SUBJECT: Funding for Communities 2024/25

1 PURPOSE

- 1.1 In terms of para 10.2 of the Council's Scheme of Delegation, the Head of Communities has authority to approve the award of grants to individuals and organisations within the community, in line with the approved budget allocation. This report continues the One Council approach to partnership funding bringing together funding to Community Councils and Area Partnerships, advising on grant awards to community and partner organisations from partnership funds budgeted for by East Lothian Council in the financial year 2024/25.
- 1.2 The total of allocated funding by East Lothian Council to support community organisations in 2024/25 financial year is £1,770,048, plus £300,000 from Roads capital budget and £600,000 from Amenities Service revenue budget that Area Partnerships are able to influence, arising from the cross-service officer recommendations contained within Appendix 1, 2 and 3 of this report.
- 1.3 Note that the funding allocation to community organisations from Children's and Adult Services and from the Health and Social Care Integration Joint Board are presented in separate reports to Members' Library Services, to complete confirmation of all partnership funding allocated by East Lothian Council in 2024/25.

2 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 The Head of Communities, having reviewed all the applications and funding proposals from partners and services, has determined the funding awards as appended to the report as part of her delegated authority through deciding the level of grants to individuals and organisations (Section 10.2 of the Scheme of Delegation).
- 2.2 The funding recommendations for 2023/24 are as follows:

- i) Allocation of Community Council Administration Grants, Insurance and Local Priority Scheme budget, totalling £132,270 (Appendix 1). This includes a £500 administration and secretariat award for the Association of East Lothian Community Councils.
- ii) An allocation of One Council Partnership Funding to community groups and organisations totalling £1,322,778, (Appendix 2). This sum includes £333,925 for the contracted welfare advice service delivered by the East Lothian Advice Consortium.
- iii) Note that the allocated budgets devolved to the six Area Partnerships is £1,215,000 (Appendix 3).
- 2.3 Note that in line with the 2024/25 budget approved by Council no contribution is being made to Police Scotland towards the cost of 2.8 FTE Community Police Officers in East Lothian and that in accordance with the Service Level Agreement (SLA) terms overseeing this arrangement between Police Scotland and the Council, the SLA ends naturally on 31 March 2024.
- 2.4 Note that £15,000 from the Communities budget is directed to fund sports grants administered by the Council's Active Business Unit within the Sports, Countryside and Leisure Service.

3 BACKGROUND

- 3.1 The range of activities supported by the voluntary/3rd sector and other community organisations throughout East Lothian make a significant contribution to the vibrancy, health and well-being of East Lothian communities.
- 3.2 The awards as outlined in this report will enable organisations to maintain their commitment to partnership working with the Council to support communities to build resilience and capacity, contributing to the Council vision, objectives and priorities, including Reducing Poverty and Inequality.
- 3.3 Applications for One Council Partnership Funding grants are evaluated to ensure strategic fit; that grant funding is streamlined, co-ordinated and targeted to support delivery of the East Lothian Council Plan, East Lothian Partnership Local Outcome Improvement Plan strategic priorities, in conjunction with supporting delivery of the East Lothian Integration Joint Board's Health & Social Care Strategic Plan, and the East Lothian Partnership's Children and Young People's Services Plan.
- 3.4 The overarching intention of partnership funding is to support reducing inequalities across East Lothian's communities and population. In addition, the pandemic and the cost of living challenges have impacted on many peoples' wellbeing and exacerbated hardship with community groups and organisations providing vital supports in response.

- 3.5 The One Council Partnership Fund is managed by the Council's Place Directorate and specifically, by the Connected Communities Service. The Connected Communities Managers provide a direct link for the Area Partnerships, Community Councils and funded organisations in their locality, supporting the development, monitoring and evaluation of local projects and Service Level Agreements.
- 3.6 To assist and encourage all partners in their efforts to secure additional funding support from the 'external' funding market, information has been made available on the Council's website at: https://www.eastlothian.gov.uk/info/210623/funding. This advice is intended to enable partner community organisations to become more financially resilient and sustainable, and to reduce dependency on Council funding over time, given the known financial pressures facing the Council in the years ahead.
- 3.7 Applicants to the One Council Partnership Fund are also advised to refer to Volunteer Centre East Lothian (VCEL), East Lothian's third sector interface partner, for advice on funding opportunities and governance arrangements in support of the voluntary and third sector: https://www.volunteereastlothian.org.uk/. Some applicants have been declined One Council Partnership funding as they have received funding from alternative sources, such as the new third sector Health and Wellbeing fund, administered by VCEL.
- 3.8 The 2024/25 budget approved by Council included several reductions in funding from the Communities services budget, including the One Council Partnership Fund:
 - £35,000 reduction in core funding for Area Partnerships
 - £135,000 reduction in Grant funding, inclusive of removal of £35,000 funding for Fisherrow Trust
 - £91,000 transfer of funding to Youth Work
 - £125,000 removal of funding for Police Scotland.
- 3.9 Community Councils funding remains as in 2023/24, at a total of £132,270. This includes £15,770 Admin Grant (which includes a fixed amount of £350 per Community Council and £86 per Community Council towards insurance premium which each Community Council will agree with their insurer); £116,000 Local Priorities funding (based on a semi fixed amount {ranging from £750 for the smallest to £2,250 for the largest Community Council} and a variable amount based on population/ electoral roll); and £500 for administration and secretariat support for the Association of Community Councils. Any difference in payment between 2023/24 and 2024/25 is due to changes in the population/ electoral roll across Community Councils. (See Appendix 1)
- 3.10 Given the high demand for funding from applicants that received funding in 2023/24, which could not all be met from the funding available, there

