaterial. There are bridges all over the country (and indeed even this county) that are in use today by traffic that these structures were not designed for. For example the single-track, hump-backed Aray Bridge outside Inverary was completed in 1786. Today it carries in excess of 3000 vehicles per day, ranging from motorbikes to heavy goods vehicles, when it was designed for nothing heavier than a coach and six horses. Argyll and Bute Council, like local authorities across Scotland have done in similar circumstances, rightly put in place a traffic signal either side to safely regulate traffic. When a similarly aged bridge at the head of Loch Fyne was found to be unsuitable for contemporary traffic a new one was built nearby.

That your team's response to ourselves and others and the advice you have provided to Councillors consistently fails to acknowledge and address the simple fact that significant numbers of vehicles *do* choose to use this road (as testified by the justification you are now giving as to why you want to close the bridge) is troubling.

We have attempted to engage with your team on this matter in good faith over many months. I will ask you once again for the formal structural report you must surely have commissioned the Council Engineer to produce to come to this important decision and the other associated research that you must surely also have commissioned to look at current and projected road user numbers on the Johnnie Cope Road and the B1361 and A198 as well as the carbon and pollution impacts of forcing users onto already congested alternatives.

We are simply asking for the fact-based evidence that led your team to request this delegated authority from Council Cabinet, not subjective opinion or a repeat of what may or may not have been the original intention in 1986. A lot has changed in 37 years, at some point in this process that change will have to be acknowledged. The Section 68(1) was to be used because a road was deemed as "unnecessary", that is demonstrably proven not to be the case as the communities of Prestonpans and Tranent have grown in the time since.

I look forward to reading those reports and any available data that you have used here so that I can precis them for attendees at the Community Council next week in your absence, but like you I must get back to my day job for now.

I would like to clarify that as Council officers we are simple implementing a decision that was approved by East Lothian Councils Cabinet. I appreciate there are some new Cllrs in place now and that is why I briefed them in Nov 2022.

Keith has outlined the process and that legal advice was sought and it was agreed to promote the redetermination Order under sections 1(1) and 152(2). Many thanks for coming back to me, I won't pretend that's not disappointing, I think that local residents deserve the opportunity to put questions to those responsible for making such significant decisions.

Since I will be asked by CC colleagues, the closure notification circulated below to us a few weeks ago tells us that you wish to close the road using powers contained in *the Roads (Scotland) Act 1984,* specifically section 68(1). Your draft redetermination order then offers the justification that the road "will become unnecessary," which is clause 68(1)(b) and would have been the justification for the original order had your predecessors properly sought it all those years ago. You have not specified safety concerns in the draft order which would be 68(1)(a). Can you tell us why? Is it because 69(1)(a) specified closure on dangerous grounds specifies only on reasons "*other* than by reason of its crossing" (my emphasis)?

Also, can you please share with us the recent structural assessments and reports that confirm that this bridge over one of the busiest trunk roads in Scotland is dangerously incapable of hosting the volume of vehicles that currently find it necessary to use it each day but that it can still withstand the weight of heavy combine harvesters, moving trucks, fire engines and other vehicles. How you and your officers objectively came to this conclusion is vital to public understanding of the situation.

Answers on both of these would also be hugely appreciated as we draft our communication with the Transport Secretary, as per Section 71, para 2(a)ii of the same Act, and encourage others to do the same.

Thank you for the invite, but unfortunately Keith and I are unable to attend the meeting next week. The Traffic regulation order is currently out for consultation so the Community Council can feed back to this. As we have outlined Johnnie Copes road was originally to have been closed as a through route when the A1 Tranent bypass opened in 1986, but kept open for walkers and cyclists. To this end, a bridge was provided where it crosses the A1 and "no through road except cycles" signs were sited at both the Tranent and Prestonpans . However, the closure was not legally effective as the then highways authority, Lothian Regional Council never made the necessary TROs needed to authorise it. The error was discovered by East Lothian Council some years ago hence why a report was taken to Cabinet to put things right and authorise the closure to through traffic of the ex-B1349. This was approved by Cabinet in Jan 2020 but with the onset of COVID it wasn't taken forward. We are now simple progressing the order.

The main reason East Lothian Council is proposing that Johnnie Cope road is to be closed to vehicular traffic is on the grounds of "Road Safety". The Structure over the A1 was not designed to take the volume and type of traffic using it. It was built as an accommodation bridge for the farmer and it was always intended to be closed to vehicular traffic. There are alternative more appropriate roads within close proximity. We proposed to redetermine the road to permit pedestrian and cyclists only which will provide a safer environment for those users. To redetermine the use requires a Traffic regulation order (TRO) and this is currently out for public consultation. I would note the design of the TRO will allow for emergency services access, farmer access and access for any residents.