was a presumption that new applications would not receive funding. Also, a further level of prioritisation than is normally given to applications was used when evaluating this year's applications.

- High Priority: projects with closest link to OCPF objectives including reducing poverty – maintain at last year's funding level
- Medium Priority: projects with a close link to OCPF objectives 10%-20% reduction in funding from 2023/24
- Low Priority: relatively low level of linkage to OCPF objectives and/ or applicant holds a relatively high level of reserves and/ or potential to attract other income or funding – 20% or higher reduction in funding from 2023/24.
- 3.11 A full list of awards based on this prioritisation is shown in Appendix 2.
- 3.12 Area Partnerships will receive £315,000 in general services funding compared to £350,000 in 2023/24. This equates to a 10% cut in general service funding. Additionally, Area Partnerships are able to influence £600,000 Amenity Services Budget through influence over priority project requests in the deployment of Landscape and Countryside workforce and machinery, and £300,000 Roads Capital Programme spend through the setting of the Roads priority works programme. (See Appendix 3)
- 3.13 The Roads Service produces a works programme which sets out the planned capital works for both its internal and external workforce. This is based on schemes which have been identified through the needs assessment process and those projects ranked highest are included within the operational programme. The Roads Service will share the works programme with the Connected Communities Managers and Area Partnerships. This will identify the priority projects included in the operational programme as well as those schemes that are not on the priority list but are projects that the service would be looking to undertake in the future. It is these projects, alongside other local priority projects determined by Area Partnerships, that Area Partnerships can influence the Roads Service for inclusion in future works programme where possible and or when funding becomes available.
- 3.14 Work will be undertaken with the Council's Communications team to showcase some of the projects supported by One Council Partnership Fund grants.

4 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

4.1 The allocation of partnership funding as outlined in this report will assist the Council to achieve the aims of the East Lothian Plan (and associated plans), the Integration Joint Board's Health & Social Care Strategic Plan and the Council Plan and further demonstrate the successful partnership working arrangements across the county, to help reduce inequalities and meet Partnership and Council strategic priorities.

4.2 The Council's financial challenges over the coming years have necessitated a clear focus on increasing the resilience of community organisations, to help them develop sustainable business models and reduce reliance on annual Council funding. Applicants have been encouraged to explore alternative funding streams and to approach VCEL, the Third Sector Interface for East Lothian, which is funded by Scottish Government to provide advice to third sector organisations on governance issues and support to secure external funding.

5 INTEGRATED IMPACT ASSESSMENT

5.1 The subject of this report has been through the Integrated Impact Assessment process and no negative impacts have been identified.

This Integrated Impact Assessment relates to the Members Library Service report entitled 'One Council Partnership Funding 2024/25, submitted April 2024.

The report provides details of East Lothian Council funding awarded for 2024/25 to community organisations including Community Councils, Area Partnerships and grants to community groups.

2. What will change as a result of this policy?

This funding will support a wide range of community organisations to help reduce inequalities and build resilience across East Lothian; within this broad objective, priority has been given to awarding grants to organisations with objectives and outcomes which support the East Lothian Partnership and East Lothian Council strategic priorities, in particular, the objective: Reduce Poverty and Inequality.

The amount allocated to grants in the 2024/25 budget fell from £1,543,515 in 2023/24 to £1,317,515 (a 14.6% reduction).

Given the high demand for funding from applicants that received funding in 2023/24 which could not all be met from the 2024/25 funding available, there was a presumption that new applications would not receive funding. Also, a further level of prioritisation than is normally given to applications was used when evaluating this year's applications.

High Priority – most closely linked to OCPF objectives including reducing poverty – maintain at last year's level

Medium Priority – close link to OCPF objectives - 10% - 20% reduction in funding from 2023/24

There has been improved community promotion and targeting of this funding to ensure it benefits where most required. Funding is provided to all 20 Community Councils and 6 Area Partnerships which ensures that all areas in East Lothian receive funding support.

Closer collaborative working with East Lothian's Third Sector Interface (TSI) Volunteer Centre East Lothian (VCEL) has helped to ensure alignment with strategic priorities and avoid potential duplication of funding.
